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FINGAL VALLEY COMMUNITY RESOURCE GROUP INC.

VOLUNTEER SERVICES COORDINATORS REPORT CONCLUSION OF PROGRAM.

What has been achieved by this voluntary services program? The project was proposed to establish an organised group of rostered volunteers structured to cater for the needs of the Fingal Municipality, aged and disadvantaged citizens. It was easy to identify numbers of disadvantaged people, most of these however appeared to be self sufficient. Volunteer services established in the past are still continuous. In country areas people are often ready to lend a helping hand where needed. It appeto be persons moving into the muni-It appears cipality more so than established residents that need the security of an organised volunteer support service As these persons have not yet become established in the community.

VOLUNTEER ENTERTAINERS - ST. MARYS HOSPITAL.

At the moment there is several volunteers that visit the hospital on frequent basis to play the piano and sing along with hospital patients, and visitors. This is very popular and recently the services of another musician was enlisted to help. Other volunteers able to help hospital bound persons in any way at all are always very welcome.

ST. MARYS COMMUNITY SHOP:

The shop opens on a regular basis with help from many persons attending to shop. The Toy Library component is yet to start but is well underway. Raising sufficient revenue to afford the weekly rent of \$30 per week once the Government Grant runs out will be the greatest concern of the shop committee. Should the Todds Hall complex be purchased with local, state or federal government assistance as a community centre the shops existance would then be assured. Hopefully this 'pie in the sky' thought is not an impossibility.

There are other groups looking to use the hall, one as a "Play Group" centre, another who want it as a drama musical society base also the St. Marys band could be reformed, and such a centre could be used for rehearsals as well as a base. At present CYSS use the hall as an office base and training workshops. Such a centre could have many worthwhile uses. The shop, however, may even be able to pay its own expenses due to recent moves to form a local craft group that plan to sell their wares through the shop. The shop committee at this stage is not sufficiently supported to guarantee continued success.

EAST COAST COMMUNITY F.M.RADIO STATION

One answer to communication problems was the suggestion of a community radio station and support has been pledged by Portland, Fingal and Glamorgan municipalities as well as many community groups for the proposed venture. One public meeting called on a cold wet night a month ago, got little support, but an interim committee was formed. The committee will design a survey form advertise and carry out distribution, from these the interim committee will asses the viability of the proposed project and eventually release a public statement.

VOLUNTEER DRIVERS:

There are two volunteer drivers that regularly service the St. Marys area. The bulk of the workload can be done by these two regular drivers who are exceptionally reliable but there is a need for some reliable part-time and stand-by drivers. There is no local taxi service and no immediate future possibility of one because of economic viability. Regular volunteer drivers are gradually expanding because of demand, many people are now becoming reliant on the service. Regular drivers have expressed some concern in regard to the depreciation of their vehicles. While they do not feel they are suffering greatly they have indicated that they would be prepared to drive

RHUBARB

This needs to be grown in full sunlight. The garden bed must be well drained, well weeded, and very well fertilised, because rhubarb is a gross feeder. Add a lot of manure to the soil, about a three inch layer of fowl manure as well as a good compost and a handful of good vegetable fertiliser.

As the soil warms up the growth begins. Do not pull the small younger stems, always pick the larger stems, and allow the smaller ones to develop. Full the stems downwards and outwards and twist, this will not damage the remaining plant. Water rhubarb well, and especially if they are on a raised bed, making sure there is good drainage underneath. Grow your plant for three to four years and then break-up the old plant and replant the best, and younger crowns, into a new bed. Six or seven crowns of rhubarb supplies plenty for the average family. When cooking only add a small amount of water, sugar and lemon juice, either brown or white sugar is suitable.

RURAL WOMEN - WHAT WE DIDN'T KNOW

A United Nations Report on women in the rural areas of developing countries identified their predominant role in food production for which they were overworked and rarely paid. The women in Third World countries were generally uneducated and in poor health due to their strenuous tasks and frequent pregnancies. The women had additional child-rearing and domestic responsibilities which they performed without assistance.

This contrasts strongly to the 'tea set brigade' image Australian city dwellers have of rural women in this country. Yet closer examination of life for rural women in Australia reveals that contrary to popular perceptions, women are indispensible to the functioning of the farm.

While variables such as farm size, type, location and profitability affect the nature and extent of womens' contribution to the farm labour force, there are some important and enlightening generalisations that can be made.

The immediate environment for farm women is not limited to the house. Vegetable and flower gardens, orchards, involvement with young animals and repairs, are some additions that make rural women far busier that domestic city women. A National Farmer (focus on Women) poll conducted in 1981 revealed that 79 per cent of rural women were legal partners in the farm and that 88 per cent had performed manual labour either sporadically or on a regular basis.

Financial management of the farm is often left to the women, many of whom have had work and/or educational experience in accounting or clerical fields. And, because the financial responsibilities necessarily involve

dealing with bankers, stock agents and bureaucrats, women often encounter sexist attitudes they are not subjected to at home.

Poisons and sprays such at leptospirosis, TB and 245-T, place women in a dangerous situations with which their urban counterparts cannot compare. The often unpredictable events that occur on a farm mean that women may be called upon at any time of day or night to perform a crucial task.

The value of women in agriculture has generally been overlooked. Rural women are also guilty of this omission. Census details indicate that women often define themselves as 'housewives' and thus not recognise the other vital duties that extends their labour to much wider boundaries. A conscious effort should be made to ensure these women get the recognition and support they indisputably deserve.
