### YOUS THE LAW

### THE LAW AND ALCOHOL

The Road Safety (Alcohol and Drugs) Act 1970 which deals with drinking and driving says in part:

- (a) a person who has not held a diver's licence for a total period of 12 months is not permitted to drive after drinking alcohol.

  FOR FIRST YEAR DRIVERS THIS PLACES A TOTAL BAN ON DRIVING AFTER DRINKING.
- (b) drivers are guilty of an offence if they drive a motor vehicle when: their blood alcohol is more than .05 per cent.
- (c) a person who drives a vehicle whilst under the influence of alcohol or a drug to such an extent as to be incapable of having proper control of a vehicle is guilty of an offence.
- (d) first year drivers convicted of drink-driving offences will be required to attend a short education course on the dangers of driving after drinking alcohol. Licences will not be restored until the course has been completed.
- (e) a person who refuses to submit to a Breathalyser test or an alcotest (road-side & creening device) or a blood test may be guilty of an offence.
- (f) the drinking of intoxicating liquor by a person in a motor vehicle in motion is prohibited.

A driver, for the purposes of the Act, includes a person intending or attempting to drive.

If a policeman has reasonable grounds to believe that you as a driver is impaired, or you were the driver of a motor car involved in an accident, he may require you to undergo a preliminary breath test. He may also require you to be tested on a Breathalyser.

### RANDOM BREATH TESTING

A police officer can require any person who is driving a motor vehicle on a public street to undergo a breath test. Such a requirement may be regardless of whether the police officer has reason to suspect that the person has consumed intoxicating

liquor.

Drink/driving offences are serious and upon conviction involve a heavy fine, the loss of diver's licence and, in some cases, imprisonment.

Drinking and driving do not mix. You must consider your life and the lives of others.

## COLONEL WILLIAM VINCENT LEGGE "A MAN OF DISTINCTION"

I was rather surprised to hear the late Colonel Legge was born at Cullenswood. I saw quite a lot of him later as a small boy, because he and Mrs. Legge were friends of my parents and I recall being rather overawed by him, his stately and gentlemanly appearance, very stern and rather daunting to a small boy.

He certainly had a distinguished career. He was taken to England and as a boy educated at Bath and later in France and Germany. He passed into the Royal Academy in 1860 and obtained his commission in the Royal Artillery in 1862.

He served with great distinction in England, later served in Melbourne with the Imperial Troops and from 1868 to 1877 served in Caylon now Sri Lanka.

Returning to England he engaged in the work of arming new ports at Portsmouth and Spitshead. He was offered and accepted the position to command the Forces in Tasmania and he was recognised in such matters so highly, he became Commandant a position he held until 1892.

One of his sons, Mr. Robert Legge, managed Cullenswood Estate following his fathers death, later it passed into the hands of his son Mr. Arthur Legge and now his son Mr. Robert Legge manages this fine property.

Colonel Legge left behind him a fine legacy of which little is known, and that applied to his lifelong interest in fauna and flora. He wrote a standard works on "Birds of cont. p 6

## BLACK GOLD BOUTTOUS

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### JUMP STARTING A VEHICLE THE RIGHT WAY

When a vehicle has a flat battery, jump starting is a very useful technique - but there is a right way to do it. Every year people are injured and even blinded by exploding batteries.

batteries. Recently, a motorist couldn't start a Toyota Landcruiser because the battery was flat. He decided that the best way to get it going was to use jump leads from another vehicle; a Landrover. The leads were first connected to both terminals of the Landrover battery, then the positive terminal of the Toyoto's battery. As the negative lead was connected to the negative prainal of the flat battery a spark arced between the clamp and the terminal, and the battery exploded. The motorists fault was in attaching the jump lead to the negative terminal of the dead battery. He should have attached to an earthing point on the chassis or engine. This would have kept any sparks well clear of the battery. Why should a battery explode? Simply, when charged the sulphuric acid in a battery generates hydro-gen and oxygen. These gases explode when ignited. The vents on the battery vent gases away and any arcing at the terminals is sufficient to cause ignition.
The following precautions must be followed when using jump leads on

- (a) Before attaching the leads put out all cigarettes.
- (b) Check the battery fluid level.
- (c) Ensure that both batteries are of the same voltage, and have the same polarity earthed.
- (d) Ensure brakes are on and gears are in 'neutral' or 'park'.
- (e) Ensure the cars are not touching each other.
- (f) Ensure that both ignitions are off, and all accessories are off. This includes closing car doors to switch the passenger courtesy light off.
- (g) Connect the leads up in the following order:
  - Positive terminal dead battery.
  - Positive terminal good battery.
  - Negative terminal good battery,
  - 4. Engine block away from battery,
- (h) After the car has been started

remove the leads in the exact reverse.

In a situation where both vehicles have a positive earth the procedure starts at clamping the jump lead onto the negative terminal of the dead battery. In the previous instructions you swap the positive and negative terminals and follow the same order.

Where one vehicle has a positive earth, and one has a negative earth the following procedure must be used:

- (a) Connect one clamp to the positive terminal of the negative earthed vehicle.
- (b) Connect the other end of the same cable to the positive terminal of the positively earthed vehicle.
- (c) Connect one end of the second cable to the negative terminal of the positively earthed vehicle.
- (d) Connect the other end of the second cable to the engine block of the vehicle.

The use of these simple procedures will ensure that you will not be injured or perhaps blinded in an easily prevented accident.
