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A CASE AGAINST PORNOGRAPHY.

The video pornography debate has produced some unusual alliances. Formerly antithetical feminists and religious groups have united in their campaign to outlaw the sale and hire of X-rated pornographic material... Meanwhile, civil libertarians and the recently formed Adult Video Industry Association of Australia oppose any measures to limit private adult viewing of video porn, presumed to occur in the confines of the home.

The association has forecast a \$15 million loss to their industry and threatened reduced taxation revenue and unemployment if pornographic material is taken off the market. Profit is the obvious motivation behind this group's mobilization and their arguments to legitimise pornography is rather feeble.

Pornographic material is not difficult to obtain, despite assertions to the contrary by vested interests. ification of X-rated video pornography is voluntary, which means that, until apprehended, a supplier may freely sell unclassified material. more, children have no difficulty operating video machines and can arrange unsupervised viewings. a fallacy that legislation can guarantee inaccessiblity to children.

Pornography denegrates women. portrays them as objects, for sexual gratification and domination. Pornographic material often depicts women bound and gagged-silenced against abuse and violance.

Mutilation and murder following sexual abuse is frequently part of pornograph -ic content. There is conclusive evidence that the abuse supposedly 'performed' on the screen is sometimes real and not acted. This refutes the argument that the actors are always willing participants and adds to the severity of the issue, given the involvement of a criminal element.

Proponents of pornography have argued that there is no statistical proof linking exposure to pornography with

'desensitisation process'.... when, after constant exposure to X-rated pornography, initial abhorrence dim-inishes to the point where sexual violance is viewed without any reaction

The social consequences of this phenomenon are frightening. Desensitised individuals are also unaffected by acts of rape and violance they may hear reported, or even witness. Rape and violence then gain respectibility.

Australia's video pornography is largely imported. However, as demand for this material increases, perceived profit potential could see Australia becoming a porn producer. The case f or uniform legislation that outlaws pornography is further strengthened due to this possiblity.

It is utterly contemptible that the people who so actively oppose the sale and hire of X-rated pornography are dismissed as a "wowser minority" by those who profit from pornography. Respect for women and abomination of violance should not be categorised as 'trendy' or 'untrendy' qualities. It should be the status quo...

PRESS RELEASE MAX BURR

If you are not happy with the Australia Post services you can now have your say. Following Australia Post's advice in August of this year that postal charges would have to be increased, the Prices Surveilance Authority is to hold an inquiry into the matter, " Max Burr, (Lyons MHR) said today.

" The inquiry is to examine postal charges for the transmission within Australia of ordinary post of standard articles and registered publications.

"It is obvious to me, from the

calls I get from the Lyons electorate that things are not that good with the postal services in rural areas. "Neither is Tasmania getting a fair deal with interstate mail. "Standard mail from Sydney and Canberra some times takes a week to get here." Mr. Burr said that the priority paid service was also something of a gimmick lately as mainland stoppages and disputes disrupted the value of the service.

"What is the senge of paying that extra for same day delivery to be told by Australia Post that there is no guarantee of delivery? Before Australia Post increases . its charges it should give the public a reliable service." The inquiry starts on October 16 in Melbourne and anyone can send in a written submission by October 12 to the chief Executive Officer P.S.A., 10 Queens Road, Melbourne, 3004.

GARDEN HINTS

Roses Time to take a good look at our roses. Various pests and diseases affect roses from time to time, mainly depending on climate and conditions. Some are:-Mildey Usually occurs during warm, damp spring or autumn, and thrive on de y mornings. Stems and young buds become covered with blotchy white fungus, which stunts the growth and distorts the leaves. control, spray with Karathane or Benlate.

Aphids Occur in spring or autumn.
Pale green to brown. Sometime
winged, they are very small, soft
and fat, clustering on new tips and buds, sucking out sap and stunting the growth. Their enemies are lady birds, lacewings and small birds, while ants encourage aphids. Lowsing often with soapy water and hosing down quite often should be sufficient, Black Spot A fungus disease associated with dampness and high temper ature. Usually begins on lower leaves, while higher leaves turn

brown and drop off. The black spots travel up the stem and may practically defoliage the whole bush. Always gather and destroy fallen leaves. Srpay with Benlate or Melprex. Spray the area around the bush as well as the bush it self. Safety A number of sprays (insectic-ides) are extremely toxic. Never handle nor inhale the concentrate or mixture always spray away from you and wash hands thoroughly. Destroy containers and keep all sprays out of reach of children.
