## THE AUSTRALIAN HERITAGE COMMISSION

The Australian Heritage Commission was established by the Federal Government in 1975 to advise the Government and administer the national estate.

The 'National Estate' is a wide ranging concept covering parts of the natural or cultural environment which have aesthetic, historic, scientific or social significance for the present community or for the future. It includes national parks, other flora and fauna reserves, the coastland, islands, lakes, special landforms such as caves and forests, historic buildings and towns, urban parks and gardens and aboriginal and archaeological sites.

There are four main tasks for the Commission - to compile a register of national estate places, to advise the minister for home affairs and environment, to develop research, training and education programs, and to administer gifts and bequests. The most important function is the compilation of the register of the national estate. It will take many years to compile a comprehensive register of the significant parts of the cultural and natural environment of Australia, and it will be a continuing process. The register does not grade entries and all registrations have equal status irrespective of the time of their entry.

Registration is recognition of the significance of that place, it imposes some constraints on Commonwealth Ministers and Authorities, as they must not take any action which would adversely affect any place in the register, unless there is no feasible or prudent alternative; all action taken must minimise damage, and the commission must be

given time to object. Registration is not binding on the actions of individuals or state or local governments private ownership is quite compatible with national estate registration.

Anyone can nominate a place for the register at any time, using a special form available from the commission. Before a place is entered in the register, it is placed on an interim list for public comment. The minister, however, has power after considering an environmental report, to order the entry or removal of a place from the register.

The register is held at the Commission's Office in Canberra and is open for inspection. Copies of listings are also held by environment centres, the National Trust or the State Government, at present there are almost 7,000 entries in the register 1049 of them being Tasmanian. The most recent Tasmanian inclusions are Bluff Hill Point, Marrawah (an aboriginal site); Ida Bay State Reserve, Southport, Flinty Creek Viaduct, Evandale; Craggy Island, near Flinders Island; North West Bay Mud Flats, Kingborough; Pittwater, and Fossil Bluff, Wynyard. The Heritage Commission acknowledges the important role of National Trusts and Nature Conservation Bodies - without their continuing co-operation and community involvement, the identification and protection of the National Estate would be very difficult. They would also be very happy to suggest ways you could work for the protection of the National Estate in your area.



MEETING HELD AT ST. MARYS

A public meeting, convened by Mr Ron Sumner, in conjunction with the St. Marys Chamber of Commerce, was held at St. Marys on Thursday August 26, in the presence of Mr Braid, M.H.A., Minister of Roads, Mr Stephen Salter, M.H.A., Mr E.N. Richardson, Acting Superintendent of Secondary Schools, Northern Region, Mr Kevin Faulkner, President, St. Marys Chamber of Commerce, The Headmaster of St. Marys District High School, Mr Ian Lancaster, The Police Inspector, Mr Des LeFevre, plus many other local businessmen and women, and other interested residents.

The purpose of the meeting, was to bring to Mr Braid's attention, the importance of up-grading both the St. Marys and Elephant pass.

Concern was expressed by those present, that if the passes didn't receive attention soon, parents, of children who have to travel the passes daily, would seek alternative educational venues.

If this occurred, the attendance would drop at the St. Marys School, and could result in down-grading from a Class I School. The level for such classification is 350 pupils. At present the school has 360 pupils.

Mr Richardson said he believed the school would remain at Class I, and that it was Department policy to try to maintain the standards and facilities of all schools.

Mr Braid agreed that the Fingal Valley and the East Coast is a great place to live, but he also confessed to owning a 24' caravan he was reluctant to tow down the passes. Mr Braid also said that bus drivers had to be issued with a special licence to travel the passes, to prove they are familiar with the area.

Mr Dale Wright felt it was dangerous to have to travel on the passes, as they were, with inflammable loads.

Mr Barry Halton, school bus driver, asked if signs could be erected at the top and bottom of both passes, stating that school buses travel the passes at specified times.

Mr Peter Rubenach, school bus driver, said the children he brought from Bicheno and surrounding districts, disliked travelling on the pass. He said he had children in his bus for 2 hours a day, of which a great part of that time was spent on the pass. He would like to see the passes up-graded to a very good standard, with some of the worst blind corners removed. He also has to pick up small children at 3 points on the pass, and asked for a widening of the road at these points, or at least the erection of signs.

Although Inspector LeFevre said there was an agreement with one local logging contractor, that his trucks do not use the St. Marys pass, during the time the school bus would be

using it, he could not give the same assurance for the Elephant pass, or other logging contractors.

Mr Salter asked why the alternative road, on which \$1,000,000 was spent, couldn't be used by log trucks when carting out of adjacent areas, but there are two bridges that would need looking at.

Inspector LeFevre suggested that Mr Braid and other Ministers, study the report and associated video, made by Mr Walker from the Transport Department and The Department of Main Roads, along with some local people. This video was made in the interests of road safety.

Mr Faulkner said, to his knowledge, there had only been 3 fatalities on the St. Marys pass since 1929, so this proves the passes are not dangerous, but very frightening, especially to tourists who come from areas that are relatively flat. If some bad blind corners were attended to, it must be an improvement.

Mr Braid couldn't promise, when asked, that anything would be done soon, even though he agreed both passes need some attention. He said he would have to study the problem before making a statement, which he would make when he had something concrete to report.

(Mr Sumner would like to apologise to anyone who didn't know this meeting was on, as it was called at very short notice, and he tried to let as many know as possible. It was also held at 12 noon, which was not a convenient time for some people.)

Green Valley Vegetable and Drinking Water Project and Small Goat Breeding Project. Both sponsored by the Kenya Freedom from Hunger Campaign. Green Valley is a misnomer, because the area is one of the most arid in the country. The great need is for pure water, both for drinking so as to prevent dysentery, bilharzia, hepatitis, typhoid etc. and abundant water for irrigation. The first scheme proposes to do just that, the second scheme will upgrade nutrition by providing goat's milk for badly nourished children.

#### PAPUA NEW GUINEA:

Mirigeda Youth Development Centre. Sponsored by a local board of businessmen and National Council of Women. Local boys and girls will be taught vegetable gardening, furniture making, machine maintenance etc. The principal aim is to stop them drifting to the already over crowded cities.

IMMUNIZATIONS.RUBELLA (GERMAN MEASLES)VACCINATIONS

THE IMPORTANCE of ensuring young girls are vaccinated against Rubella, is not because it is a debilitating disease, but because of the tragic handicaps it can inflict, as a result of a mother contracting Rubella, during early pregnancy.

GERMAN MEASLES is usually a very mild disease, presenting with a mild fever, a feeling of being unwell and often a rash of short duration. Frequently a child can have German Measles without anyone suspecting they have the measles.

THE HANDICAPS of deafness and/or blindness in childhood, are frequently a result of a mother being infected with Rubella in early pregnancy. This situation, however, can be prevented by just one injection of Rubella vaccine, given well before child-bearing years.

TOO LATE TO BE IMMUNISED ONCE YOU ARE PREGNANT!!

THE DISEASE of German Measles is Contagious for 14 - 21 days before the rash spots appear, so a pregnant woman may not be aware she has been in contact, until too late.

WHAT CAN YOU DO ABOUT IT?

(1) As a mother, you can ensure your 10-14 years old daughter is vaccinated with Rubella vaccine. This is normally carried out at your local school. YOUR PERMISSION IS ALL THAT IS REQUIRED.

(2) As a young woman, with no evidence of having had German Measles, you can be immunised against them whether you are contemplating pregnancy or not. -NOW. You will be protecting your future and the future of unborn children, and you will not inadvertently pass infection to a pregnant friend, especially during an epidemic.

YOU NEED to be immunised at least 3 months before contemplating pregnancy. SHOULD YOU BE contemplating pregnancy, you can see your doctor for immunization, or if you feel that you may have had Rubella, or been immunized at school, but not really sure, then a blood sample can be taken and sent to a Laboratory for confirmation.
