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JOB INTERVIEW

Asked to compile a list of our least favourite things, most of us would place having an interview for a job between having wisdom teeth pulled and emptying the kitten's litter box!

Discussing our merits with a potential boss is seldom fun, mainly because we're so afraid we'll fail. Yet, if you follow certain basic rules, you can take much anxiety out of job hunting.

A good resume written or typed on clean white paper with only one or two pages always looks neat and tidy.

Ploys for attention usually fall flat, so avoid trying to stand out in a crowd. Be business-like and professional but do not put on any airs.

Do your homework and get your facts straight, then if the interviewer asks a topical question, you can reply intelligently.

Choice of dress for an interview should be neat, tidy and clean. For example if it is an office job for which you are applying, you would dress as if you were going to work there.

Act positive, cheerful and confident. In other words, use your body language. Walk in and shake hands warmly, take a chair when offered, and keep eye contact with the interviewer, but don't stare. Avoid fidgety habits.

There's a fine line between being stiff and being overfamiliar. Be polite, don't speak in a whisper, or be afraid to ask questions, but don't plant your elbows on the desk and call the interviewer "mate", that's too relaxed and friendly.

While some interviewers are all business, others like to chat. Be prepared to talk about topical subjects.

You will have your chance to shine when you are asked the question, "Tell me something about yourself?" Start by briefly telling the interviewer about your educational and professional background. Then go on to mention your special qualities and

skills. These qualities set you apart from other people.

The way you answer "why" questions tells the interviewer how well you think and communicate your ideas. Be ready to give solid reason for your decisions.

Never ask about salary or fringe benefits the moment you sit down. Eventually the interviewer will tell you. If he does not then you can discreetly mention it.

No matter how much you disliked your former job or employers, for whatever reason, do not criticise them. Try to talk positively about your decision to leave. Say something like, "I'm looking for a job with more responsibility," not "I quit because old Mr Geezer ran me around like a slave."

If you were fired from a job after two or three months, you can leave it off your resume. But if you were fired from a position you want to list, be honest. Interviewers do check with former employers. If you get caught lying, you would not seem dependable.

An interview should not be one-sided. To see if you really want the job, ask questions.

Don't dally at the door when leaving, trying to think of one last overwhelming reason why you should get the job. And don't pop back in to the office after you've left to say, "Oh, I forgot --there's one more thing... If you do recall a point you should have mentioned, a note in the mail the next day would be better.

Don't pace the floor at home, waiting for the phone to ring or the postman to call. The mounting anxiety will just sap your energy for the next interview.

If you're not hired, don't blame yourself. It may not be your fault. A recent study found that whether you get the job or not often simply depends on whether the interviewer likes you as a person. So, if you don't get the job you wanted, keep trying.

WINE TALK

Acidity is the amount of fruit acids
in a wine that can make it puckery
like lemonade or merely add a taste
of freshness to the wine and a feel-
ing of liveliness in the mouth. The
various malic, tartaric, and citric
acids, without which the wine would
be bland and insipid, give a taste
to the wine best described as tart.
Tannin imparts a bitter taste to the
wine - this lessens as the wine ages -
a quality often referred to as astring-
ent. The word sour - is avoided,
every effort being made to keep this
out of the wine.

Balance is that quality of a wine
that prevents any single element from
being so pronounced as to detract from
the taste. One can speak of the acid-
tannin balance that occurs when the
fruity acids are in harmony with
the bitter taste of tannic acid or of
the alcohol-acid balance, when the
flowery qualities or one of the fruity
qualities of the other are in harmony.
A light wine can have a balance
described as elegant, while a full
wine can have more pronounced tastes
inequilibrium. Balance is a most
desirable characteristic.

from Max Burr Member for Lyons
The Federal Minister for Communications, Mr. Duffy, has agreed with Max Burr, M.H.R. for Lyons, that the ABC should be brought up to date.

"I asked the Minister if he could do something about the use of Roman numerals on the credits of television programmes shown by the ABC," Mr. Burr said.

"The use of Roman numerals has been completely dropped throughout Australia in public places and with documents. "I thought it was about time the ABC began to show dates on their productions that the average viewer could understand.

"The minister has said that it would not be possible to have all dates in Arabic because the Roman numerals are used by companies from which the ABC gets its programmes.

"However he has said that the ABC will ensure that in future the copyright accreditation after its own productions will be written in Arabic numerals."

RECIPE

ENTREE

Broccoli with hazelnut hollandaise.

Serves 6

Preparation time: 40 minutes

750g broccoli, broken into flowerettes

Hazelnut hollandaise

185g butter

2 tbsp lemon juice

2 tbsp dry sherry

3 egg yolk

extra 2 tbsp cold butter

1/3 cup ground toasted hazelnuts

salt and pepper to taste

1. Cook broccoli in boiling salted water for 8 minutes or until tender but still reasonably crunchy.
2. Heat butter until it turns golden brown. Tip into a cup leaving behind the brown sediment at the bottom. Place lemon juice and sherry in a saucepan and boil until only two tablespoons are left.
3. Remove from heat and add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat until mixture turns foamy. Add one tblsp. of the cold butter.
4. Cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture coats the back of spoon. Remove from heat. Beat in the remaining cold butter and gradually add the brown melted butter, a few drops at a time. Add the ground hazelnuts and season to taste with salt and pepper.

OVERSEAS RELATIVES

Recent Federal legislation will help relatives of Australians who have died overseas, according to Mr Max Burr, MHR for Lyons.

"The death of an Australian citizen overseas is a tragedy in itself for those intimately affected," Mr Burr said. "Their problem were further compounded when trying to get the death registered in Australia.

"The Registration of Deaths Abroad Act which came in to operation in December, 1985, has made things a lot easier.

"Previously when Australian citizens or residents died abroad there were often legal abd technical difficulties in registering the death in Australia." Mr Burr said the new laws enabled relatives to get certificates, extracts or results of searches without problems and delays.

"An Australian document may reduce legal costs to families by assisting settlements of estates, insurance claims and variety of other matters.

"Applications for registration of a death can be made either at an Australian Embassy or Consulate overseas, or direct to the Registrar of Deaths Abroad in Canberra."
