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DRINKING --- DRIVING --- SURVIVING

With Tasmanian Police taking a tougher line over the next three months on drink-drivers, to try to keep the road death toll below last year's state total, now might be an appropriate time to talk about alcohol.

Each year on Australian roads, about 3000 people are killed and about 90,000 are injured!

About one in twenty 16year olds will be admitted to hospital or killed as a result of a traffic accident before they are 25.

Many factors contribute to accidents. ALCOHOL IS THE MAJOR FACTOR.

People who drive or ride after drinking alcohol, increase their risk of being involved in a traffic accident. Alcohol depresses many of the brain's functions. With relatively small amounts of alcohol, a person may not be able to assess accurately how much his behaviour has been affected by the amount of alcohol consumed.

With larger amounts, muscle co-ordination and reflexes become slower, vision and hearing are affected and the ability of the brain to process information about the environment is diminished. In particular he has a sharply reduced ability to do more than one thing at a time:-for instance to keep his vehicle on course and to notice a pedestrian about to step out from the kerb. He may feel "normal" or even better than normal, but he is certainly in no position to judge his ability to drive.

To protect other road users from drivers affected by alcohol, and to protect these drivers from themselves, drink - driving laws have been introduced in every State and Territory of Australia. It is an offence to drive or ride when the amount of alcohol in the bloodstream is equal to or exceeds certain levels. (In Tasmania that level is .05.)

Many people have mistaken ideas about alcohol and drinking. It is sometimes thought that some types of alcoholic drinks, such as beer, are less likely to cause drunkenness, or to impair driving, than other types.

The fact is that it is primarily the amount of alcohol consumed, not the form in which it is taken, that

determines BAC. (Blood Alcohol Concentration)

A 285ml glass of beer contains about the same amount of alcohol as a standard nip of spirits.

It is often said that someone who drinks regularly is less affected by alcohol than an inexperienced drinker, and so better able to drive a car or ride a motorcycle. This myth has arisen because people who are frequent drinkers often appear to show tolerance to alcohol. This means that they need to consume more alcohol than inexperienced drinkers to achieve the same psychological effects. A person who drinks a large amount of alcohol will have a high BAC whether he is an "experienced" drinker or not.

Other misconceptions about drinking are that it is possible to sober up before driving by drinking black coffee, exercising, having a cold shower, or by other means. All these things may help to make a person feel better, more awake, more alert. But they neither lower his BAC, nor prevent it from reducing his ability to drive safely.

Alcohol is removed from the body very slowly and there is no way this process can be speeded up. If a person has had too much to drink, there is only one way he can sober up - that is by waiting until the effects of alcohol wear off, sleeping it off if necessary. Depending on the amount of alcohol drunk this may take several hours.

Other drugs besides alcohol can also cause impairment of driving and riding skills and increased risk of traffic accidents. Some drugs dangerously impair driving and riding ability when even a small amount of alcohol is taken or even when alcohol is not taken at all.

If you are prescribed any medications, or if you buy any medicines from the chemist, be sure to ask your doctor or pharmacist whether or not it is safe for you to drive or to drink alcohol while taken the medication. If you have any doubts about the effects of a drug on your
