SOCIAL SECURITY

ACCOMMODATION - Aged persons homes

The Commonwealth Government subsidises throughout the State, organisations which provide accommodation for the aged. Pensioners should apply directly to the home that interests them.

Contact: Your nearest Social Security office for details of the locations of homes.

State Housing Department

The State Housing Department provides special pensioner units at a low rental in a number of areas. Some units especially adapted for disabled persons are available.

The Department also administers the "Granny Flats" scheme and operates a hostel for disabled persons in Battery Point. In addition, the Department has money available through Commonwealth funding to subsidise the rent of some pensioners who are renting private accommodation while awaiting process of application for State housing. Single people are entitled to register for assistance.

First Home Owners Scheme

The Commonwealth Government's new First Home Owners Scheme has been set up to help people buying a first home. The scheme is open to all first home buyers who meet an income test. To qualify you can be single, engaged, married or living together as man and wife with or without children. The income test is based on your taxable income in the financial year before the year in which you bought your home. In special circumstances, a different year's income may be tested.

The income limits are \$24,300 - \$27,900. If your combined taxable income is less than \$24,300 (i.e. about \$470 per week) a full grant can be paid. If your income is more than \$27,900 (about \$540 per week) no grant is paid. The amount of grant also depends on the number of children you have.

The Scheme gives you a choice of being paid in a lump sum or being subsidised over five years. If you are eligible you will be paid:

- up to \$5000 over five years if you do not have dependent children.
- up to \$7000 over five years if you have two or more dependent children.

If you lodge an application when you sign the contract on your home, payment of the grant will be made in time for settlement. If needed, you can get an approval advice which can be given to your lender, so that assistance from the First Home Owners Scheme can be taken into account when he is approving your finance.

COMPUTERS IN THE PRIMARY AREA

Computers in schools have the potential to introduce effective new teaching methods. A central principle underlying an approach to the use of computers in the classroom is that learning should focus student attention on the relevant aspects of the learning task. Thus there is a need for appropriate ways for the student to use a computer in each application - ways which are simple and which are compatible with the students abilities, which suit the learning task and which do not distract attention from this task.

The emphasis for the use of computers in the primary area needs to be on education requirements. Computer-based exercising in areas such as:

- reading
- writing
- mathematics - tables, numbers, basic operations
- social science

Computers can provide a supportive learning environment in which the student can work independently and feel comfortable and secure.

The student can practise a particular skill in a number of areas of the curriculum - fractions, spelling, mapping skills.

By working through exercises in simple steps with computer guidance and support from the teacher, students can move on to interesting material earlier than with much more traditional methods.

For students conditioned to failure, the radically different appearance of a computer-based exercise gives an opportunity for a fresh start.

At first the novelty of the computer helps. However, the power of the computer medium goes much deeper than this.

Video Games

These can be regarded as highly structured learning environments which motivate players to develop the very specific skill of achieving a high score. Many of the principles underlying the success of these games can be used in Computer-based teaching. Video games can be a valuable introduction to the computer for many students.

The larger role however that the computer has in the primary area is that of Computer Assisted Learning (C.A.L.).

C.A.L. will include such things as:

- individualized, self paced learning
- immediate response and knowledge of results
- patient, tireless tutoring, drilling (such as tables)
- repetitive tasks
- simulation possibilities in a wide variety of areas that save time and equipment

Many of these things are not unique to computers of course. Newspapers, videos, cassettes, magazines, learning kits can do these things.

The computer provides the opportunity for all of these things to occur from the one source thus assisting learning for the child in a more meaningful and direct way.

Equipment

The main requirements of equipment in the primary area are that it is robust, reliable, inexpensive, simple to operate and preferably portable. For these reasons the B.B.C. has been recommended by the Education Department for use in primary schools.

Some CAL packages aim to minimise teacher involvement but the best approach (our school in particular) recognises that teachers know a lot about students' educational needs and learning styles. Therefore very careful selection is made of CAL material before students get to work with them.

The best results are achieved when teachers are actively involved and understand the strengths and limitations of computer-based exercises compared with conventional teaching methods.

We see this involvement being primarily in the preparation and selection of curriculum materials, rather than in the mechanics of exercise presentation and the workings of the computer itself.

Our aim is not to provide a substitute teacher but to increase their effectiveness by giving them a sophisticated and powerful new teaching tool to exploit.

FINGAL VALLEY ANNUAL REPORT - MEALS ON WHEELS

Mr. Warden, Mr. Shaw, M.L.C., Mr. Salter, M.H.A.,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is again my pleasure to present a short report on the activities of the Meals on Wheels association for this area.

This year the Meals service has functioned smoothly, with some 3,222 meals being delivered for the year, a slight drop from 3,315 last year.

The price for meals has been increased to \$1.20 from the 1st January 1981, which is the State Government recommended price, and is adjusted annually with rate of pension adjustments.

The Meals on Wheels organisation is in a sound financial position and we are able to make donations of \$200. each to the State Meals on Wheels Association, and to the Bush Fire Appeal for Victoria and South Aust. We were also again able to present to each recipient of meals with a Christmas cake and a small gift to mark the festive season. This action was very much appreciated, and to acknowledge the assistance given by the St. Marys Lions Club for supply of the cakes.

As has been mentioned in previous reports we are indeed fortunate to have a hospital based service to supply meals. The costs involved with preparing meals in non hospital based areas are much higher with the upkeep of kitchen facilities, equipment and other costs that we do not have.

The smooth operation of the service is a tribute to the members of the Committee, and I particularly refer to the Secretary, Mr. Jack Miller, and the Treasurer, Mr. Les Rubenach and Marion Lavelle who see to the day to day matters. I would like to thank the Committee members for their interest and support, and I know that they feel that they are rewarded in the knowledge that they are assisting with a very worthwhile community service, and lastly, and perhaps most importantly I would thank the many drivers who willingly give their time and effort to see that needy people are supplied with a meal that is important to their general health and welfare.
