IS YOUR HOUSE SAFE?

IS YOUR HOUSE SAFE?

You are off on holidays, the kids are packed in the car, the animals are packed off to the kennels and catteries, the neighbours poised to water the garden and gather the mail - BUT HOW SAFE IS YOUR HOUSE?

About 523 of all burglaries are achieved by breaking the door, when in actual fact the breaking of glass is a peculiarly penetrating sound which can be heard and recognised over quite a distance, particularly at night.

So to try and stop a thief from getting out of your house with stolen goods, or slow down his exit considerably, you should improve your door-locking system.

By doing so, you would be improving your security a lot, and any thief would think twice about unloading stolen goods through a broken window, as it would look suspicious to any passers-by.

If door locks are simple and easy to open from the inside, a careful thief can break a back window pane, slip his hand in to open the window, and walk through and open the front door for an easy get-away.

At home, there are a lot of improvements you can make. If, for example you have a key-in-knob lock, you might also buy a security dead-lock that is relatively simple for a handy-man to fit.

Although many people say this, it is not necessarily true.

Most burglars will go to great lengths to avoid attracting attention. The mere fact that your house appears occupied is enough to drive many away. Most of them want to work fast - every obstacle put in their way is one more step towards a safe home.

Don't rely on door chains. Although good, most of them will not keep a strong man out.

The best locks in the world are useless if you are careless with the key. Always have your keys with you or keep those you are not using, in

a safe place. Never put your name and address on any keys. Never hide a key outside your home. If you have just moved to a new but previously used home, have the keys changed, just to be sure that the only people to have access to your home is your own family.

Sliding glass doors are the most often neglected. The standard locks on many are not strong and people very seldom have reinforced glass in these doors.

Buy a strong wooden dowel that is about an inch and a half in diameter, and an inch shorter than the length of one sliding door, then slip the dowel in the door's channel. Alternatively, if the broom handle meets these requirements, then use it.

You won't be able to lock the door from the outside, only from the inside. Sliding windows should be attended to like the sliding doors, with a length of doweling in the channeling. The hinges on any door should be on the inside.

REMEMBER THAT EVERY BEDROOM SHOULD HAVE A WINDOW AVAILABLE AS A FIRE EXIT. AT NIGHT, THE BEDROOM WINDOW MAY BE THE QUICKEST MEANS OF ESCAPE IN THE EVENT OF A FIRE. ALWAYS HAVE ONLY A STRONG LOCK ON ONE WINDOW IN EACH BEDROOM, AND KEEP THAT WINDOW LOCKED.

WHAT IS THE BEST WAY TO USE THE T.V. SET?

The Third Parent in Your Home?

No one needs to be told that television is a strong influence on children and

much more than parents can, the TV set has been called the Third Parent. How much of a parent will TV be to your children next weekend, say, or during the school holidays? How many hours will they devote to it?

Teachers, like parents, are concerned about the quality and the quantity of what children watch. The latest figures on the viewing habits of Australian primary school children are startling. Do you know that the average primary child spends 1,118 hours a year in front of the TV set and that this is a good deal more than the time spent in class in a year?

Do you know that every minute of television teaches a child something - about violence and crime, or money and material possessions, or glamorised products, or people in the news, or splendid documentaries, or fine drama - or whatever, depending on the choice of programmes. What is the TV chosen in your home teaching your children?

The Need For Some Sensible Rules. Here are a number of ideas called from leading writers on the problems of family TV watching. You might need to discuss them and arrive at an agreed family policy...

1) Every home needs sensible rules that prevent squabbling over which programmes shall be watched. Squabbling which arises when the set is left on all the time and there are continual demands for a switch to another channel.

2) The basic rule will require that viewing shall be limited and selective, not continuous and aimless. Every member of the family should be allowed a share in the weekly selection.

3) Parents should know what their children are watching and have the moral courage to decide on its suitability.

4) From time to time parents should discuss with the children their favourite programmes. Child comments should be encouraged so that parents and children can get to know one another's responses.

5) From time to time there needs to be a review of the amount of time the set is switched off... Is it enough time for other necessary activities (reading, study, exercise, music, conversation, etc.)

6) There will be no TV at meal times, for this is the family's time to talk.

7) Whatever TV routine is decided on, there will be some room for flexibility - as when the family decides to watch a special programme.

An extract from Hansard, House of Assembly. - 8 Sept., 1983

Mr. SALTER (Wilmot) - I rise to support this bill. It has been suggested by the Leader of the Opposition, Mr Wriedt, and the member for Denison, Dr Amos, that the Premier has raised the expectations of the people of the Fingal Valley. That is quite true and I would hold myself just as responsible as anyone else for those expectations*Government has no option but to build a thermal power station to cover our future power needs. Mr Wriedt knows, and every Tasmanian knows, why this has been brought about.

I would like to say at this stage that the Fingal Valley residents are delighted at the prospect of a power station being built in the area at some time. This was certainly demonstrated at the public meeting which was attended by more than 250 people a few weeks ago.

Mr Wriedt - They're going to be awfully disappointed.

Mr SALTER - In the Fingal Valley in excess of 50 per cent of the population is living below the poverty line. The jobs that a thermal plant would create, using the accepted multiplier system, would be approximately 800. This would be the salvation of an area which has been forgotten by previous governments ever a very long period.

I would like to make some brief comments regarding the availability and quality of Fingal Valley coal. Some of the reports that I have seen have suggested that we would have to have a mix of Tasmanian and mainland coal. The reason stated is that we do not have the required tonnage. The Shell Company has stated on numerous occasions that measured reserves on the Mount Nicholas range are sufficient for the life of a 200 megawatt station. It also holds the lease on the Dalmaine area and the indicated reserves there are 190 million tonnes. The Cornwall Coal Company has also indicated that it would tender for part or all of the contract for the supply of coal. Also there are other coal-mining areas such as Seymour, Merrywood and Harefield but at the moment there are only approximate measures on those areas. The other reason stated is that the quality is not good enough. That is absolute rot. As I have stated in this House before, the calorific value, ash

content and moisture content are equal to the average of at least nine other power stations operating on the mainland.

One of the other reasons stated in some of the reports I have seen that a power station would not be acceptable in the Fingal Valley is the inversion problem. Anyone who knows the area realises that it is very foggy but when one moves up the ranges even 100 feet one is completely out of the fog-bound area so I do not think inversion would create the problem that some people anticipate.

One thing I would like to discuss tonight - and I know that it has never been discussed in this Parliament before - is the relatively new method, the fluidised bed process. With this method all washery waste can be utilised. At the moment at the Duncan Mine at Fingal there are 2.5 million tonnes of mined coal on the surface. In some people's eyes that could represent an environmental problem That could all be utilised in this new method. Cornwall Coal Company representatives have told me that their waste product is sufficient to power a 50 megawatt station. If we were to combine this new process with a conventional coal-fired thermal plant of 200 megawatts there would be sufficient waste to power a 100 megawatt fluidised bed plant.

The point that really impresses me about the approaches that have been made to me is that there is at least one company on the mainland and the possibility of two which would build a plant in the Fingal Valley at no capital cost to the State provided, however, it was a base station. They have assured me that if they can buy that reject coal at a reasonable price their unit costs would be most competitive. Whilst I appreciate the fact that there would be some difficulty with a company working in conjunction - or perhaps the word may be 'competition' - with the Hydro I have put this proposition forward not only for the benefit of the people of the Fingal Valley but, I feel, for the State of Tasmania as I believe it would ultimately be of benefit to all Tasmanians.

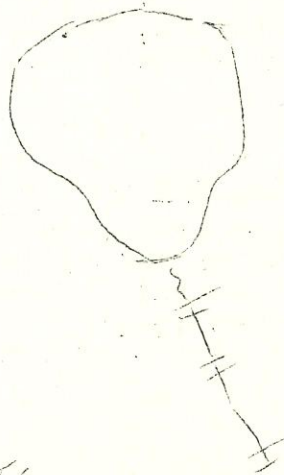
