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#### HOW WORD PROCESSING WORKS

WORD PROCESSING IS BASICALLY A SYSTEM for typing any kind of text material into a computer and then editing, changing, or correcting the typed text easily and efficiently. Word processing equipment can be of two types. The term "word processor" is generally used to describe a machine in which a word processing program and a computer have been merged so that the machine's sole function is to enter, alter, and format text. There are many word processing programs, however, that enable a standard computer - whether it's a mainframe, minicomputer, or microcomputer - to function as a word processor, too.

After entering a word processing program into your computer, you then type your text on the computer's keyboard - in muchtthe same way as you would type copy on a typewriter. manuscripts on the computer.
As you type your text, the words appear This is one of the most consistent on the computer's monitor in front of When you are ready to correct you. or make changes in your text, you cimply use some computer-understood commands to add or delete words or sentences, rearrange the order of sentences or paragraphs, or correct typographical and spelling errors. You can also "format" your text in any way you like - making margins wider or smaller, changing the spacing between lines, automatically adding headings on each page of text - with headings on each page of text - with only one simple instruction. Once you have your text exactly as you want it, you can then have a "hard copy" (or paper version) of that text printed out. To get hard copy, however, you need a printer,

COMPUTERS AND THE WRITING PROCESS THILE MOST WRITERS AGREE THAT THE computer can help make the writing task easier, there is a question as to whether word processing will lead to improved writing. The research is not yet conclusive. Yet, writers and researchers who have used and studied this new pencil have found these facts to be generally true: Computer writers are less concerned

about making mistakes. Children hate to work on a messy page. Parents and teachers recognise the scene of a child writing a few words, crumpling up the paper after the first

mistake, and then painfully rewriting the first few words. The computer, on the other hand, makes it easy to correct mistakes. Therefore, the consequences of those mistakes become less important. In addition, many educators have found that the professional looking print generated by the computer adds to the students' interest in writing well. It also seems to increase their pride in their work. The use of word processing helped a boy with motor difficulties overcome "the lost paper syndrome". The boy, who has an IQ of over 180 and the motor ability of a six year old, kept crumpling up or losing his papers which were always written in a childish scrawl. The student was intelled ectually capable of writing a good paper, but the motor problems trapped the paper forever in his mind.

Writers tend to compose longer findings by researchers. And, though more writing could simply mean more bad writing, recent research on the writing process has shown that good writers create texts through a process involving writing, writing and more writing, followed by a process of deleting, changing, and adding.

Writers revise more on the

computer.
Since words written on the computer are not so permanent, writers tend to do more experimenting and rewriting. While young children generally focus on insert and delete options, older students appreciate the capacity for moving sentences and sections of text around. In either case, the willingness to revise helps students to discover their own awkward sentences, disorganised prose, and sentences, disorganised prose, and even what they want to say. Thus, there is more chance to improve their writing. The knowledge that the text can be changed, rearranged, and reformatted easily not only liberates you as a writer and encourages a longer period of true bran-storming, but it also allows a greater range of choice and comparison at each stage, leading to development on a more carefully thought-out path.

#### TIMBER VOLUME ASSESSMENT

As I have mentioned in a previous article, the Fingal Forest District is very large and diverse. Consequently, vegetative, geological, physical and precipitative elements vary accordingly.

Therefore assessments of our forests, for the sake of economics, can reasonably be done only on a sake of economics, can reasonably be done only on a sampling basis. Forest assessment is the collection of data concerning the resource, which includes timber volumes, natural features, geology and soils, plus many more.

Mick Miller is in charge of the Fingal Management Station, which is the section specializing in forest assessment. The management Station is responsible for collecting the above data for predetermined areas and compiling it to form an assessment report to be used to plan the area for harvesting. Assessment takes place in an area approximately 5 years before logging to enable time to be given to proper planning.

The Management Station crew spend an average of two weeks assessing each area (planning unit) which average about 800 hectares each. The method of assessment involves the traversing of parallel strips 400 metres apart which are located on a map and these in turn must be followed on the ground by means of compass bearing. All trees within 10 metres of either side of the lines have measurements of diameter, pulp and sawlog heights taken. The striplines are set and no deviation can take place from their direction, which means that obstacles such as creeks, thick scrub, boulders, etc., must be overcome. Many hours of often ardous walking results, this being compounded by the fact that when assessments take place, roading is usually some years away and a walk to the assessment area is necessary each day before the actual work begins. From this basic data collected, individual tree volumes can be calculated and then these converted to per hectare values and in turn to show volumes of pulp and sawlog for the area under investigation.

Because the volume assessment requires the party to systematically go through the area, all relevant operational data is collected. Essides volumes, this includes information on slopes, environmental

data, site quality, etc., which is included in a comprehensive report which forms the basic input into our planning system (planning will be covered in the next article).

Management Stations around Tasmania also provide data for the formulation of Working Plans to enable an estimate of the States forestry resource, monitor harvest and growth rates, and predict the future resource.
