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FARS FOR THE DEAF

Lions International are working to meet the challenge of the ever increasing human needs in a world filled with crippling diseases, drug and alcohol abuse and poverty which starves both body and spirit.

Many of us are aware of the sight saving programs that Lions take part In(the Lions Eye Diagnostic Centre in Hobart) but how many of us know about the Lions Hearing Dog Program?

Dogs are trained for each person to their individual needs, and to react to such things as a baby crying, a smoke alarm, an alarm clock, unfamiliar sounds which may indicate danger, or some other need of the deaf owner. The dogs are trained to let the owner know where the need for attention is, by nudging them and running back and forth to the location of the sound until the owner knows its source. These dogs are trained in Adelaide.

At least 800,000 people in Australia suffer the disability of deafralla suffer the disability of deafness. Of these, approximately
30,000 are severely handicapped.
Deafness is an invisible handicap,
vet a very real one, and can greatly
inhibit active participation in the
mainstream of life.

Communities are often unaware of the special needs of deaf residents. Hearing Dogs Inc., launched with the aid of a US\$30,000 Lions Club International Foundation grant, is an organisation that trains the dogs to assist the deaf in their daily lives, The dogs act as "ears" for the deaf in much the same way as guide dogs "see" for the blind.

The Lions of Multiple District 201 in Australia and Papua New Guinea (which includes Tasmania) initiated the program, which is the first one Consequently, the funds Lions of its kind outside the United States. donate to LCIF are mot simply used In a building which simulates the conditions of a regular home and

office, the dogs are given a three month training course. This unique program will also save the lives of many unwanted dogs. While seeing eye dogs are mostly labradors, hearing dogs for the deaf can be of any breed, and are recruited from the South Australian Animal

Welfare League's home and council

run pounds.

Hearing Dogs Inc. helps about 80 people a year. In addition, thanks to the efforts of Multiple District 201, federal and state governments in Australia are in the process of amending legislation to permit hearing dogs to travel in public transportation and enter public buildings - the same rights enjoyed by guide dogs for the

The Multiple District Council believes that since this project represents a very real and practical way to help a disadvantaged section of the community that is frequently overlooked, Hearing Dogs Inc. will become one of the most significant

projects it has ever undertaken.

Now a word about LCIF. Everytime
Lions Club International Foundation makes a grant, someone is given an opportunity. To a blind person, it might be the opportunity to see. To the unskilled and unemployed it could mean the opportunity of a job. To the victims of a natural disaster it means the opportunity to rebuild. When LCIF was formed in 1968, it

was primarily a shared concern for humanity that tied together the members of Lions Clubs International. Now 17 years later, the 1.3 Million Lions who work together through LCIF have shown that their capacity for service is almost limitless.

LCIF-supported projects are effective and successful. reason: Lions know their communities. They understand the problems and what causes them, and this enables Lions to attack those problems at the roots.

as charity. They are used to support projects that are carefully planned, and that by addressing the sources of problems, offer solutions that help people gain greater inde-pendence. These are long-term

solutions with long-term benefits.
In effect, what the beneficiaries of LCIF grants receive are oppor-

DIVISION OF ROAD SAFETY

SEAT BELT LAWS

Traffic Regulations governing the restraint of children and seat belts for adults provide that:

*children up to 12 months old must

use an approved child restraint* if available in the vehicle or travel in the back seat; *children aged 1 to 8 years must use an approved child restraint* or a seat belt. If neither is available a child must travel in the back seat (unless the back seat is full); *any restraint worn by a child must be properly adjusted and securly fastened; *the driver is responsible for ensuring that children under 8 years are properly restrained; children over 8 years are regarded as adult passengers and must use, seat belts if they are available; *the maximum penalty for failing to comply with the regulations is \$200 DONT MAKE THE MISTAKE OF BELIEVING THAT BECAUSE YOUR CHILD RIDES IN THE BACK SEAT A CHILD RESTRAINT OR SEAT BELT IS NOT NECESSARY. The truth is that when a child is not strapped in, the back seat is not much safer than the front. Even at slow speed, in a collision or a sudden stop, your child will be flung about like a rag doll. need to be restrained Children wherever they are sitting.
DON'T TRAVEL WITH A CHILD ON YOUR
LAP. THIS IS ONE OF THE RARE OC-CASOINS WHEN A CHILD IS NOT SAFE IN MOTHER'S ARMS. It has been shown that in a crash, even at a low speed, the forces involved are such that the strengh needed to hang on to a child is similiar to lifting one end of a small car. DONT PUT A CHILD INTO A SEAT WITH YOU. In a crash, the weight of your body would cause serious or even fat al injury to the child.
IF YOUR CHILD CAN'T SEE OUT, DON'T raise him by means of an ordinary cushion. It will not stay in place in a crash and the child can slip out of the straps and be strangled. Use an approved booster cushion with a child harness or an adult seat belt.
