MEALS UN WHEBLS

The Annual Report in March indicated that for the past twelve months, 3,322 meals were prepared and distributed to citizens at St. Marys, Cornwall, Fingal and Mangana.

The committee met regularly during the year and was happy to report that no major problems emerged to disrupt the system of meals distribution. The only concern was that occasionally a driver will not turn up to collect meals for deliveryas röstered. This inevitably means a somewhat cold and late meal for the recipients, even though emergency action is taken on these occasions, to rectify the situation by finding a relief driver, but can prove a difficulty at times. The committee is open to suggestions to remedy this,

Despite recommendations, the price of meals has remained the same for now, and must be regarded as good value with present day food prices.

A donation was made to the Meals-On-Wheels Association of Tasmania, to be used to assist the less fortunate non-hospital based groups who have to bear much greater costs to provide a meals service.

The President thanked the committee members for their work and interest during the year, the hospital kitchen staff and among others the many drivers who give generously of their time, kindness and goodwill in helping to maintain a valuable community service.

FOUR MILE CREEK - CHAIN OF LAGOONS

LINK - ROAD.

A meeting held at Four Mile Creek on

Sat. June 11, was well attended by residents, Hóliday Home owners, and people who visit the area frequently for holidays. Also in attendance were Mr Stephen Salter MHA, and the Warden of Fingal Municipality, Mr Denzil Casboult. (Mr Andrew Lohrey, MHA, visited the area earlier that morning). After listening to the views of property owners as to the impact of a highway being constructed either running through or too close to the township of Four Mile Creek, Mr. Salter said that he and Mr Lohrey would report these views to the Minister for Main Roads, Mr. Ian Braid A petition has been signed and will be presented to the Minister, to ask that the Link road by-pass Four Mile Creek, no Closer than 1km to any existing dwelling. Those who attended the meeting wish to thank Mr Salter, Mr Lobrey and Mr Casboult, for their time and interest shown in the problem,

"TWENTY YEARS HARD LABOUR"

As a shack owner at Four Mile Creek, I feel threatened and disturbed by the proposed route of the link up road between Falmouth and Chain of Lagoons.

We have always enjoyed the quiet and peaceful lifestyle that Four Mile Creek affords us. Rumowrs and speculation have been filtering through from the Department of Main Roads, but as yet we have not been approached by any representatives from this department to allay our fears with regard to this issue.

My family and I are particularly perturbed, as we have been told by an unofficial source that our shack may be in the path of the proposed route.

We would hope that a definite decision is not made until residents and shack owners have been approached and discussions have been entered into, as to the best solution for all parties concerned.

We would also ask that the Government give full consideration to the solitude and beauty of the Four Mile Creek area, and that all efforts be made to preserve these features.

MAX BURR, * FRESS RELEASE. The Four Mile Creek connector road should not be seen as just another deviation on the Tasman Highway. "The new road works between Falmouth and Chain of Lagoons will solve many problems for tour operators using the Tasman Highway but it should not be developed without due consideration being given to the local community; Mr Burr said, "Following representations from many property owners at Four Mile Creek I have asked the State Minister for Main Roads, Mr. Ian Braid, to get his department to prepare alternative plans and costing so that the new road will not only improve travel along the East Coast but will enhance the area it services. "The local residents are petitioning the government with a suggestion that the new road be no closer than one kilometre to the existing settlement and I fully support that requirement "The interests of existing property owners should be protected and the future potential of the area fully catered for in any planning by the Minister's department. The magnificent beach in the area gives Four Mile Creek great potential for development and correct planning now could save added expense in future years." The Committee is inviting principals to discuss this opportunity with suitable and interested parents. Those wishing to apply for one of the positions should do so in writing to the Regional Development Officer.

The duties of the Parent Liaison Officer will include the promotion of the School Improvement Program and other programs for parents. Successful applicants will not necessarily have had previous work experience in areas of education. They will be expected to work with teacher and parent groups in formal and informal settings.

The work load will be negotiated with schools, parent groups and the Regional Development Officer. Payment will be at a rate of \$14 per hour and travel costs will be reimbursed at usual rates. It is envisaged that there will be times of considerable activity and times of relatively few demands, if any.

It is proposed to interview selected applications on Thursday June 30th and to complete appointments the following week. An initial training session will follow soon after.
