Unemployment in Tasmania is not only caused by the lack of jobs.

"In Wilmot electorate I am greatly concerned with the loss of job.

opportunities for the unemployed caused by people who have employ-ment but work on other jobs during their paid annual leave, " said Max Burr, M.H.R. for Wilmot. "In a rural community much of the work is seasonal and many people in country townships come to rely on that work as part of their annual income. "We have a situation in many areas where employed people now take those jobs from the local community during their paid annual leave." Mr. Burr said that he had approached the president of the ACTU on the matter and had been told that it was strictly against trade union policy:
"I was told that a number of unions were able to police the situation and took disciplinary actions against members found working during their annual leave. "Unfortunately Mr. Dolan was unable to advise me as to which unions took this attitude, "He could only reiterate that the general attitude in the trade union movement was that persons should not work during annual leave as that entitlement had been obtained on the basis of affording the worker a period of recreation. "Mr. Dolan also said that as employers had not sought to incorporate a clause in awards that prohibited their employees from working elsowhere during paid leave it seemed that employers were not as concerned about the abuse of this right as the unions." Mr. Burr said that it seemed impossible to stop this practise which reduced job opportunities in the rural sector at a time when unemployment was at its highest.

(a) Your child has a history of neurological disease including seizures, convulsions or cerebral irritation in the neonatal period;

- (b) A previous reaction to the vaccine other than minor local reactions and/or mild fever;
- (c) A family history of neurological disease other than that due to trauma or infections;

Should your child of family suffer any of the above, seek advice from the treating doctor or your local doctor about future immunizations.

MEASLES - MUMPS - VACCINE

This is available to all pre-school children on normal immunization day.

Parents of older children wishing their child to have mumps vaccine should see their family doctor.

IS ANZUS RELEVANT TODAY?

The ANZUS Treaty was signed in September 1951, against a back-ground of rising communism in Asia, the possibility of a ro-emergent Japan and a victorious but weakened Britain. It has been seen by successive governments as the cornerstone of Australia's defence policy. Thirty one years later, is this still the cause?

In the community of nations
Australia ranks as a "middle power",
it can, and must, do much to guard
its own security. It can do many
things in this part of the world to
foster harmonious development and
reduce the tensions which can cause
war.

To set down what we can do, however, is also to spell out the limits of our defence capabilities and our scope for international influences.

This is why such importance is attached to the ANZUS treaty with the United States and New Zealand. The treaty, through its consultative provisions, gives us the formal structure to make our voice heard on events outside as well as inside the region.

As we have seen in the post, security problems cannot be dealt with in geographic departments. Australia must use its influence wherever possible to ensure that wider issues do not affect our interests close to home. More specifically, provided we with out partners, maintain our individual defence capabilities we strengthen our position. A collaborative effort gives us so much more scope for a positive contribution to global security.

Some have argued that the ANZUS treaty makes Australia subservient to the U.S. and that it provides mo watertight guarantee that U.S. forces would aid Australia in the event of an attack. However, a watertight guarantee would breech Australian sovereighty. Furthermore under the treaty Australia must also make a contribution to its own security.

The full extent of the advantages to Australia of ANZUS membership are sometimes overlooked:

It provides us with a powerful deterrent which we would not have if acting in isolation. Any country contemplating war or threatening war would need to consider the likelihood of involving the U.S.

In a world where military capabilities are increasingly linked with advanced technology and the khowledge needed to use it, it gives us access to an unsurpassed source of technology and supplies. It is ironic but true, that the more we try to do for ourselves in military capability, the more we need to draw on technology from every available source.

The case against Australian participation in ANZUS is essentially that instead of getting us out to trouble, it may get us more deeply into enfolding international involvements, and increase the threat to our security. It is argued that Australia is so far away from the rest of the world, that our best course is simply to opt out.

This course is not without its attractions. We have no more desire to be the subject of nuclear or chemical warfare attack than any other nation. We have no disputes with our close neighbours so why run the risk of conflict with major powers further afield?

Yet Australia, for all its remoteness, has a long history of association with others in working for the preservation of security. Such collaboration saved Australia in 1942. If more contemporary reminders are needed we only have to look at the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan to see that there will always be nations ready to seek to control other dountries.

In our endeavour to keep our region secure for the future the alliance is still very important.
