PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST CRIME

Out side of common sense, there are many rules that can help you protect yourself and your home against crime, and the shrewdest rules often come not from the police or other crime-prevention experts but from the criminals themselves.

It should be remembered that muggers work the meanest streets, and they also are potential victims of other muggers. It is for this reason that the advice of a reformed mugger has special meaning.

Always walk fast and with an air of self-confidence. This shows you are very sure of yourself. The mugger doesn't need you. He can wait for Ms Meek to come along.

If you must venture on the streets at 2am, carry an umbrella, especially if it is not raining. Muggers traditionally regard an umbrella under such circumstances as an object for self-defence, they'll pass that person by. The next one may not have an umbrella.

Watch for lighted windows, and in case of danger, run to one and yell loudly. It doesn't matter if there is someone there or not. Muggers will seldom accept such a challenge when they can retreat into the shadows.

If you feel you are threatened and there is a post-box nearby, run to it and throw your wallet in and scream as loud as you can. A mugger may not be bothered attacking you if he feels his loot is lost in any case.

Don't scream after a mugger grabs you. He'll instinctively try to silence you. But do scream before he grabs you. A scream means you've spotted the mugger, and your cry will throw him off balance. Muggers function best when the element of complete surprise is in their favour.

If you have gone to bed and awaken and hear an intruder in your house or trying to break in, call the police and make sure you stay calm enough to give them your name and address before you hang up.

Crime experts say a phone should always be kept next to the bed. After you call, do nothing but wait as quietly as possible for help to arrive. If there is no phone in the bedroom, do not try to get to it, but lock your bedroom door, climb out the window, and try to get to a neighbour or telephone.

If it is impossible to get out the window, secure the bedroom door and open the window and scream as loud as you can.

If your home is isolated and yelling would not be effective, secure the door and remain perfectly still.

If you awake and find someone in your bedroom, remain as still as possible. A person in bed is quite defenceless against a prowler and should, if at all possible, avoid an encounter with an intruder.

If the worst comes to the worst, and you come face to face with an intruder, don't panic. Be ready to defend yourself but otherwise stand perfectly still. Don't try to scream and don't talk to him. The average burglar is interested only in robbery but will strike out viciously if he feels threatened.

Don't try judo on an attacker. It might cause him some trouble, but he will probably retaliate. Women drivers should never pick up hitchhikers, male or female.

Don't carry your house keys in your bag. If a bag snatcher grabs it, he could race you home and loot the place, or wait for you with rape on his mind.

Don't advertise the fact on your house or apartment that you are Mrs, Miss or Ms. As far as an intruder knows, "J.E. Brown" could easily be a tough wharfie. Use only your initials in the telephone book. This discourages obscene callers, and may also foil a potential intruder.

If you are in a deserted railway station or at a bus station, try to stand near any uniformed person. Statistics show that men in uniform are more likely to help. Molesters know this too.

Karate is on Monday Nights and is run by the club for people of all ages. You do not have to be a member of the Police Youth Club. It is from 7pm till 9pm and costs £3. There will be karate demonstrations at the Fingal Festival starting around lunch time Saturday and continuing regularly throughout the day also on Sunday. What is Karate. Andrew explains below?

The question I am mostly asked is, What is karate?

Karate is a Japanese form of self defence using many parts of the body as natural weapons. Some of these are the fingers, knuckles, fists, elbows, knees, side of foot sole of foot, heel and many more. Kara means empty and Te means hand thus KARATE = empty hands. What is Jujitsu? Jujitsu is another form of Japanese self defence. A person with knowledge of Jujitsu is able to control an attacker by the method of applying armlocks, wristlocks, or by disturbing his balance and throwing to the ground with a scientific Jujitsu throw. Ju means gentle or yielding, Jitsu means art. Thus Jujitsu means Gentle Art of Yielding Art. The Jujitsu motto is Yield so as to conquer. For instance if an attacker pushes, you pull, or if the attacker pulls you push. Thus you are able to disturb his balance and use his force against him enabling you to control or defeat him. By combining the arts of Jujitsu and Karate a person is able to defend him or herself and loved ones against attackers. Jujitsu and Karate is suitable for men, women, and children, and they can be taught to defend themselves of any size and multiple attackers: but the final outcome of defence against aggressors depends on the persons ability to learn well, keep fit, be alert, and his ability to be able to expect the unexpected.

I have been chief instructor and President of the Tasmanian Jujitsu Karate Association for almost five years now, and have recently started training at St. Marys anyone interested in training with us can contact Cheryl Hendley of St Marys Andrew Adams

Australians visiting Italy can now enjoy the use of the health care system of that country, according to Mr. Burr, MHR for Lyons. "A recent agreement signed by both the Australian and Italian governments now enables short term visitors to use the Italian health care system for medical conditions which require immediate treatment," he said. "Italian visitors to Australia can also use the Medicare facilities while living here. "This will be of great assistance to Italian migrants now living in Australia when bringing relatives in on holiday visa visits. "The reciprocal agreement was signed with Italy in January." Mr. Burr said that similar agreements were being negotiated with New Zealand, the United Kingdom, Yugoslavia, Greece, Ireland and Spain. "This means that if visitors to either country needed medical treatment, which could range from the flu to a heart attack, that treatment is now available under the agreement."

This will show your name and identification number and be similar to a Medicare card or credit card.

While helping to verify records and payments of government benefits, the system will do no more than that. The privacy of every individual will be maintained.

The Benefits

Australia Card will assist government agencies to carry out their functions more effectively. In particular, it will aid identification for tax, employment, financial transactions and social security purposes.

This will make it easier to track tax evaders and also reduce welfare fraud. When fully operational, the system could yield at least \$500 million per year from reduced tax evasion alone.

It will also help detect illegal immigrants and open up employment opportunities for legal residents, with worthwhile reductions in the payment of unemployment and other benefits as a result.

Australia Card will help to ensure that everybody contributes fairly towards the costs of providing community services and prevent any individual or group from taking more than their fair share.
