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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

As a person who spent the first seventeen years of life at Cornwall, and having to leave the district like thousands of other teenagers in the valley, I wish to comment on the proposed Coal Fired Thermal Power station and its effects on the valley.

In the 1979 Report to Parliament on the Gordon below Franklin Hydro development, a coal fired Power Station was discussed as an option to the dam. The options discussed were a 2x200 Mega Watt station or the conversion of Bell Bay to coal firing. Only the Premiercoast road is constructed. Mr Robin Gray knows why Bell Bay was dropped as an option when an H.E.C. report stated that by convert a group of people who think that ing Bell Bay to coal firing would bring about a reduction in stack (chimney) emissions, this mainly being due to the use of low Sulphur content Fingal Valley Coal, instead of the High Sulphur content imported Arabian bunker oil.

The proposed station with two generators capable of producing 200 Mega Watts each would produce the following employment opportunities in a job starved valley, (Figures from the 1979 report to Parliament)

Operating & Maintenance staff, 1x200 MWstation, 70 jobs. Mine development, average 270jobs over three years. Mine operation, 2x200 MWstation, 430 jobs and there would be 600 indirect induced employment opportunities. The station life would be thirty years and its annual coal requirements would be 1,100,000 tonnes or

The physical development and expansion of the Fingal Valley would be the greatest ever, since the foundation of the valley and would bring prosperity to the majority.

two mines each producing 3700tonnes

per day.

Take for instance the sure signs of a once more prosperous St. Marys which have now disappeared. Things that I remember are:
A picture theatre, two Hotels, a variety shop, three butchers shops, a swimming pool, a fuel supply depot, a cheese factory, a saw mill, and the Jubileecoal mine, A district Hospital that functioned as a hospital (no disrespect intended for the Hospital's current function), a practising chemist's shop, a busy railway station a chip log loading yard, the St. Marys show, and things can get worse, particularly when the missing link

It now appears that there are their own little dynasties will be threatened by a Thermal Power station. They believe economic and environmental ruination is the only outcome of such a station in the valley.

It is also interesting to note that many of these people are the affluent land owners, a few may be members of the Fingal Council and have used their influence in Council to oppose the scheme. It is also probable that these people are members of the Fingal Valley branch of the Liberal Party who also oppose the Thermal station.

By comparison to other coalfired Thermal Power stations in Australia the proposed 2x200 MW station is a mere baby, and should not be compared to the massive Yallourn Wor Lou Yang in Victoria. If the quality of H.E.C. equipment purchases come up to the normal standard, then the Fingal Valley residents can be assured that emission control equipment will be installed to reduce to a minimum any airborne 'pollution'.

I think many people have con-cluded the chimney of a thermal power station will belch black smoke that will surround the station and environs; this is just not so.

Today many people would find it difficult to believe that a modern thermal power station is operating by looking at its chimney.

You will hear cries of "but what about acid rain?" Acid rain is caused by a chimney emission mixing with water vapour in the atmosphere and forming acid rain when it rains. Due to the extremely low sulphur content of Fingal Valley coal, chimney emissions of sulphur dioxide would be very minimal, its effect would be also minimised by the smallness of the proposed station. The oil used at the Bell Bay Thermal Station is four to five times higher in sulphur content that Fingal Valley coal.

Ash disposal will be another catch cry of the station's opponents.

We won't be able to move for mountains of ash, and ash settling ponds". In the U.K. ash from power stations is an industry within itself. It is processed to remove the glass-like particles it contains, to be used in industry. Ash is used in the construction of highways, mainly as the road base. Reclamation of land to useful purposes, paddocks, playing fields and parks as well as back fill in worked out areas of the mines.

In well over 100 years, Tasmanian industry has burnt millions of tons of coal, and as yet I have not witnessed any of its so called devastating effects caused by the burning of that coal. Gone are the days of chimney belching black smoke. Technology has allowed coal to become a clearner burning fuel.

I have not noted any paddocks or forests overcome by acid rain, neither have I seen cat or dog, sheep nor cow, neither piles of ash, nor any persons permanently injured by the effects of burning these millions of tons of Tasmanian coal in industry. If any major damage were to come from burning coal in a relatively small power station in the Fingal Valley, do you not think that any harmful signs of damage to the environment would have shown up in the past hundred years of coal burning within this state?

Having seen during 1981, the modern power stations in the Hunter Valley N.S.W., and having lived within ten minutes walk of the elderly Newport (Vic) power station, I can say that with proper landscaping, many people will have to look twice to notice a modern power station.

I find it remarkable that early in the piece, public meetings to support a Fingal Valley Thermal Power Station were enthusiastically organised and attended, but now it appears a defeatist attitude has been invoked into the station's supporters by pressure from the station's opponents.

One thing is for sure, the opponents of the station could not provide ten extra jobs in the valley, let alone 1100 permanent and indirect jobs, nor can they provide the growth that will come to the valley with the building of this station.

History has shown this.

The Fingal Valley residents cannot expect a ten million dollar gift of State money to maintain growth and expand employment in the region when a few dollars can't be found to upgrade parts of the Esk highway.

For far too long political parties on both sides have failed to recognise the value of the Fingal Valley coal fields in the past and have in fact provided the valley with very little funding compared to the value of the coal fields to Tas.

For instance, why not put Tasmanians in jobs by burning Fingal Valley coal rather than employing Arabs by burning Arabian or Middle East oil at the Bell Bay station?

There is a need to become more organised with meetings of support of coal fired thermal power, simply to show you are not defeated. Don't let the affluent stand over what may be the only chance of new prosperity for the valley, that prosperity could well be employment for you and your children. Voice your opinion or you may never be heard. For a future the valley needs growth.

Support your local industry by supporting a Coal Fired Thermal Power Station.



Parents who permit their children to ride to and from school on public streets should ensure that their children are well voiced in relation to the regulations that Pedal Cyclists must obey.

Pedal Cyclists must obey the same regulations as motor vehicle drivers. In addition they must:-

- * only ride single file
- * not take both hands from the handle bars at the same time
- * not be towed by another vehicle
- * not ride on a footpath except when there is a sign indicating a bikeway or shared footpath
- * not carry more persons than the number for which the cycle is designed.
- * have lights at night (white light to the front and red light and reflector at the rear)
- * have the lower half of the rear mudguard painted white
- * have an efficient bell or other warning device
- * have an efficient brake fitted


