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DRESTRY IN TASMANIA

The Draft Environmental Impact Statement underlines the importance of the forest-based industries, directly and indirectly, for the Tasmanian economy.

We Tasmanians having long been aware of the value of our fine hardwood forests as an industrial resource, and given the present economic climate, the importance of encouraging the development of our local industries.

An important consideration then, is the regeneration and reaforest-ation policies that will ensure that our forest-based industries will continue to represent a significant sector of our economy in the future.

The Report endorses the practice of clear-felling and the presence of the woodchip companies in the Tasmanian forests. However, it acknowled-ges the need to establish strict guidelines to govern future logging operations in order to ensure the preservation of top soil and the areas of water catchment and the protection of flora and fauna.

The Forestry Commission recently expressed its concern that over a fifth of private forests logged in Tasmania were not being regenerated or converted to pasture and thus were contributing to the problem of soil erosion in Tasmania.

This report also highlighted the widespread concern of many Tasmanians that we may be selling our valuable resources too cheaply.

Could more jobs be generated in Tasmania by allowing for increased processing within the State? Are the fine furniture and fuelwood industries being accorded the levels of encouragement they deserve?

The reassessment of the role of our forest industries will need to take place on several fronts. conservation lobby groups recognise the importance of woodchip and forest based industries to the Tasmanian economy. These groups represent the growing awareness of Tasmanians as to the recreational value of our forests and also our awareness of the importance of environmental preservation to ensure that future Tasmanians enjoy a high quality of life.

We are faced with a watershed concerning the forest based industries in Tasmania; in the immediate months ahead important decisions must be made regarding harvesting levels, conservation measures, the maintenance and the expansion of harvesting and regeneration of Tas-manian forests will continue to accrue greater environmental and economical benefits for all Tasmanians.

New legislation such as the proposed Forest Practices Bills will not only reassure the community but will ensure that excesses of irresponsible forest operators be curbed.

ENDURANCE RIDING.

> By Tim McManus, Veterinary Officer, Dept. of Agriculture.

From time to time media publicity is given to endurance rides in Tasmania and elsewhere. Often reports on such events mention that a particular horse was "vetted out" before, during or after the ride.

What does this mean, and how does a supervising veterinarian decide that a competing animal must be withdrawn?

As might be expected, surveillance commences with a pre-ride check. If possible this should be done the day before the event.

It involves a thorough inspection of the horse, first unsaddled and at rest, and then at a trot and canter to observe if any signs of lameness exist.

While at rest the animal's pulse, temperature and respiration rate ere recorded to ensure it is fit to start, and also as a check against elevations later on. Age is also assessed because only horses more than 5 years old are permitted to compete.

Any indication of girth or saddle galls is noted. These can flare up during a ride in much the same way as blisters do on the heels of human long-distance runners. And of course the horse's feet and shoes are given close attention, for obvious reasons.

Assuming everything is satisfactory and it usually is because owners know well enough the futility of attempting endurance events with unsound mounts - The next inspection will be at a check point during the ride.

Here procedures are followed that are designed to establish which horses are fit to proceed and which, due to impending exhaustion or lameness, must be "vetted out".

In this latter event the supervising veterinarian's decision is final. Any disregard by a rider of a disqualification order in an endurance ride will be countered by police intervention.

Experienced riders know this of course and although veterinary checks present auxious moments, competitors usually accept the outcome graciously. Where there is no lameness or other apparent external injury, heart rate is used as the main criterion for assessing fitness to proceed. If a horse's heart rate is still above 55 beats per minute, 30 minutes after arrival at a check point, then it must be disqualified.

"Tasmanians wishing to make a maintenance claim under the new provisions should contact the Australian Legal Aid offices.
"Forty three countries are new linked by the Convention and include the UK, Italy, Greece, the Netherlands and Yugoslavia."
