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## PET FOOD AND THE BUTCHER'S SHOP

A few weeks ago a Hobart butcher was asked by a customer to sell her some liver for her dog. She claimed she had been advised to feed liver to the dog for therapeutic purposes.

Fortunately, the butcher, who incidentally has a hydatid poster prominently displayed in his shop, was concerned enough to ring the Department of Agriculture about this strange request. He didn't think our no-offal policy had changed but he wanted to be sure.

So, just in case anyone else is uncertain or labouring under any misapprehension, this is the situation clearly and unmistakably.

Offal is the insides of dead animals. It includes the intestines, heart, lungs, liver, kidneys and brains.

Regardless of where it is obtained, be it butchers shop, killing shed, farmers paddock, or the family dining table, the feeding to domestic pets of any offal emanating from sheep, cattle, pigs, goats or horse is strictly forbidden.

And, as the reference to the dining table implies, this ban covers both cooked or raw offal, yes, even if it's from a lambs fry or kidney bought in a butchers shop.

In fact, further investigation of the matter referred to at the beginning of this broadcast revealed that the customer was under the impression that abattoir meat inspection, coupled with the decline in the level of cysts in slaughtered sheep, had reduced the hydatid risk to a negligible degree.

Actually, it could well be that the opposite applies because it's when disease levels decline that people become careless or apathetic, as is evidenced in human medicine by the alarming increase in the number of unvaccinated children in the community.

This is not a reflection on meat inspectors because often the cysts are small and hidden deep in the liver tissue where it's difficult or even impossible to spot them without destroying the fry completely.

So I repeat, it is illegal to feed any liver to your dog or cat unless it has been processed commercially in a can.

Perhaps some readers don't realise why this must be, and why the Department of Agriculture becomes so upset when we hear of breaches of our offal-feeding regulations.

In the past, hydatid disease in Tasmania has caused numerous human deaths and countless major surgical operations, and still does on the mainland.

For the last 16 years or so, the Department of Agriculture and the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council, or THEC as it's known, have been waging an expensive and active campaign to, hopefully, eradicate hydatid disease from this island.

The crux of the programme has been to break the life cycle of the tapeworm concerned - called *Echinococcus granulosus*.

The only host of adult *Echinococcus granulosus* tapeworms in Tasmania is the domestic dog. Marsupials, including Tasmanian devils, are not involved in the hydatid life cycle.

The intermediate stage of the two stage cycle is the cyst which can occur in the offal of any domestic animal.

The adult tapeworm lives in the small intestine of the dog and the only way it can get there is by feeding offal containing viable cysts - the intermediate stages in other words.

Once upon a time, whenever a sheep was killed on a farm the offal was immediately thrown to the waiting dogs; that's why we had such a high incidence of the disease.

A single hydatid tapeworm in a dog's bowel can lay 500 eggs every fortnight. It isn't, or wasn't, unusual for one dog to be harbouring hundreds or even thousands of adult echinococcus.

When it is realised that each one of their thousands of eggs is capable of becoming a cyst if ingested by a sheep, cow or human, etc., it's not surprising that 20 years ago at least one person a week went to hospital for hydatid surgery.

**MAX BURR. PRESS RELEASE.**

"As I travel around the Wilmot electorate I find that there are many close knit communities in which some special person stands out for recognition, 'Mr. Burr (Wilmot MHR) said.

"It can be in any area such as child welfare, helping the elderly or creating a centre where life is improving because of its existence.

"I have also heard people say that some person should be rewarded for the untiring and unpaid work he or she has put into the community.

"This can be done under Australian honors and awards procedures."

Mr. Burr said that anyone could nominate a person for an Australian award and such nominations could be sent through his office.

"A nomination should contain a comprehensive record of the nominee's service, achievement and particular endeavour in the community in general," he said.

"The Council for the Order of Australia needs all necessary details to identify a nominee such as home address, occupation, proof of Australian citizenship and date of birth.

"The nomination has to be supported by credible referees who would qualify the work done by the nominee and also provide information about the nominees work within the community.

"People who are not Australian citizens can also be nominated.

"If anyone feels that there is somebody in the community whose efforts should be rewarded by an honor, my office can supply the necessary application forms," Mr. Burr said.

**IN A FURTHER PRESS RELEASE.**

Mr. Burr (Wilmot MHR) warned that as bank notes begin to represent increased money values it pays to know how banks judged their worth.

"The person who gets a mutilated note in the change should understand that the banks will not necessarily give full value for it," he said.

"This can be quite a shock if you have just been given a damaged fifty dollar note.

"The full value of the note is usually given if you have at least two thirds of the note.

"If it is only about half the note and less than two thirds the bank will only give you half its value.

"In other cases full value can be paid against smaller pieces if evidence can prove where the rest of it is.

"It's all a matter of the bank's determination and, in 1983, nearly 2,400 claims were placed before the Reserve bank for determination.

"If you want to play it safe it's best to check you have all the note before accepting it," Mr. Burr said.

## COMPUTER SOFTWARE IN THE PRIMARY SCHOOL

The use of computer equipment and materials in our school depends to a great extent on the type of software available.

Generally speaking educational software has been designed to assist in teaching a topic, be used as an extension, or to enrich more conventional teaching approaches.

### Areas of Application for Computer Software:

Drill and Practice - this provides repetitive skill-building practice, a reinforcement mechanism for students who require additional work in a specific topic.

Games - games programs can promote additional learning and hand-eyes co-ordination.

### Information Retrieval

These types of packages provide information on a particular topic and provides the user with the means to investigate the data, to classify it, sort out and to report on it.

The user (teacher and student) works with information (data) supplied on the disk rather than providing material themselves.

Other programs such as FACTFILE will provide opportunities for this.

### Simulation

These types of programs provide approximation of the real world via computer programs.

Within education, the major use of this comes:

- to allow a student to role play by establishing an empathy with a particular character.
- assuming a specific role and taking control to produce a pre-determined outcome.
- to experiment with different courses of action to extend the

range and sophistication of that experiment and then to examine the outcome.

In both cases the programme uses a distinct model to approximate reality.

Examples of this:- 747 pilot  
Space Shuttle  
Aviator

## Teachers Support

Here the computer is used as a tool to generate student activity work. Programs such as crosswords (language and maths) and word puzzles are included in this area.

## Tutorial

A programme that provides the user with information. A variety of options may be presented to the user and the user has to select the desired option.

The role of the computer is similar to other visual aid devices.

Application Package - word processing, data bases and electronic spreadsheets are examples of application packages that assist in the production of documents, accounting and information handling.

Software should contain documentation so that using the package in the classroom is as easy as possible.

This should include, teachers notes explaining how the programme is started, the education objectives, the level for which it is suitable, introductory activities and follow up activities.

Students provide notes for activities relating to the package.

This will not always be the case depending on the type of programme. Student notes may be appropriate for stimulation but not for drill or practice.

Some important questions that need to be answered are:  
(by the teacher, will this material fit into an existing syllabus?) Will the programme motivate the user? Does the programme develop concepts in a manner consistent with your teaching style and/or your educational philosophy?

Is the programme adaptable to a variety of teaching situations and different users?

Is the degree of difficulty of the programme appropriate for the intended user? Does the programme allow the students to interact, or is it simply a passive demonstration over which students have little control? Is the screen display easy to read?

Can the students use the programme with recourse to the teacher? Does the programme continually access the disk as the programme progresses? Does the programme provide diagnostic assistance to the user if they cannot proceed past a particular segment of the programme.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE SLICE

$\frac{1}{2}$ lb melted butter
