*LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

I am writing this letter in the hope of warning people of some of the hidden dangers of a coal fired power station.

We enjoy a basically natural environment in the Fingal Valley. To change it into an industrial area would be progress at a price. It could not be reversed.

To infer that people who oppose the coal fired power station in the valley are shortsighted is like the pot calling the kettle black. If ever there was a blinkered view on the benefits a power station would bring to the valley it was the one expressed in last week's Valley Voice.

Some people are prepared to welcome a power station in the valley without the benefit of an environmental impact study, without any concern that it may risk serious damage to the South Esk river system, cause air pollution in a relatively small valley where gases and dust will be trapped by the inversion layer, especially in winter, and affect the health of people in the whole valley.

Most of us live here because of what the valley is now, not because we want to change it into some mini Latrobe Valley. Historically, mining communities have always had fluctuating fortunes. Ultimately we will have to accept electricity generated in nuclear power stations and that is closer than we think. Where would our prosperity based on coal mining be then?

When Rossarden was in full production the work force was similar in number to the projected workforce needed to operate this proposed power station. Economic activity and community services were not so vastly different then!

No responsible person would wish for young people to be without jobs, but to solve the problem by spending \$500 million on the off chance we could sell the power is an

To accept it without question is naive.

There are many more questions to be answered before I would live alongside a coal fired power station. There is more nuclear radiation from a coal fired power station than a nuclear power station.

Scientists worldwide are concerned about the impact on the environment of burning coal in huge quantities and releasing CO₂ into the atmosphere.

Commonly called the "Greenhouse Effect" it is a fact that since 1958 atmospheric CO₂ has increased by 6.3%. If we double the load of CO₂ in the atmosphere in the next 60 to 70 years, the effects could be disastrous for the world climate.

CO₂ acts as a one way filter, letting in visible light waves from the sun. But when they strike the earth they are converted into longer infra-red waves. CO₂ is nearly opaque to infra-red heat. Other things being equal, the earth and its lower atmosphere should grow warmer. You can imagine what would happen to some of the world's largest cities if the polar ice cap began to melt.

We have a clean environment here. Let's keep it that way.

CORNWALL CHURCH

History of Church of the Good Shepherd - Cornwall. The Parishioners of Cornwall began fund raising in 1939. According to a Balance Sheet which I have the first entry was £25 (pounds). Over the war years nothing was added only the interest. People were too busy raising money for the war. By 1951 we received a 1/4 of the profits from a fair £26.12.0 - we now had £59.9.9. Funds really began to build - share of Parish Fairs, Euchre Tournaments, American Teas. We now had £360.9.8. The committee under the late Mr. W.H. Haas as chairman, Mr. Percy Llewellyn as Secretary & Mrs. M. Targett as Treasurer began to build. The Reverend Titley asked people to give £5.0.0 a head - many not Anglican's donated. Mr. Jack Spilsbury acted as collector for the miners. Most gave the money at 2/6 a time. These collections bought in £184.3.0. We were donated Grey Church; and German Town Church £130.0.0. The church was build by voluntary labour under the supervision of a Mr. Gamble who received the princely some of £55.0.0. As we had the money we bought the materials scrounging what we could. Our doors came from the St. Marys District Hospital when they were renovating. Part of the old Church lined the present church and furnishings are still being used. Since 1960 the Mothers' Union has stained and sealed the floor, added the Altar Cloths, carpeted the back room and many other items.

SMOKING HABITS

Don't allow anyone in your family to smoke in bed.
