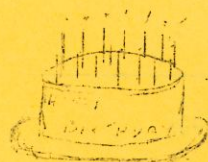

ST. MARYS DISTRICT HIGH

SCHOOL

As the term quickly comes to an end it is a time to reflect on the achievements of our school. What a busy time it has been. Over the last three weeks there have been several special activities:

(1) the Outdoor Education Camps for Grades 7 and 9,

(2) A visit by the Tasmanian Dance Company - members of the company conducted classes with children from Prep to grade 8. Two performances well presented for the children.

(3) Work Experience commenced for grade 10.

(4) The commencement of the Primary Winter Roster at St. Marys.

(5) Selection of St. Marys District High in the Northern Tasmania Under 16 football team.

(6) A special workshop on Transition Education was conducted in our school over two days for students, staff and members of the community by Education Department officers from the Curriculum Branch. This workshop examined the role of our school in preparing young people for post school life. Mr. Harry Wilsden (curriculum officer) spoke to the Parents & Friends Association about this subject. A feature of this workshop was the opportunity it provided for the three groups (students, staff and members of the community) to work together to identify problems, to establish goals and to draw up programmes to prepare our young people for post school life.

TRANSITION EDUCATION aims to help prepare students for the new or changed roles they will have on leaving this school as workers, students, unemployed youth, citizens, consumers, tenants, drivers, users of leisure time and in relationships with others.

(7) Congratulations to John Miles (grade 10 student) for gaining selection in the Northern Tasmanian Under 16 football team. John will participate in the Intra State Football Carnival to be held in Launceston from 28th - 26th May.

WORK EXPERIENCE, 1983

This week the grade 10 students of St. Marys District High School are participating in our Work Experience Program. They are placed in employment situations of their choice in areas ranging from the Fingal Valley to Hobart, Launceston and Oatlands. The program runs for 5 days and the students will experience all aspects of work in general and of various jobs in particular. They are all fully insured for worker's compensation. Choices of work include shop assistants, fitter and turner, journalist, animal husbandry, chef, farm hands, nursing, teacher aide,

joiner, bricklayer. During this time, students may also experience boarding with someone, regular and irregular working hours, using public transport and the responsibilities of a worker instead of a student.

Term 1 concludes at 3.30 p.m. on Friday, 27th May.

Term 11 commences on Tuesday, 14th June.
