OCIATION. Fourteen families in the lamorgan Funici ality have banded together to for a a branch of the I.C P.A , Which now has broadles in all states. The association was established during the rural depression in 1 71, hen the education of many isolated children was under threat. Carents formed an association which has grown to a nationwide organisation with over 4,000 members. The I.C.F.A. has defined an isolated child as "one who for geographic reasons has no reasonable daily access to an appropriate school. Here in Tasmania, this applies mainly to children who live too far away from a high school or matriculation college to attend daily, although there is also a small number of orimar. school children who do their s correspondence. Federal Government allowances have been available to isolated children from 1973 as a direct result of lobbying from the I.C.P.A. These include (500per year for children on correspondence schooling, a basic boarding allow-ance of 927 per year for any isolated child who has to attend a private boarding school, government school Hostelo or has private board to attend school, other allowances including on additional means tested boarding allowance and a second home allowance. e believe that many people in farmania who are eligible for these allowances are not aware of their existence.
One of our main air is to spread the word that financial help is available to people who wish to send their children to boarding school, as long as they fulfill certain criteria eg their home is at least 16km away from the

send their children to boarding school, as long as they fulfill certain criteria eg their home is at least 16km away from the nearest government school and at least 4.5 km from the nearest transport service to that school, or their home is less than 4.5km from a transport service to the school is at least 56km away or 3hrs daily travel is entailed. All booklet containing full details of this scheme on assistance for isolated children can be obtained from the Commonwealth Department of Education and Youth Affairs,

hope that branches of I/C.P.A. will be established in other creas of Tasmania, and that lone members will join where there are not sufficient numbers to form a branch me see I.C.P.A. in Tasmania functioning locally as both a perent support groups and a body seeking

to improve its educational opportuntiles for all children living in remote or rural areas. This includes support for small rural schools, and travel allowances as well as the areas of correspondence and boarding allowances. Two members of the Glamorgan Branch have just retur -ned from the I.C.A. Federal Conference held this year in Sydney and attended by delegates from branches all over Australia. It was fascinating tohear about the problem sof isolation from people sending their children 7,000km away to school, of educating 6 children at home by correspondence. Te heard many sad teles and problems that seem to have no solution eg. how can illiterate parents be expected to cope with correspondence schooling Our problems here in fasmania are not on such a massive scale, but il they do exist, and our association is anxu**iou**s to hear from isolated parents who would like to jion the I.C.P.A. and help us to help ourselves.
