VOLUNTEER PROGRAM.

Why should you volunteer? It is true that we have got by without any coordinated network of volunteers. It is also true that our community is a very caring one. Everybody watches very carefully what his neighbour is doing! Most often when the observer sees what they identify as a problem they do what they can. Unfortunately not all problems are so easily identified or solved by a neighbour working in isolation. We are now being faced with more complex and larger problems. The burden of this development must be shared. In fact if we are to be able to keep pace we must accept some community development responsibilities.

What are you doing to assist? There are some people who accept responsibilities. Infact these people are found on all the numerous community service organizations. These being, the Progress Association Advance Australia Groups, Lions Clubs Chambers of Commerce, Red Cross, Church Groups, Elderly Citizens, Nursing Mothers etc., even Little Athletics. There are many and numerous such groups active in our valley. It might well be that members of these groups would like to keep their community service within their various groups. If that is the case we are prepared to act as a valley coordinator and to offer community training workshops and backup services for these groups, as they see the need. Owing to our ties with the hospital and community health services we are in a position to be able to give some idea of problem areas within our community.

Many people do not support any community service organization or are members but would like to take a more direct part in community development programs. What can we offer these people if they volunteer? Unfortunately we cannot give anyone a ticket to heaven. Helping others within the community has many and varied problems but we are not trying to saddle you with all of these. We hope to be able to provide interesting and rewarding workshops and training programs. These will need to be participating and definitely not academic exercises. We hope to be able to draw on your life experiences and skills which everybody has. We hope to be able to give you some work in the areas and times that you feel you can give us.

Until we receive the assessment questionnaire we cannot plan what

areas of service we can undertake, nor what group formation we would recommend. We don't expect too many men volunteers for Friday payweek evening. It has been suggested however, that we should find a volunteer driver for Friday night pay week to take some people home! Perhaps this suggestion was not made in all seriousness however we do have "alcohol" related problems within our community. Some areas might take such a proposal seriously. The extent of our program is limitless. Already there is some talk of establishing a second hand clothes store in relation with senior citizens and young unemployed. Such mixing of various groups could be very desirable for both groups. No doubt you have some ideas!

Isolation is a problem within our valley. People and groups have been formed into small areas and have not been able to expand to do the meaningful work which they could do. There is strong rivalry between various groups and communities. This goes a little further than healthy competition and so we must make every effort to steer back into the sporting boundry of "Healthy competition". We cannot afford to be too small minded when we look at our position within the state. In the numbers game we have the odds against us. Many worthwhile projects and developments are not coming our way because we are not large or consolidated enough to get them. The department of welfare have realized our problem and we have been given some funds through the Fingal Valley Resources Group to implement some worthwhile projects. We of course cannot do anything without your support.

Anybody who has been in our area for five minutes should realize that this is Gods chosen ground for us. Once we clean up a bit of the mess that we have made other people will start to be more envious of us. Now is the time for us to make our breakthrough. We are competing against the rest of the state not just each other. Community development needs communities, and all the help it can get from everyone if it is going to be meaningful.

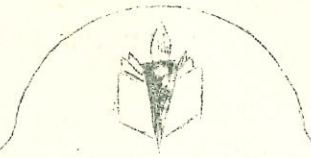

PRESS RELEASE FROM MAX BURR, MEMBER FOR WILMOT, 26.9.83

The public is to become more involved in the planning of greater media coverage of federal government proceedings.

"There is a real need to review the means by which the proceedings of both Houses of Parliament are made available to the people of Australia by the electronic media," Mr Max Burr said. (Wilmot MHR) Mr Burr is a member of the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings.

The nine member committee has been directed by both Houses of Parliament to start an inquiry into the possible televising of debates in the House of Representatives and the Senate.

"We will be studying the whole spectrum of making debates available to the viewing and listening audiences of Australia," Mr. Burr said.

"Our study on televised sessions will also cover the dramatic use of the new Parliament House in the bicentenary year.

"We will also look into the radio broadcasting of happenings in both Houses.

"This could be on a continuous basis and even include the simultaneous broadcasting from the House of Representatives and the Senate.

"To get the best cross sections of views on these subjects the committee is advertising in the national press, calling for public submissions and comment on this subject. "We want opinions from all walks of life."

Mr Burr said that another area being studied was that of facilities for those directly involved with the media gathering industry in the Parliament.

"It is time the long suffering press and television people had a chance to put their views before the committee.

"Their work conditions leave much to be desired and the present building is too cramped," he said. Submissions must reach the secretary of the committee by October 31, 1983.

HANDICAPPED CHILDREN AT HOME

It is often preferable for handicapped children to be cared for in the family home rather than an institution. A specific 'Handicapped Child's' allowance is available to parents or guardians caring for such a child at home.

The allowance for a severely handicapped child is \$85.00 per month and is payable to the parent or guardian of a handicapped child aged under 16 living at home. The allowance for a child classified as handicapped does depend on an income test.

The limit of the handicapped child's allowance is reviewed every March and September in line with changes in the minimum wage. The allowance is not taxable. Payments are reviewed from time to time by the Department of Social Security.

The Department of Social Security distinguishes between handicapped and severely handicapped children when assessing allowances. It regards a severely handicapped child as one who suffers a physical or mental disability which necessitates constant care and attention, and is likely to do so for a considerable length of time. The classification 'handicapped' is designed to cover children requiring marginally less care and attention than the severely handicapped.

Parent/Guardians wishing to claim this allowance should obtain a claim form from any Social Security Office or have one posted to them. The form has two sections. The first should be filled in by the Parent/Guardian and then the whole form must be given to a Doctor, preferably one who has seen the child recently. However, even a child who has not consulted a Doctor recently should be taken to one. The Doctor then will fill in the second section of the form and send the completed form to Social Security.

The Handicapped Child's Allowance is paid monthly with the family allowance. It can be paid to a bank, credit union or building society or by cheque to a home address.

The more spectacular and unusual of our birds and animals are well known to everyone here and overseas and all are fascinating. Our trees and flowers are less well known but have a splendour and character of their own - from the soaring jarrah and mountain ash to the shy alpine daisy or the sturdy Sturt's pea.

Travel out of the cities to the snow country, to the seashores or to the endless deserts - it is all yours to explore.

Go by car or on foot. There is no reason why you should not get out and see Australia first - slowly on foot, with a pack, it's the cheapest and healthiest way to go.

Whatever your interests are there is plenty for you to see in Australia, and with more folk museums, galleries and historical parks being developed the choice is even wider. From the great sophistication of the cities which contain facilities equal to the best in the world, to the isolated friendliness of an outback campfire, Australia has a lot to offer the young people of today. Go see and enjoy what your country has and please be tidy. DON'T RUBBISH AUSTRALIA.
