ELEPHANT PASS

Letter to Mr Braid, M.H.A. Minister for Main Roads, from Mr George Shaw, M.L.C. Member for Macquarie.

Dear Mr. Minister,

I have been contacted by parents of children who travel daily by school bus to and from the St. Marys District High School via the Elephant Pass road and who are most concerned about the dangers associated with this route.

Yesterday, together with Mr Stephen Salter, M.H.A., the President of the Parents and Friends Association, Mr Gerald Aulich and bus driver, Mr Leon Smith I inspected the pass road.

In recent times the number of children travelling the route has increased significantly. Thankfully the Education Department has just added a second small bus to the route to compliment the large bus which accommodates approximately 60 children.

The pass road from the outskirts of St. Marys is extremely narrow. From St. Marys to Gray the road surface is very rough and undulating and features bad shoulder wear and erosion in several places.

One of the worst features is the humpy hill just east of the Forestry "M" junction. This is particularly bad as sight distance is extremely limited by the hump.

The pass itself has many very blind corners which are impossible for the large bus to negotiate when confronted with oncoming traffic. When that traffic is a tourist bus, log truck, petrol tanker, furniture van, articulated vehicle, campervan or car-caravan combination the problem is exacerbated. It is not an overstatement to claim that this road with today's traffic is very dangerous. The bus driver can give lucid details of near misses plus frequent stop-back up and crawl-by hair raising experiences.

Weather conditions of fog and severe frost are added difficulties.

I believe that funds for a major upgrading of the road are not included in this year's budget. However, I respectfully suggest that very significant improvement could be made without major expenditure in the following ways.

1. The erection at each end of the pass of a large warning sign indicating that school buses will be using the road between 8.00 - 8.30a.m. and 3.30 - 4.00pm. Motorists requested to exercise extreme caution.
2. Line of vision can be improved by removal of scrub and tree lopping, etc.
3. Some bad corners could be widened by cutting on one side and fill on the other.
4. One particular corner east of the gravel pit could be filled with readily available material from the pit.
5. In another area overhanging rock, which is above regular motor car height, represents a danger to higher vehicles and prevents full use of road width. This could be removed.
6. Near the eastern end of the pass a low bank has protruding rock on one side while on the other side a rock protrudes from the verge. These would not be difficult to remove.

This is not an exhaustive list but sufficient only to illustrate that very significant improvements could be made without major expenditure if funds are not available at this stage for a major upgrading.

I commend your Government for its many major road initiatives including Lake Leake reconstruction and Four Mile Creek to Chain of Lagoons Bypass. However it appears obvious that the Elephant Pass road will not become redundant but indeed will continue to be the access to the Bicheno East Coast district and an important school bus route for many years to come. If this is not so I would be pleased to be advised of alternative plans.

I am confident this letter will be supported by the Local Councils, Parents and Friends, Chamber of Commerce and indeed the whole district.

Some parents wished to have this submission accompanied by a petition but I have advised them that I am confident our Government and the Department of Main Roads will act promptly to alleviate these most dangerous hazards and follow up as soon as possible with a comprehensive upgrading. I trust your consideration and reply will uphold my confidence.
