GIVE THE H.E.C. A "FAIR GO ".

In the Examiner (Friday Feb 1) Mr John MacKinnon publicly launched an attack on the H.E.C. regarding a Coal Fired Power Station in the Fingal Valley.

The concerned residents of the Fingal Valley appear to be the well established land owners who are fearful of possible water pollution, the loss of a few dollars and a drop in rural land values.

According to local fishermen the rivers in the Valley are already polluted by the farmers themselves with their aerial crop dusting, pesticides and insecticides, that when used, find their way through the soil and into the rivers.

Some of these properties span enormous acreage, and these people are afraid that their annual income and lifestyle would be at risk. I wonder if they ever count their blessings!

Whilst they enjoy their numerous land holdings, beautiful homes and privileged life styles, do they take time to spare a thought for the large percentage of families in the small hamlets along the Valley who are trying to survive on and under the poverty line.

A recent publication of the "Valley People", written by Dr. Jim Marwood, illustrates the hardship and the struggle of some of these honest and hardworking people who have had to strive and battle to feed their families. These people do not complain, but go on striving to achieve some small goal in life.

The railway has been drastically reduced, thus creating retrenchments to some of these families. The Coal Mine is virtually a closed shop for employment. The businesses cannot employ staff in great quantities.

Why shouldn't these people and their families have a goal, incentive and motivation which an industry in this Valley would provide?

It's about time the Fingal Valley had something to offer in the way of employment.

Perhaps the H.E.C. employees will be looking for future jobs and adding to the growth of our huge unemployment sector.

The Franklin River project was effectively and dramatically halted. Will this happen in the Fingal Valley?

Will the Tasmanian Government be "bought off" by a handful of affluent land owners or will justice be done and progress for the benefit of most of the Valley residents be achieved. This is 1985! Do we want Nuclear Power in Tasmania??

Think about it!! Do something constructive to make this Coal Fired Thermal Power Station be constructed here in the Fingal Valley.

If Conara doesn't want it - St. Marys will have it!!

Local employment is vital to OUR Valley people, and there is no need for Tasmania to use mainland power.

At a public meeting held at St. Marys in July 1983, a unanimous decision in favor of a Coal Fired Thermal Power Station was relayed to the Premier, provided all environmental requirements were met.

This would suggest that the feeling of the meeting could only convey the fact that this is the one and only hope the valley has ever had of enjoying any type of industry for many years, and the only hope of fostering future employment.

If a Thermal Power Station is not constructed, what will the valley have to offer in the future?

We have the coal deposits here, so let's utilize an industry that will compliment our area.
