PARTICIPATION AND EQUITY PROGRAMME P.E.P.:

P.E.P. is a Commonwealth Government funded scheme which aims to provide an equal opportunity for education to all Australian children for full secondary school (beyond Grade 10) and, specifically, to retain students who would otherwise end their formal education at Grade 10 due to isolation, economic problems, lack of motivation and lack of knowledge of what is available.

Towards this end, Mrs. Jenny Thorp has been appointed to review the school curriculum and to ascertain means of encouraging students to continue their education beyond Grade 10.

Mrs. Thorp is anxious to talk with parents and interested members of the community individually or in small groups. She would also like to talk with community groups or representatives of those groups so that a fair case can be prepared.

Mrs. Thorp will not be at the school every day as her task will involve considerable travel and documentation. The school will, however, know her timetable a week in advance. So, if you would like to talk with her, please contact the school to arrange a convenient time.

COMPUTER CLUB:

The next Computer Club meeting will be held at this school on Tuesday, 7th May at 7.00 p.m.

A high-resolution colour monitor and Microbee voice synthesiser will be available.

The club is not just for "programmers" but also for other adults and students who are interested in gaining an understanding of computers.

THE SCHOOL CERTIFICATE:

The School Certificate is issued to most students at the end of Year 10. Some students who do not complete four years of secondary schooling can get Preliminary awards.

A few schools have chosen not to enter their students for the School Certificate or to enter them in a very limited number of subjects.

The Certificate shows the degree of difficulty of the syllabus a student follows - the LEVEL, and how successful the student has been in studying it - the AWARD.

Three levels are provided in most subjects:

Level III, the most advanced, is taken by about one-quarter of students.

Level II, is taken by about one-half of students.

Level I, is taken by about one-quarter of students.

Students can get one of four awards at each level of study:

- C Credit (top 10-20% at the level)
- H Higher Pass (the next 10-20%)
- P Pass (50-60% at the level)
 L Lower Pass (10-20% at the
- L Lower Pass (10-20% at the level)

In December of their School Certificate year students get a RESULT SLIP which gives a brief statement of the awards their School Certificate will contain. The Result Slip shows all the subjects in which a student has been assessed including any in which no award (N) has been gained although such subjects will not appear on the certificate.

*Preliminary Awards (P) are g given at appropriate levels to students who do not complete Year 10.

The School Certificate records assessments made in the school by the students' own teachers. A system of regional meetings of teachers is used by the Schools Board to set and maintain comparable standards between schools. These meetings are made up of teachers in a subject from each school in the region with senior teachers of the subject in the chair. The work of the various regional groups is coordinated at State level by an experienced person in the subject area.

Many different methods are used to achieve comparable results and the Schools Board always encourages subject teachers to develop more efficient procedures.

The following statistics underscore the enormity of the problem:

* Approx. 5,000 new cases of blindness caused by diabetic retinopathy are estimated to occur each year in the United States alone.

* Fifty percent of all patients with diabetes have retinopathy ten years

after diagnosis.
* More than 80 per cent of diabetics have some form of retinopathy 15

years after diagnosis.

In support of the Lions Clubs International Diabetes Awareness Program, LCIF has granted over US\$500,000 for diabetic retinopthy research since 1982.
