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## WHAT ULP MEANS TO THE MOTORIST

This report is taken from a booklet printed by the Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries.

As a part of a national drive to reduce atmospheric pollution from motor vehicles, Federal and State Governments have decided that all new petrol-fuelled cars, station-wagons, panel-vans and utilities, manufactured on or after January, 1986 must be designed to run on Unleaded petrol (ULP).

In N.S.W., the regulation extends to all other petrol engined vehicles including trucks and motor cycles. In States other than N.S.W. the regulation will apply from March 1, 1988 for Motor Cycles and from July 1, 1988 for trucks.

From July 1, 1985 ULP will be available at most retail petrol stations throughout Australia.

The effects of this major change to emission regulations and fuel usage, has been causing some confusion to Australian motorists, due to conflicting stories appearing in the motoring press and other media, particularly as it relates to the continued availability of premium grade leaded petrol and the ability of some cars already in service to use unleaded petrol.

Unleaded petrol has been used for some years by several of the world's major vehicle manufacturing countries, and many of the motor cars currently in use in Australia (about 1,000,000) can already operate satisfactorily on ULP.

The Australian Automotive Industry is of the view that price parity should exist, and has every reason to believe that eventually ULP will cost the same as super-grade leaded petrol. In this respect, the motorist who purchases a new ULP motorcar will not be paying more for his petrol, and in some circumstances might pay slightly less.

Motorists will not be required to have their present car modified as the regulations only require mandatory use of ULP to apply to vehicles manufactured after January 1, 1986.

Super-grade petrol will continue

to be available until well into the 1990's. Standard petrol will go off the market when unleaded is introduced.

From January 1, 1986 new cars must comply with more stringent exhaust emission standards, and most manufacturers will meet the new standards by fitting catalytic converters to exhaust systems.

Catalytic converters change most of the carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons in engine exhausts into carbon dioxide and water vapour. They are specially designed for long life and minimum maintenance. However, catalytic converters would be rendered ineffective by lead compounds in petrol; therefore, it will be an offence to use leaded petrol in a car designed for ULP.

ULP will be easily distinguishable by its pale yellow colour, as opposed to super-grade, which is pink-coloured, and will have an octane rating between those of super and standard.

There will be no chance of cars being "misfuelled" at service stations as the cars using ULP will be fitted with smaller filler pipes to take only the smaller nozzles, to be compulsorily fitted to ULP dispensing pumps.

Although it will be physically possible to serve a vehicle not using ULP, with ULP, pump labelling should make such an error extremely unlikely. If an error does happen, a top-up with super as soon as possible is advisable because the lower octane rating of unleaded petrol could cause harmful engine knock ("Pinging") to these vehicles.

You ask, what effect would it have if an owner removed the catalytic converter? The vehicle would no longer comply with emission regulations and the owner would be liable to a prosecution if detected. Removing the converter would have little or no effect immediately on the vehicle's performance but tampering with ignition and fuel settings could have a detrimental effect on the engine's durability.

Now there is a proven way to bring the deaf back into the mainstream by putting other ears to work... Hearing Dogs Incorporated.

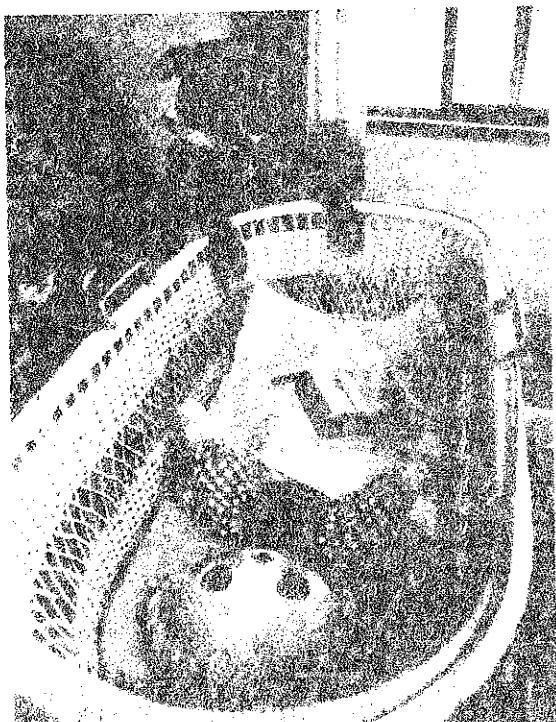
## HEARING DOGS FOR THE HEARING IMPAIRED

Hearing Dogs Incorporated serves the deaf with specially trained dogs — at no cost to the recipient — to hear and respond to the daily sounds we often take for granted.

The concept actually belongs to the deaf who have used dogs for auditory awareness for hundreds of years. The Hearing Dog program was developed in Minnesota and Colorado under the sponsorship of the American Humane Association and during that time several hundred dogs have been distributed throughout many states of America and in Canada.

The program was introduced into Australia in May, 1981 by the Lions Clubs of Australia and Papua New Guinea at their 1981 National Convention. Hearing Dogs Incorporated, a charitable association, was located by the Lions Clubs in South Australia and that organization is providing Hearing Dogs to deaf persons within the Australian community.

There is an additional benefit to the Hearing Dog concept. Since there is no need for a breed standard or registered dogs, the animals chosen for Hearing Dogs are obtained through local animal shelters. An abandoned or unwanted pet has the opportunity to provide a lifetime of service to the deaf.
