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FUTURE TECHNOLOGY AND EMPLOYMENT

The idea that man must work to survive is an ancient one, for as far back as 400BC a man who did not work was viewed in a very bad light.

However, technological change has reached the stage where it offers man possibilities, undreamed of in the past, for the way in which life can be lived. For some, expectations will be raised, but for others the boutlook is gloomy.

The opportunities given to man by technological development have gradually reduced the time spent, and the number of people required, to produce the necessities of life. Technology has freed many people from the necessity of actually toiling for their daily bread and butter. It has drastically reduced the number of people employed in these activities while the amount of food available has increased. An increasing number of people do not have to spend time producing the physical necessities of life, so they can develop other interests.

Some of our children could grow up never knowing what it is to be 'employed'. There needs to be tolerance and more flexibility in community attitudes towards work because in the future work may no longer be the focus of our culture. 'Employment' in the past has, often of necessity, been seen as necessary for the continual existence of the community, but it does not follow that this will always be so.

Perhaps the problem of the future will be not how to create more jobs, but how to live in a society in which the need of every individual to contribute to the community's production output is no longer the dominant factor in people's lives. We need to evaluate the changes taking place in society now so that those unavoidably affected by the emerging pressures are not alienated from society.

The new Minister for Employment, Mr. Ian Macphee has been asked to reopen the Community Youth Support Scheme projects at Latrabe, Westbury and Fingal,

As they are miles away from the nearest Commonwealth Employment office, and there are no other support agencies, it is imperative that the young unemployed people be assisted by local community effort through CYSS.

As well as writing the Minister, Mr. Burr has also made the offer to discuss these closures personally, with Mr. Macphee at any time.

NEW PATIENT ASSISTANCE GROUP FORMED. Towards the and of last year, Allen-Jean Mitchell came to Tasmania with the hope that the climate would be kinder than Adelaide and Sydney and make living with Systemic Lupus Erythematosus easier for her.

Ellen-Jean had previously been a teacher and a keen travellar until the disease forced her to live a quiter life and become an invalid pensioner.

She had been a founding member of the Lupus Association of N.S.W. and now has all got a similar association off the ground in Tasmania. Already there are groups meeting regularly in Nobert, Launceston, and the North-West coast with, to date, 60 members. At each meeting there is a talk by a member of the medical profession or a person who can give assistance in some way to patients, their families and alsotheir friends, who very often do not understand the disease.

Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (SLE) is an inflammatory disease of blood vessels in the connective tissue. (Connective tissue binds the body's cells the way mortar binds bricks in a building.) SLE can change these tissues, producing abnormalities in the structure and function of such vital organs as the kidneys, heart, and brain.

Alteration may also occur in the skin, joints, blood, gastro-intestinal tract and the nervous system.

Moreover, Lupus turns the immune system against the body's own cells.

It is related to Rheumatoid Arthritis and Rheumatic Fever and also disorders of the connective tissue.

Its origin is unkniwn, its symptoms are extremely varied and often similar to symptoms of other diseases.

Common symptoms are generalized aching, weakness, malaise, fatigue, low-grade fever and chills. Arthritic-like pains, joint swelling and stiffness often develop. Many sufferers are extremely sensitive to sunlight and even minimum exposure to bright sun can trigger symptoms such as fever or generalized skin rash.

Although there is, so far, no cure, there are medications available to control attacks and generally adequate rest and freedom from emotional and physical stress are recommended to help keep it in check.

TASMANIA'S TOURIST ATTRACTIONS.

Still in Launceston, this week we visit the 1825 PENNY ROYAL CORNAILL AND PENNY ROYAL WINDWILL. Located alongside the Penny Royal Watermill Motel, Paterson St., Launceston.

These unique and fully working mills are two of the most fascinating tourist attractions in Australia. The original Cornmill was built in 1825 by Andrew Gatenby, His four sons and one convict at Barton near Cressy. A replica of the original Cornmill has now been built alongside the Penny Royal Water-

The seven storey Tower or Cap Windmill stands as a beacon to visitors to Launceston. It is situated in the beautiful landscaped grounds of the Penny Royal Complex. Breathtaking views of the Tamar Valley, Yacht Basin and the city can be seen from the Cap inspection gallery 90 feet above the Ground.

Both mills have fully restored and operating machinery giving a fascinating insight into the grinding of grain as in the days of old. The mills contain Wheelwright shops, Mill-* wrights shop. Museum. Grain lofts. Millers Quarters, Threshing room, Blacksmiths shop, Wheel pits and extensive gift shops selling a wide range of local and English pottery, Welsh woollen goods, Copper and Brassware as well as various sized bags of stoneground wholemeal flour.

Mills are open from 9.00am to 5.30pm daily.

THE PENNY ROYAL GUNPOWDER MILLS COMPLEX Old Cataract Gorge Quarry Site.

The complex is a world class tourist attraction to all sections of the public. It depicts an early 19th century colonial gunpowder mill, cannon foundary and arsenal, all set in a grassy rural landscape of trees, streems and waterfalls. Also featured is a unique canal system and lake complete with a fleet of various type vessels, two of which fire and proof their guns daily. Included in the complex there is a display of cannon, restaurant, gift shops, scale models steam railway system with 700 metres of track for children and a restored tram which operates between the Penny Royal Windmill and the Gunpowder Mill. 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
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
