In my place of employment, tourists often ask of me, "What is there to see or do around this area?"

Tourists have varying tastes, and there is not a lot for them to do around St. Marys unless they are interested in buch walking.

terested in bushwalking.

The walk and climb to the summit of St Patrick's Head, (90mins return) is well worth the effort, for on a clear day, the view is absolutely fantastic. Alternatively, the less strenuous climb to the South Sister Lookout is equally impressive, and, let's not forget the pleasant walk to the waterfall at the top of St-Marys Pass.

There has been tame trout in the St. Marys Rivulet for many years, and

children love to feed them.

If you are interested in just scenery, the Forestry Routes through the bushland are lovely, and most roads are quite good. At the White Gum Reserve at Mathinna you will see the tallest White Gum in the world, and while at Mathinna, have a look at the Mathinna Falls.

You could call in at the Fingal Hotel and view the largest collect-ion of whiskey in the Southern Hemi-

sphere.

Tourists who hail from the cities will no doubt enjoy watching the sheep shearing, and one farm at Tullochgorum welcomes visitors at shearing time.

The beaches of the East Coast are some of the most beautiful anywhere in the world, with clean white sand that stretches as far as the eye can

see in some places.

The fishing in this area is usually most rewarding for the angler. Whether you are a keen surf, their secons salt river or inland fisherman, there trip here. is excellent Trout fishing with access to rivers through several properties, (with permission), Rock fishing on the coast, and Bream fishing in the Scamander River and Georges

Travelling south from St. Marys, at Bicheno there is a Wild life Park well stocked with many birds and animals, and a Sea Life Centre with

Fish native to the area on display. You could also try one of Bicheno's famous craybakes, or view the spec-

tacular blowhole.

Most Motel accommodation has facilities for swimming, barbeques, games rooms, bicycle hire, and there are golf courses and tennis courts in most towns.

There are fishing boats for hire in both Bicheno and St. Helens, to

take you out to sea for deep sea fishing, or just a leisurely cruise.

Travelling Down the St. Marys Pass is a very scenic route to take you North-east. At Falmouth there is another blowhole, and beautiful views of the coastline.

Scamander is set up well for the tourist, and in season you can hire

water pedal bikes.
At St Helens there is a History Museum, with very interesting exhibits and photographs.

St Helens, situated on the picturesque Georges Bay, is ideal for the tourist with water-skiing, fish-ing surfing and many other activities to keep the holiday maker happy. Further on towards Scottsdale,

at Pyenganna there is the famous St. Columba Falls, well worth the visit and many have found that out because you can hardly get a parking spot on most days through the tourist season.

After leaving Pyenganna, you wend your way through some of the most fantastic rain forest areas easily accessible in Tasmania, through the

Weldborough Pass.

Most tourists I have spoken to. agree Tasmania is a Beautiful place and quite often they tell me it is their second, third, (and even more)

WHAT MAKES A GOOD SCHOOL?

Barry Dwyer, an author of several books on education, has prepared the following basic questions for parents to consider when making an assessment of a school.

- 1. In this school is there an observable balance between freedom and order, and a general atmosphere of kindness, calmness and absorption in worthwhile activities?
- 2. Is there an emphasis on caring for individuals and catering for their needs rather than on institutional image—making and on whole-class movement through inflexible routines?
- 3. Do the individual children at all levels of ability, seem to be enjoying a real sense of achievement.
- 4. Does the curriculum appear to be balanced, with plenty of opportunity for drama, art, craft and music as well as the traditional academic subjects?
- 5. Do the members of the school community speak to each other courteously? Do they appear sensitive to each other's needs?
- 6. Is there a clearly understood and enforced discipline policy that is characterised by fairness as well as firmness, and that always places children's welfare above organisational convenience?
- 7. Does the school environment suggest by its appearance that the people here care about the place they work in?
- 8. Are parents kept informed in a clear way about the progress of their children?
- 9. Are there ample opportunities for parents to communicate with the school and to be involved in its day-to-day life?

THE FACTS

Cholesterol is a fatty substance made in theliver. In normal amounts it plays an important role in bodily functions. Raised levels in the blood increase the risk of heart attack. The greater the level, the greater the risk. Cholesterol is also found in most foods with a high animal fat content. A diet high in fats or being overweight can increase the cholesterol level in the blood. Can high blood cholesterol be prevented? Most people can avoid high blood cholesterol if a diet low in fats is

FOST OFFICE NEWS Frotecting that parcel

starfeda at a young age.

From time to time we have customers complain about the condition of a parcel they have received through the post and generally they enquire about compensation for damage. Australia Fost regulations do provide for compensation under certain circumstances. The maximum amount payable varies with the nature of the service used but in all cases the method of packing is of prime importance. All mail is shifted from point to point in mail bags and, as you can guess, at times quite alot are moved at one time. Perhaps you have seen a load on one of our vans or trucks or on a trolley at the airport When thebags are stacked quite alot of weight is applied to the bottom ones and there is often movement during travel. In handling mail bags a certain amount of bumping also occurs so when packing your parcel think about this.

If you remember that your parcel will almost certainly be subjected to some pressure and bumps in its travels packing becomes practically just a matter of common sense. Glass or china bowls, vases etc. need packing inside the item as well as outside. Light, thin items need support to help prevent them bending. The article should fit snugly in the box so that it isnt damaged by moving about. The bunch of flowers in a light cardboard box will almost certainly be damaged despite being prominently marked as fragile. A photo or picture in a frame with glass also needs special care. The glass will shatter very easily and themovements of the broken fragments can cut the surface of the photo. Light brown paper and thin string often wes result in torn wrapping allowing contents to get dirty. Things like aerosol spray cans, witch matches or flammable liquids cannot be sent by post because of the possibility of damage to other mail. For the same reason items with sharp edges or points must be packed in a special way and containers of liquids must be packed in enough absorbent material to soak up the or thelid becomes loose. Australia Post has a pamphlet designed to help with packing and our counter staff are always willing to advise you. Re -wrapping parcels and the special handling of damaged ones is time consuming and part of our operation we would like to be without. Help us to help you. Fack your parcel so we can deliver it in the same condition as you sentit.

THE GOADON

Bill of Rights

PRESS RELEASE: 8.6.86.

The Australian Bill of Rights is one piece of legislation that we, as a democratic nation, do not need. At no time have the rights of the Australian people been threatened. This legislation is the first threat to our accepted way of life.

The Constitution and system of Common Law ensure that our rights are protected at all times. The present bill is a blatant attack upon the Federal system of government which we so jeclously guard in Australia. Once passed it will have the force of law to automatically repeal any future Commonwealth or Territory laws that may conflict wit opinions held by the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission.

It is the thin end of the wedge to destroy State rights and Tasmanians, more that any other state in Australia, know the full extent of that action. Although the Bill does not override State legislation in a direct manner, it will force state governments to submit their laws to the Commission for scrutiny. The Commission will then decide if the State legislation infringes on any of the rights set out in the Commonwealth Bill,

The Bill is another weapon in the armoury which is imposing a totalitarian regime on Australian people. It joins the affirmative action legislation, industrial democracy and occupational superannuation. If this way of life is not to your liking, let your rederal representative know all about it.
