The organisers of the Bicentenary have, therefore, developed a set of planning objectives which reflect

these contrasts.

* To celebrate the richness of diversity of Australians, their traditions and freedoms which they enjoy.

To encourage all Australians to understand and preserve their heritage, recognise the multicultural nature of modern Australia, and look

to the future with confidence.

* To ensure that all Australians participate in or have access to, the activities of 1988, so that the Bicentennial program will be a truly participal program in both characteristics. national program in both character and geographic spread.

* To develop projects and programs which wll provide significant and enduring legacies to presentday Australians and future genera-

tions.

* To project Australia to the world and invite international participation with the aim of strengthening relationships with other nations.

The co-ordination of a national celebration is a complex task, but Bicentennial Community Committees are being established in all 839 local government areas around Aust-That means there is one in your neighbourhood.

There are even Bicentennial committees on an international scale with groups active in the U.S.A., U.K., JAPAN, NETHERLANDS, FEDERAL REPUBLIC of GERMANY and

FRANCE.

And if you dislike being organised by others, why not devise your own Bicentennial program and get your friends, family or neighbours to join in.

Bicentennial Resource Kits will

contain curriculum materials and provide information and guidance on how to create and organise activities related to significant themes events or periods in Australia's history and development, The kits will be distributed to schools during 1987.
It is intended to encourage

older people to participate in all the Bicentennial program areas, as well as developing activities which highlight the wisdom, knowledge and accomplishments of older Austral-

ians.

Although the Department of Construction has taken over the build- GRADE 7 MATHS WORKSHOP: ing from the principal contractor, the gymnasium will not be available for use until after the Education Department accepts it from the Department of Construction. This will probably happen at about the end of March.

In the meantime, matters such as worthwhile exercise. the employment of a cleaner have to be resolved.

Responsibility for administering the gym rests with the Principal of the school under Education Department Regulation 167. Under the regulations, public use of the gymnasium must be on a user-pays basis. Hiring fees must cover the cost of electric power, materials and equipment and cleaning.

While the specific hourly hiring rate is yet to be finalised the rate will be not less than \$7 more.

Clubs will be required to lodge a deposit of no less than \$50 at the start of each session to cover possible damage to the building and/or equipment.

YOUR PRIVACY

In introducing the Australia Card, For Australia Card to realise protection of individual privacy will its full benefits for our commbe paramount. As we have said, the Australia Card register will contain only the most basic information - name, address etc. Authorities which rightly hold sensitive personal data, such as the Tax Office, Social Security and Medicare, will continue to maintain secure and separate records. Only specific federal authorities will be able to access the register to either verify the identity of people they are dealing with or, in the case of the Tax Office, to be sure all Australians are meeting their responsibilities. There will be no requirements to routinely carry the card and its use will be restricted by legislation to a limited number of situations and collect your Australia Card. It will be an offence for anyone to demand your card in other circum-stances but if you wish to use it to prove your identity for any other purpose, that's up to you. On-line terminals in Medicare offices people in remote areas). will also allow you to check all personal data held on the register at anytime

HOW WILL IT OPERATE

Subject to legislation being passed by the Parliament, your Australia Card will be needed in only three situations - employment, financial dealings and the claiming of Commonwealth benefits. Employers will be required to sight and record the number of each employee's Australia Card. This is necessary to ensure accurate tax records. The card will again be needed for financial transactions such as opening accounts with banks, building societies and credit unions. It will also be used for other dealings likeshare purchases and investments. Finally, Australia Card will assist in confirming your eligibility for Commonwealth benefits such as Medicare and social welfare payments. For the majority of people, use of the card for these limited purposes will involve little inconvenience, but great benefits will accrue in administering a fairer and more efficient Australia.

Some wines, light Moselles, for instance, have been described as glorious water. A full-bodied wine like Rhone may have so much substance that one can almost chew it, a quality the French call mache. The quality of this fulness can be velvety or silky, giving a sense of texture in the mouth. BOUQUET: is the collection of smells (floweryalcohols and fruity acids) that form a unity when the wine is good. PERFUME: refers to the fragrances and aromas, usually light and of the grape, found in a young wine right after fermentation. These develop into the bouquet. CORKY describes a wine that smells and tastes of the cork. The odour is a sign that the cork has rotted and the wine has been spoiled. A good wine steward will sniff the cork after to verify that the wine is sound and smells of the wine, or he will present the cork to the host for verification.
