### CENSUS 1986

On June 30th, the Australian Bureau of Statistics will be conducting a National Census, a compulsory five yearly stocktake of the population and their housing. This collection, at a cost of about \$4.00 per person, will render statistical data on social, economic, and housing conditions.

Authority to conduct this Census is given by the Commonwealth Census and Statistics Act of 1905.

Statistics gathered will give population estimates for the next five years and provide information on age distribution, family structures, educational qualifications, incomes, occupation and employment.

The Census is important to the very functioning of the Government. The information it provides enables estimates to be made about the nation, States, and local areas upon which the allocation of funds to the States and minor government authorities can be determined.

All services that are provided by the Government must be planned on the basis of how many people there are, and where they live.

The collection of data is a large scale operation. A sizeable number of people are required to conduct the census as every questionnaire must be delivered to every dwelling in Australia and forms collected once completed.

Confidentiality is assured under the Census and Statistics Act. Information which could identify a person or organization cannot be released by the A.B.S.

This includes the prohibition of transfer of this information to any Government Department, the Police, Banks and so on.

Employees and former employees of the A.B.S. are also sworn to secrecy, and heavy penalties can be incurred if confidential information is given out. To ensure absolute confidentiality all forms. after processing are destroyed by pulping.

While the Census raises questions about privacy invasion on the one hand, it must be recognized as a practical means of gleaning information, important in the development of Australia's future.

Everyone likes to win or be in the winning team, but as children we are told, "its not the winning but how you play the game".

Statistics prove most of us are beaten at one time or another. Sometimes the winning streak lasts longer for some than others, but

eventuallylysses are inevitable.
Using the Australian Cricketers as an example, surely the best team won on that particular day, and I imagine the New Zealanders were told to "get out there and

win", as the Australians would have been told.
When a team has a 'bad day', it usually coincides with a 'Good day' by the opposing team. I'm sure every player on a cricket field tries their hardest to win for their country, but ultimately only one team and one country wins.

Because of the tour of South Africa taking so many seasoned players from the Australian side, many young Australians got the chance to play for their country a little sooner than expected, and I have nothing but praise for them. They have put their heart and soul into the job, and win or lose they are to be commended, along with their captain, who is a brilliant cricketer.

Who else but a dedicated cricketer would punish their body, by standing out in sometimes heatwave conditions just to chase a little red (or white) ball around?

#### HOUSEHOLD HINTS

MUSTARD Scrape up excess. Sponge with detergent solution. Sponge and blot several times. Sponge with a clean damp cloth. If a stain remains, use carpet shampoo or make a paste of borax and warm water and scrub it into a pile.

PERFUME: - Blot up. Sponge with detergent solution, then with a series of damp cloths to remove the suds,

Vacuum when dry. SALT: - Dry salt can change the color of a carpet and it will attract dampness which will suspend grime and dirt. If a spillage occurs, vacuum

slowly and deeply.
Salt water or salty liquids: Blot up as much as possible. Make a solution using 1 tbl sp. laundry detergent. 1 tbl sp. white vinegar and 1 cup tepid water.
