Whilst most thinking and caring people are very much aware of the pollution problem facing today's society and the environment in which we live, surely some faith must be placed in our experts in that area for their valued and sound opinion, expertise and credibility in reassuring us that a Thermal Power Station would, in fact, be relatively harmless to the environment and an asset to the financial stability of the Valley.

Our population growth is sadly depleting.

Our young people are forced to seek Social Security benefits rather than being assured of a job when leaving school, or alternatively, leaving the Valley to seek employment in the cities. Surely the short sightedness of some people needs to be examined. We have the coal mines right on our doorstep and the Fingal Valley has always been a mining area and socially acceptable to the Mining Industry. A very large percent of the coal miners have lived in the Valley all of their lives and reach and enjoy a very long life span.

Is there any incentive for our school leavers?

Is there any industry in our Valley to provide extra employment?

What is happening to our local motto - "Advance Australia?"

We cannot advance our own Valley!

Our State motto - "You can make it in Tasmania" - well, let's make it happen!

We, as residents of this Valley must get up and fight for progress, for incentive and for greater opportunities for our young people. With forthcoming industry our schools could and would be expanded, improved and developed, thus incorporating more teaching staff, and hopefully in the future encompassing matriculation standard. Our hospital is virtually reduced to a geriatric home. With a larger population more nursing staff would be required. Recreational services and facilities would be developed. Allied industries would be fostered. Commercial and banking needs would be enlarged. Shopping facilities could and would be increased. Housing development would be an important factor and the Valley is sadly lacking in this area.

Our local Council must surely have the foresight to recognise the benefits of such development as extra services required can only increase the revenue and generate more Council employment.

When all of these commodities are taken into consideration, isn't a Thermal Power Station in our Valley a vital and necessary industry.

Nobody wants to destroy our beautiful Valley, but we do need job opportunities for our children, financial security and a better place to live.

Let's display our determination and fight for all of these things.

Mr. Dorgelo will be going to Lilydale to live after four years at this school as a teacher of Maths, Science and Rural Science. He has been appointed to Ravenswood High School.

ST. MARYS DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Bonde (Art) and Mr. Corner-Walker (English, Social Science) have both been transferred to southern schools after two and three years respectively at this school. Mr. Bonde has been appointed to Clarence High School and Mr. Corner-Walker to Sorell District High School.

Miss Ready (Grade 2) is being transferred to South Georgetown Primary School after one year at the school and Mrs. Bennet has been transferred to St. Helens District High School.

We thank these teachers for their contribution and wish them the best in their new schools.

1985 BOOK SALES:

The school will be open for the sale of stationery and payment of levies from 9.30 a.m. until 2.30 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 12th - 14th February.

MOTHERS CLUB - ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING:

The Annual General Meeting of the Mothers Club will be held at 1.30 p.m. on Tuesday, 26th February.

This meeting will discuss and make necessary amendments to the constitution.

Any parent who is interested in the changes can obtain a copy of the constitution with the proposed amendments from the school.

COUNTRY EDUCATION PROGRAMME:

This year, \$46,000 of Country Education funds were spent on projects to help compensate schools in the Fingal Valley and East Coast for the disadvantages which distances from the larger population centres bring.

The programme has benefitted students in the areas of outdoor education, computer awareness, speech therapy, travelling costs, extension work for able students and city orientation for Grade 10 students.

This year, following a submission from the Fingal Valley Community Resource Group, financial assistance was given to students proceeding to Grade 11 in city colleges. It is likely that this type of assistance will continue for 1985 Grade 11 students.

Two of our students and two students from St. Helens participated in student exchanges to King Island, Bendigo and Shepparton following a submission from the Lions Clubs.

\$50,000 will be available for the ensuing year and many of these worthwhile projects will continue. It is also likely that funding will be available to finance the purchase of some musical instruments and the staging of two music camps during 1985. These camps aim to stimulate instrumental work and to enable students to receive further tuition and orchestral experience.

Our thanks to members of the committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Jim Napier for their time and effort during the year.

PARTICIPATION & EQUITY PROGRAMME:

The Commonwealth Government's Participation & Equity Programme aims to encourage young people over the school leaving age to participate in useful and fulfilling education and training activities in schools, colleges and T.A.F.E. and to make special provision for those students who until now have been prevented from participating fully in the benefit of schooling by particular disadvantages.

Our school's submissions were successful in gaining approximately \$8000 for two projects; a creative skills course mainly for girls in the Manual Arts area and a basic education course for a group of Grade 7 to 10 students.

This school has been designated a target school for 1985. Submissions have been forwarded to seek finance for our Grade 10 secondary college familiarisation programme in Launceston and to enable an evaluation of the curriculum offered in this school with a view to possible changes for 1986.

the party to go for help in the event
of an accident. This possibility must
always be borne in mind. Avoid
going alone into wild country.

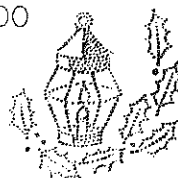

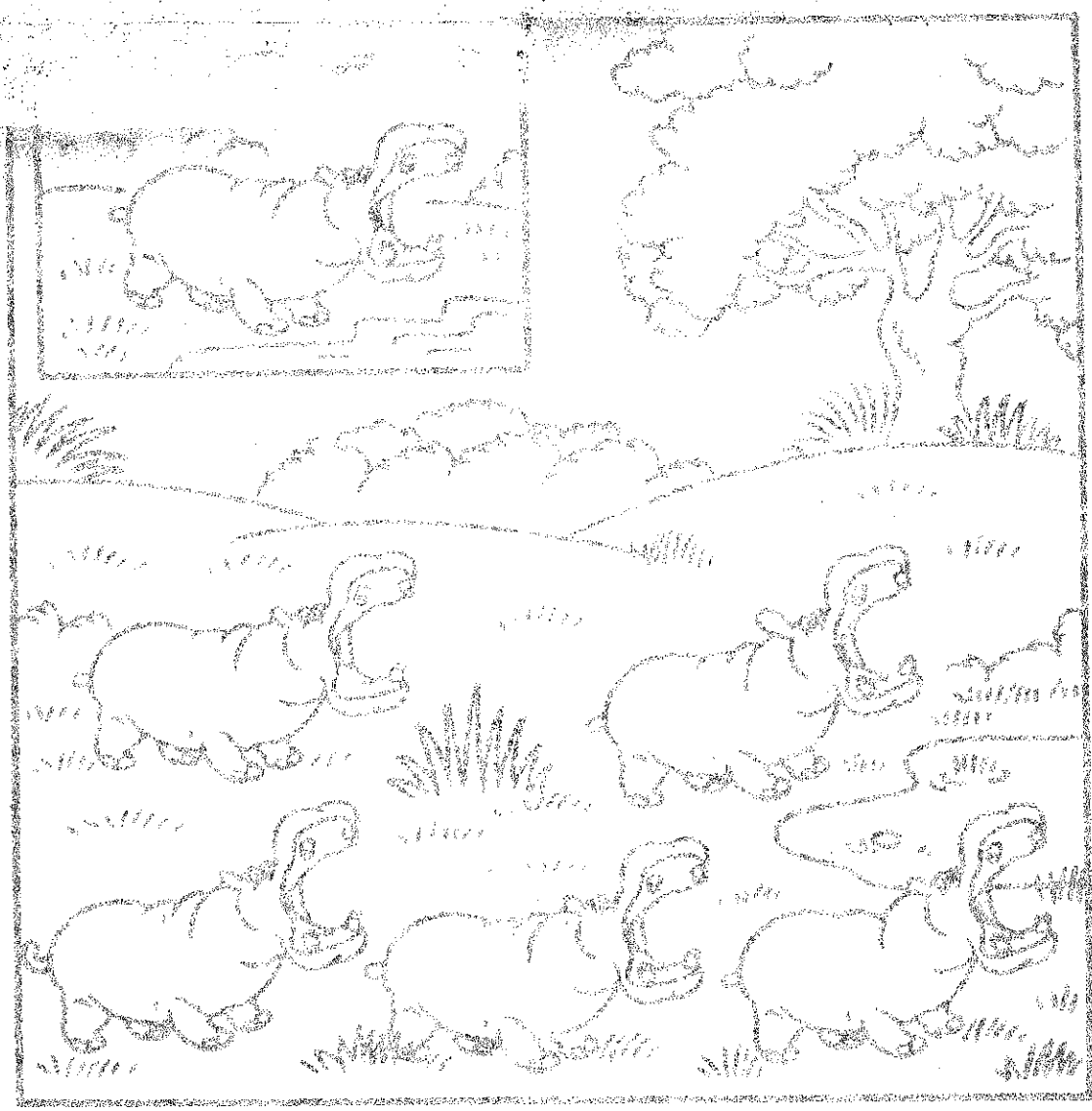

FROM RACT MOTOR NEWS.

New Tasmanian seat belt regulations are intended to ensure that drivers and passengers make the best use of available seat belts and child restraints.

The new regulations require adult passengers and children to sit in a position where there is a seat belt available. If there are not sufficient seat belts available for the number of people in the vehicle, the passengers must fill up the back seat before they sit in a position in the front seat that does not have a seat belt. A child over the age of one and under the age of eight cannot sit in the front unless it is restrained by an approved restraining device. If there is an available child restraint in the car, a child must sit in that restraint. However, if the back seat is full, the child may sit in the front. There is no requirement that child restraints have to be provided. Children are only required to sit in restraints if they are available in the car. If a child restraint is not available, and there is a seat belt available, the seat belt must be used. This is a major change in the requirements. A driver is responsible for the proper restraining of a child under eight years and would be the person fined if a child was not restrained correctly. Children over eight and up to 16 can be summoned and prosecuted through the Childrens Court. It is illegal to carry passengers in the open tray area of a utility or truck. Under the new regulations the penalties for failure to wear a seat belt have been changed from a specific penalty of \$20 to a general penalty with a maximum of \$ 200.

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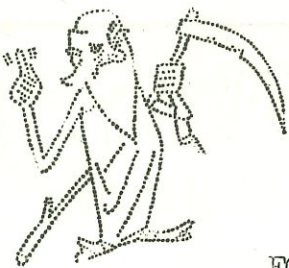
