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BUG IN A RUG

This part of an address given by a past International President of Lions (Everett J. "Ebb" Grindstaff).

In the fable of a bug that spent his entire life in the most beautifully designed Persian rug in the world, all the bug ever saw during his life time were his own problems. He could n't see over the top of them. He could only chew through the wool to find crumbs that had spilled on the rug, then he would have to chew through more wool to seek more crumbs. This is the way he spent his crumbly life. Now if that bug had risen up, he would have seen the beautiful place he had been living in.

Success in life depends on the motive. If you are in the race merely for the fun of it or for a meal ticket, you will not put the same energy into your running as you will if your ambition is deeper and more serious.

Life is somewhat like a grindstone - it either polishes you or reduces you to dust. It depends on you.

What is it that people like to see the most? Well let me give you one language that is all its own, a time proven universal language understood by people of every nation. Indeed, we may not speak the same tongue as our neighbours but there's one thing that we do that has no language barrier - we smile in the same tongue. There is no interpreter needed for this expression of love, happiness or Good Will.

When you meet the man without a smile, give him one of yours. A smile costs nothing but gives much. It enriches those who receive, without making poorer those who give. It takes but a moment, but the memory of it sometimes lasts forever. It brings rest to the weary, cheer to the discouraged, sunshine to the sad,

and it is nature's best antidote for trouble. Yet it cannot be bought, begged, borrowed or stolen, for it is something that is of no value to anyone until it is given away. Some people are too tired to give you a smile. Give them one of yours, as none needs a smile so much as he who has no more to give.

A smile is a curve that can set lots of things straight.

When you do not know what to do or which way to turn, smile. This will relax your mind and let the sunshine of happiness into your soul.

A smile is a mystery; nobody knows it's biological cause, only its emotional effect. For the person who smiles feels better himself. His smile is not only light to another's spirit, its curve swings inevitably back to light his own.

A smile is the light in your window that tells people there's a caring, sharing individual in sight.

However, there is one other attitude that will tear down all the smiles, all the good will, warm feelings and fellowship that we might have built. Unfortunately, it also exists in the world's greatest service organization, an organization that must live and act unselfishly. Here we are, the world's largest service organization and we are supposed to perform in an unselfish manner. It is time that we lay aside selfish interest and personal prejudice about people. We must look at the total picture and common good for all. We do not need to criticize unless it is constructive. If you take pleasure in unconstructive criticism it is time to hold your tongue. If you must slander someone, don't speak it, but write it in the sand near the water's edge. Gossip, whether it's true or not, is like mud on the wall. You can wipe it off, but it leaves a spot.

VISIT BY SHEFFIELD SCHOOL BAND

Last Friday, the school was fortunate to have the Sheffield District High School Band perform for it. The band of 36 students from Grades 4 to 9 visited the school as part of a week's tour of district high schools around the state.

The band has reached a high standard of performance in a relatively short time and has competed successfully in a number of music competitions.

The school wishes to thank all parents who billeted or who offered to billet students. Taking a billet can present some inconvenience but it can also be very rewarding.

SECONDARY MUSIC SCHOLARSHIPS 1984

Secondary Music Scholarships are being offered to students entering high school in 1984 in order to ensure that students who have obvious ability in music and are interested in high performance have the opportunity to develop their talent.

This assistance, namely \$270 per year, will enable individual tuition to be given in local areas where the access and availability of teachers is known.

Applicants will undergo a standardised musical aptitude test plus audition/interview procedures in order to be considered for the offer of a scholarship.

Successful scholarship holders will be expected to attend regional workshops and an annual music week to be held in Hobart during the last week of second term.

Should it not be possible for the holder of a scholarship to be taught in their local district area, the opportunity will be given to enrol at a high school for which hostel accommodation is available.

The scholarship does not cover the cost of such hostel fees which are already subsidised by the Government. However students may apply for an isolated children's allowance from the Commonwealth Department of Education, Regional Director, 188 Collins Street, Hobart 7000.

Application forms and further information are available from

Regional Education Offices and from the Schools Music Centre, 229 Campbell Street, Hobart 7000. Applications close on November 18th, 1983.

APPOINTMENT OF A MUSIC TEACHER

Hopefully, a teacher of music will again be appointed to the school from the beginning of 1984. Until such an appointment is made, the school is having difficulty in adequately covering this area of the curriculum.

PRIVATE TUITION IN MUSIC

There are some parents who would like their children to receive private music tuition out of school hours. This applies particularly to the piano tuition.

Any parent who is interested in their child receiving tuition for the piano, or any other musical instrument, is asked to contact the school. It is possible that arrangements for lessons may be made if there is sufficient demand and competent tutors available.

ANOTHER YEAR OF CYSS

This week we begin our new funding period. Naturally, there will be changes to the CYSS operation - and details of these will unfold in the coming months.

At this time, it is probably appropriate to explain how CYSS is funded and operated in the Fingal-Portland area.

A CYSS project is funded for 12 months at a time, our funding period runs from the 1st of November to the 31st of October.

There are three levels of funding available. These levels are based on the number of young unemployed attending the project and the need for a project in a particular area. The Fingal-Portland CYSS receives Level one funding - about \$40,000 for the year. This is the lowest level of funding for rural CYSS projects.

All funding is by the Federal Government.

Out of our grant it is necessary for us to cover all costs for the entire year. These costs include salaries of Project Officers, Rental of building, Hydro and Phone, Cost of tutors for classes, Tools and materials, Travelling allowances paid to participants plus incidental running costs.

So if you think \$40,000 is a lot of money, think again.

How our grant is managed! The management of a CYSS Project is undertaken by a Local Management Committee.

The management committee is responsible for the overall management of the project in the areas of employment of Project Officers, general administration of finances, general policy decisions and the liason with the Department of Employment and Industrial Relations (The Funding Body).

The Management Committee is made of concerned citizens from the area who work on an entirely honorary basis.

Members of the public interested in the management of CYSS projects could contact our secretary, Peter Willans for further information.

The project officers are responsible to the committee for the day to day running of the project. This task includes organizing classes, excursions and courses, org-

anising recreational activities, management of the CYSS Centre.

Project Officers are generally on hand at Todd's Hall and would be only too happy to answer questions from the community regarding the Project.

So how about addressing some constructive criticism directly to the people concerned, either committee or Project Staff.

THE GREAT KANGAROO DEBATE:

It has been dubbed 'Skippygate' and has led to a Kangaroo summit in Australia and a 'Dirty Tricks' campaign in the United States. The issue creating this turmoil is the fate of one of Australia's National symbols - the kangaroo.

The fish and wildlife service of the U.S. interior department began the controversy by proposing the removal of red, eastern grey and western grey kangaroos from its list of threatened species. Kangaroos were placed on the list in 1974, at the same time as the U.S. Government placed an embargo on the importation of kangaroo products. Pressure from the Fraser government resulted in the removal of this embargo in 1981, for at least a two year period.

A congressional sub-committee of the fish and wildlife service has begun hearings on whether the kangaroo should be removed from the list of threatened species (American Law recognises threatened species as those in danger of being endangered. Endangered species are those in danger of extinction.)

The Australian government believes the kangaroo should not be considered threatened any longer. It has argued before the sub-committee that the three relevant species are 'Abundant and widespread'; there is no evidence of a long-term national decrease in their population; and that there is no feasible alternative, and none needed, to commercial culling to control numbers.

Conservationists, led by an American group, the kangaroo protection foundation - of which Mrs Marian Newman is President - have argued that rather than a 'wildlife management tool' - the killing of kangaroo is a "rationalisation for commercial and often brutal exploitation that (is) threatening the futures of ... the western grey and, perhaps, the red kangaroo species".

Much money has been spent for the cause. The Australian Embassy has distributed widely a glossy information kit; the K.P.F. has spent tens of thousands of dollars on letters mailed to one million Americans, complete with postcards addressed to the President.

Mrs Newman has alleged that "a deal was made in which the C.I.A. got its bases (in Australia) only if the U.S. eased its protectionist stance on kangaroo imports".
