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THE RESUSCITATION OF WOOL

The expression "Australia rides on the sheep's back" has not lost all its impact. After years of uncertainty and change interest is reviving in fine quality woollen goods.

Tasmania is particularly aware of the major changes, closures and restructuring which the woollen textiles industry has undergone during the last decade. Employment in the wool processing industry has been declining since World War I, when more than 30,000 people were employed. The steady decline became a torrent after 1970.

Between 1969 and 1976 over 1/3 of the woollen mills in Australia closed. All textile industries experienced difficulties but closures in woollen industry fell by 60% from 17,000 in 1969 to 6,300 in 1977. This had extremely harsh effects in Launceston where textile factories had formed the largest single industry. Changes at Coats Patons clearly illustrate this trend - after a peak of 2247 employees in 1967 the company currently employs 604 people. Australia wide, although output fell, the turnover per employee increased, as more efficient technology was introduced.

A variety of social changes influenced the declining manufacture of woollen textiles. New man-made fibres became popular for their price, lightness and washing qualities. Improvements in heating also prompted the decline as warm homes, offices and cars eliminated the need for so much clothing, and fewer blankets were needed at night. Light acrylic blankets and the growth in popularity of continental quilts also affected sales of woollen goods. The decline of woollen goods provides an interesting case study into the inter-relatedness of the economy. The industry has now stabilised, and its position in relation to other textiles is gradually improving.

The resurgence of interest in wool is also linked to a variety of factors but chief among them is the power of promotion and the inherent versatility

of wool. Fashion emphasis on quality, long lasting garments means natural fibres are "in". Australian Wool Corporation fashion parades have demonstrated contemporary uses for an age old fibre, and technological advances in production methods have also been advantageous.

'Wool gathering' in one's leisure should not mean wasting time, but experimenting with the range of crafts using wool. Spinning, weaving, knitting, crocheting and rug-making are all enjoying a revival as people rediscover the satisfaction of traditional crafts. The Japanese firm, Fujii Keori, which has dominated fine wool sales in Launceston for the last 40 years, has also boosted the image of wool.

An innovative promoter of woollen goods is the Waverley Mill in Launceston. This mill, established in 1874 and the oldest woollen mill in Australia, last year seemed set for closure but now it is capitalising on its age and Tasmania's tourist trade. The mill offers conducted tours seven days per week and produces fine quality mohair and woollen goods such as skirt lengths ties, blankets and knitting yarns which appeal to tourists. The 'bluey', uniform of generations of Australian farmers because of its durability, is reincarnated as women's coats and carry bags.

Innovation and imagination mean that the future for the wool industry is becoming brighter.

Any pensioners planning for an
overseas trip this year should check
out the new arrangements for paying
pensions. The Minister for Social
Security, Senator Fred Chaney, has
announced that as from September 1
of this year his department will no
longer send pension cheques to an
overseas address if the trip is for
less than 12 months.

The Minister said that the changes
had been made to cut out excessive
administrative costs involved in
making short-term arrangements for
overseas payments.

Two options are open to pensioners
travelling for periods of less than
12 months.

They can either ask the Department
of Social Security to hold the
pension payment and pay it in a
lump sum on the pensioner's return
or they can make arrangements for
the department to pay the cheques
direct to a bank account or build-
ing society in Australia.

Senator Chaney said that all pen-
sioners intending to travel overseas
should contact the local office of
the department to check out the
current procedures and remember that
the new scheme begins in September.

TASMANIA'S TOURIST ATTRACTIONS.

We leave Launceston this week and travel to George Town where we will visit THE GROVE, 25 Cimitiere St.

"The Grove" is a Georgian residence, believed to have been built in the 1820's, possibly as the home of the military commandant in charge of the colony of Northern Van Diemen's Land.

In the 1830's it was the home of an influential and versatile gentleman by the name of Mathew Curling Friend. He was Port Officer and District Magistrate, and was responsible for the development of many of the Port facilities on the Tamar River, or Port Dalrymple, as it was then known. It was from this port, that Batman, Fawkner and others, set forth to found the village of Melbourne.

'The Grove' now has the Atmosphere of a gentlemen's home in the colonial days, and the owners and the staff wear clothes of the period. The house is open to the public lunch and morning and afternoon teas are served by the 'Grove Maids', in an atmosphere of history. Tasmanian apple short-crust pie is a specialty of the house, and locally produced handcrafts and souvenirs are available for sale. Open daily except for month of July.

Now we move on to EVANDALE where we visit "CLARENDON"

Built in 1838 by James Cox, a wealthy woolgrower and merchant, Clarendon has been described as one of the great houses of Australia. Clarendon contains some excellent oil paintings, on loan from the Queen Victoria Museum in Launceston, and some very interesting pieces of period furniture, and three outstanding chandeliers. Clarendon will be of particular interest to those interested in Georgian architecture. Open daily except Christmas day and Good Friday. Usually closed in July for maintenance. Admission Adults \$1.00 Children .50c.

ROSS WOOL AND CRAFT CENTRE, Ross.

This centre, adjacent to the famous Ross bridge, is housed in a building believed to have been the barracks which accommodated the English soldiers who maintained order in the settlement. The building has now been renovated by the Midlands Group of the National Trust.

The Centre displays a wide range of Tasmanian handcrafts available for purchase. Emphasis naturally is on woollen items as the Ross district is well known for its fine Merino fleeces.

Next to the Craft Centre is the Ross Caravan Park, which provides accommodation for Caravans plus an amenities block. In addition to this, five self contained units have been erected.
