ON THE SUBJECT OF HORSES,

A NEAR ACCIDENT WAS WITNESSED A FEW WEEKS AGO, WHEN A YOUNG RIDER WAS RIDING ON THE WRONG SIDE OF THE ROAD, WHILE A LARGE TRUCK WAS COMING TOWARDS HER. REALIZING SHE WAS ON THE WRONG SIDE, SHE MOVED TO CROSS THE ROAD, BUT A CAR COMING IN THE OTHER DIRECTION WAS OBSCURED FROM HER LINE OF VISION.
FORTUNATELY THE DRIVER OF THE CAR WAS ABLE TO VEER UP A SIDE STREET, AVOIDING A POSSIBLE TRAGEDY.

YOUNG RIDERS MAY NOTE: THAT TURNING YOUR HORSE IN THE OPPOSITE DIRECT-ION DOESN'T NECESSARILY MEAN YOU WILL BE SAFE, AS SUDDEN MOVEMENTS MAY CAUSE THE HORSE TO BECOME AGITATED, POSSIBLY THROWING THE RIDER INTO THE PATH OF AN ONCOMING CAR.

ALL HORSE RIDERS: ENJOY YOURSELVES WITH YOUR HORSES, BUT PLEASE OBEY ALL ROAD RULES WHICH APPLY TO YOU.

FURTHER TO THIS, THERE HAVE BEEN NUMEROUS COMPLAINTS FROM READERS, ABOUT THE TEARING UP OF NATURE STRIPS AND THE SOILING OF FOOTPATHS OUTSIDE HOUSES AND IN THE MAIN STREETS OF ST. MARYS, BY YOUR HORSES.

THE SAME RULES APPLY TO HORSES AS BICYCLE RIDERS.

<u>PRESS RELEASE</u> With recent rains and the arrival of cooler weather the Fingal Forestry District will start its programme

of slash burning to prepare areas forregeneration.

Twelve burns are planned in the District. Two burns are planned in Portland Municipality in the Goulds Country area, and ten burns are planned in the Mathinna area, and five in the St. Marys area.

A great deal of careful planning by experienced men precedes each burn to minimise the risk of the fire escaping beyond the planned bound-aries. Should this happen, trained and equipped men are standing by to immediately suppress such escapes

Each area has a unique set of considerations to be taken into account in preparing fire burning plans, and generally, what is called a convecticolumn is strived for. In the centr of the area the heat of the burn causes a column of heated air to rapidly rise. This rising column draws air inward at the bottom towar the centre. Tonnes of water vapour are carried up with the hot air, plu sparks and debris. As the air rise: it cools, and the water vapour condneses, extinguishing sparks.

Convection columns are not the threathey appear to be, but the result of a carefully planned and controlled fire,

Research into the physical effects of marijuana is ongoing and often inconclusive. But from animal studies, observations of chronic users and other research, certain hazards seem clear:

*Women who use marijuana regularly have more abnormal menstrual periods and lower levels of oestrogen than non-users. This could affect the entire reproductive system, including breast and development and the ability to conceive.

*In men, heavy use of marijuana reduces testosterone levels and sperm count, and often produces more abnormal sperm.

*Marijuana smoke contains more tars and cancer-producing hydrocarbons than tobacco smoke.

*Smoking five joints of marijuana a week affects the pulmonary -system----from sinuses to lungs---more adversely than smoking six packs of cigarettes a week.

*Heavy users of marijuana suffer chronic sinusitis, bronchitis and emphyseme--all virtually unknown in young non-users.

unknown in young non-users.

*Marijuana inhibits white
blood cell response, the body's
ability to resist and fight off
infections.

*During a marijuana high, the heart rate is significantly clevated---extremely dangerous to anyone with a heart ailment.

*Marijuana distorts reaction time, motor coordination and visual perception, making it extremely dangerous to drive.

Users are not only starting younger, but the marijuana in common use today is 10 times more potent than it was a few years ago.

A recent survey carried out in 31 secondary schools (both goverment and independent) by the NSW Drug and Alcohol Authority provides an overall assessment of drug use among young people in Australia. A total of 2139 students took part in a survey, with an emphasis on the 15 to 16 age group.

Tobacco, alcohol and analgesics were the drugs most commonly used, with few obvious sex differences in the pattern of use, although quantity was generally slightly higher in boys.

Fercentages of students using various drugs regularly (at least once a week) were: tobacco-35.1; alcohol--32.7; analgesics-20.9; sedatives-3.3; marijuana(cannab-

sedatives-3.3; marijuana(cannabis)-6.3; hallucinogens-1; stimulants-0.3.

Why do children start using drugs in the first place? Students surveyed gave the following reasons:curiosity, need for acceptance,

It was once thought that only

It was once thought that only the child with problems would use drugs, but many pot smokers are happy; outgoing kids with friends good parents and no reason to escape from reality.

No family is immune. Yet many children do choose to stay clear of drugs, and parents are helping them to make that choice.

The majority of parents are sure their high-school children are not involved with drugs--at least "not seriously"; especially those busy with sports, school activities and getting good marks. Many parents of high-school students, however, are dismayed to learn that their kids are involved---some seriously enough to lose interest in school, to be arrested or, in the saddest cases, to be hurt or even killed in drug-related accidents.

Authorities say that, though parents are concerned, they aren't very well informed. The drug culture—the behaviour, even the language— is unfamiliar to them. When parents do talk about drugs, they'd better get their facts straight, or lose credibilty.

Our society—our children—must come to terms with these problems we must assess our life-styles and the role drugs are playing in our lives. How much do you care.

PRESS RELEASE

There were four new cases of Hydatids and four readmissions for further surgery during the twelve month period to December 1982.
The number of new cases is more than in 1981, but the same as in 1980.
These figures, released recently by the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council are a part of the continuing survey into the disease in humans which has been conducted by the Council for the Director of Public Health for the past seventeen years.

Although the number of new cases is one more than last year, this does not indicate that the disease .s on the increase. All four patients ere in the 40--59 age group and could alave been infected twenty or thirty 🖫 ars ago.

The most encouraging part of the rurvey is that there were no new cases under 40 years of age. When the campaign agan in 1965 more than half of all

the patients were under 40.

This is the 8th consecutive year in which no new case has been reported inderb10 years of age and the 6th rear in succession with no new cases

under the age of 20.

The secretary of the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council, Mr.J.T. ickmere, said that the chance of asmanians picking up the disease now s greatly reduced since the number of infected dogs found by the Department of Agriculture are so few. For the year ending 30 June. 1982, only three dogs were found to be infected th hydatid tape worms.


This is the percentage of dogs ound infected in any year since the
