LINK ROAD REPORT

The Four Mile Creek Road is first mentioned in Department of Main Roads! records with a petition in 1937 askng that the road and the bridge at Four Mile Creek be repaired. request was not granted as the road vas in so poor a state that the cost of repairs was considered excessive. It is probable that the road was in almouth and charm of Lagoons. Pact only an unmade track at that time. A considerable amount of investigation

A request was made by the Fingal Gouncil in December, 1948, for the oad to be extended to provide a connection between Falmouth and Chain of Lagoons. The District Engineer, .E. made a report and estimated the ost at 35,000 pounds but the request was refused due to the need for more rgent works elsewhere.

he Four Mile Creek Road is next mentioned when five men set up a ishing venture at Four Mile Creek in 951 and wished to transport their catch to Bicheno. At that stage minor funds were provided for minimal aintenance of the road between Four ile Creek and Falmouth.

The first subdivision at Four Mile reek took place in 1958 and the our Mile Creek Road was improved in 962-63 by expenditure of \$2,500 ith a similar amount in 1963-64.

rurther requests for a link road in 1966 resulted in estimates of \$125,000 or an unsealed 5m pavement and 394,000 for a sealed road of highway standard.

instruction of the road between our Mile Creek and the Cray-Drop-In took place between 1970 and 1973.

proposal to construct a road between almouth and Chain of Lagoons for log carting to Triabunna was first entioned in September, 1973.

petition advocating construction of the road link was submitted in ily, 1974 following the closure of Marys pass for 7 weeks in April and May, due to a landslip.

Further requests were made for the link in 1982 to overcome the problems experienced by large vehicles, including longer buses, negotiating the Passes at that time.

Apart from the substantive submissions mentioned, a large number of letters have been received from organisations and individuals over the years request-ing the provision of a link between Falmouth and Chain of Lagoons.

took place in 1973 with regard to the provision of a logging road but the eventual decision was to construct the alternative road for this purpose between St. Marys and Upper Scamander. This project was considered by the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works.

The Committee saw that the need for a coastal road had been well establish -ed, but that there was considerable concern that the development of the road should not adversely effect the local area.

The Committee accepted the concern shown by the ratepayers of Four Mile Creek that their settlement should not lose its peaceful qualities. The Committee was also very concerned over the safety aspects that were mentioned by many of the witnesses.

The Committee was convinced by the strong and united reaction of the people of Four Mile Creek that the town should be bypassed at an early stage in the road construction to avoid the problems that would result from increased through traffic separating the settlement from the beachfront areas.

The Committee is of the opinion that the township of Four Mile Creek should be bypassed completely by any new road works. Proposed Route A does divide the township and is not recomm-After consideration of all the evidence received, the Committee recommends that Route C be adopted. This would result in a higher standard of road safety because it does not divide the community and it would allow for further development without disturbing the tranquil charm presently enjoyed.


