DID YOU KNOT?

The Fingal Valley Historical Research Group.

1. In the 19th century, Conara was known as "The Corners".

2. What is now called Bare Rock, south of Fingal, was originally named "Ossians Throne".

3. Mt. Elephant was so named because of the striking resemblance its outline bears to the head and back of that animal.

4. The township of Mangana was named after the aboriginal word for the South Esk River.

5. The first gold was discovered in 1852 on or about Feb 5th by Keiling Richardson, a shepherd

in the employ of James Grant of Tullochgorum, near Fingal.
6. On Aug. 12, 1827, Robert Vincent Legge arrived in Tasmania at Hobart Town in the ship Midway, after a five month trip. A few years later he settled on his new selection at Cullenswood. Mis first abode was a hollow tree until such time that he could erect a dwelling house. He had to take a gun with him even when only working in his garden, for fear of either bush-rangers or the blacks attacking him.

(Source, 1864 Walch's Almanac). 7. Fingal originally existed as a probation station. According to the 1847 Lieutenant Governor's Despatches, the settlement accommodated over 300 men with detachments built to house an additional 200. Primarily the men were used for road con-struction and the erection of buildings.

8. The only known item to have been published at Avoca, is a musical composition "The Lyre Bird Waltz", composed by William Richardson Jnr, Avoca, Tasmania. The waltz was printed in Hobart Town by J. Walch & Sons, probably in 1868.
Richardson was undoubtedly the son of the Colonial Chaplain, for whom the rectory was built.

CELEBRATION.

Most of us Know that last year was the International Tear of the Tree, how many of us are aware that 1983 is world communications year and that 17th, May is world COMM-UNICATIONS DAY? Communications networks, so essential for our business and social functioning are often taken for granted, it is an area rapidly being transformed by modern technology as we can glimpse by the Burgeon-ing of facilities for direct international subscriber dialling and live satellite news from the other side of the world. There have been many recent changes in the Australian Communications Mystems., This year the government must respond to reports on cable and subscription television, the Davidson inquiry into telecommunications and the Bradley Inquir; into postal services and electronic mail, legislation is also expected to establish the Australian Broadcasting Corporation. Satellite communications are becoming an inherent part of our life, Two important systems are the NATIONAL COMMUNICATIONS SATELLIZE SYSTEM (N.C.S.S) and the HOMESTEAD AND COMMUNITY BROADCASTING SATELLITE SERVICE (H.A.C.B.S.S.) Aussat pty. Ltd. is a government owned company set up to operate the systems. By mid 1985. A bare two years away-the NCSS should be operating. It will consist of two satellites orbit ing 36,000kilometres above the earth, relaying information back to eight earth stations, each satellite willweigh 650 kilograms and will measure 6.5 metres by 2 metres. They will be launched either by the United States Space Shuttle or via the European Satellite Launcher. How will these satellites benefit us? hey will relay television and radio to remote and under serviced areas and improve telephone services in remote areas. Telex Type services will be much more rapid. The satellites will cover both A.B.C. and commercial radio and television and they will improve reception in all areas outside capital cities The department of transport will also use the facilities to improve its air, with the project. Mea and land communications, Papua New Guinea will use them to improve facilities while outback educational and medical communications will be transmitted through the system. The homestead and community broadcast burr said. ing satellite service will broadcast ABC radio and television to people beyond existing land based services. This system should assist Tasmanians living in areas of poor reception. Individuals will link into the system by purchasing small earth stations about 1.2 metres in diameter which willcost about \$1,000. Testing of

prototype dishes began around Australia last month.

The role of the Department of Communications change. Development is hindered if the communications infrastructure is missing. This International Year aims to remind us of their important role. After all, there is stilla long way to go before all countries have communications facilities of the type we expect in 1982 75% of the world's 550 million telephones were in just eight countries.

THE NORTHERN COUNTRY FAMILY DAY CARE SCHEME INCLUDES THE FINGAL VALLEY.

Country living has a great deal to offer, however country people must often envy the easy access that city people have to services such as medical specialists, the theatre, and a course child care.

While both parents are usually vitally interested in the care of their children, one parent has the major responsibility, or there may only be one parent. Children can be a very real restraint on the mobility and independance desired by that parent to the detriment of the family as a whole.

The availability of quality child care enables parents to;

go to work go shopping go to hospital and keep appointments catch up on the housework, or merely do their own thing(eg An adult education course) secure in the knowledge that their children are safe and well cared for

The Northern Country Family Day Care Scheme is a Commonwealth sponsored community service, which employs two co-ordinators to build up family day care throughout the 003 telephone district.

Family Day Care offers care for your baby or child in a private home, with mothers" who are carefully chosen and licensed by the Department of Community Welfare.

Care can be for short periods,

Care can be for short periods, all day, out of school hours and in emergencies. The child minders have support and guidance from child care professionals.

Insurance is provided free of charge and toys and equipment, such as car seats again be borrowed

as car seats, can be borrowed.

The aim of the scheme is to recuit day care mothers who are warm hearted people with a sensible approach to children, and because they are interested in the childs total development, must enjoy being

involved in their play activities as well as keeping them safe, clean and fed. A day care mother enjoys being at home with her family family and at the same time being useful in the community.

The day care mothers are free to accept or refuse any day care situation offered to her. Doy care mothers are free to take family holidays or meet special ? family circumstances because they are part of a caring network. Children benefit in family day care from a warm family environment similar to their own home, the presence of playmates, individual attention and transport to and from kindergarten if required.

Fees are recommended by the co- ordinators but are paid directly to the day care mother. Subsidies for families on a low budget are available when necessary, be sure to ask if you are eligible. Most lower and some middle income families are eligible.

The co-ordinators responsible for supervising the programme are based in Launceston, and work from their homes. They make regular visits to all areas working closely with all families, giving support and advice as required.
