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HAPPY 100TH BIRTHDAY TO THE AUTOMOBILE

For hundreds of millions of people life without cars, trucks and motor cycles would be unthinkable, and for many millions, life would, in fact, be unlivable.

In hundreds of cities around the world, vast residential areas have risen on the assumption that vehicles fuel and the cash to pay for them would be available indefinitely.

Take away the vehicles and the effect would be catastrophic, with vast populations denied access to jobs, food and other essential goods and services.

On July 3, 1886 in Germany, a primitive petrol engine spluttered into life and began to supply energy to turn three spindly carriage wheels on a vehicle described by its creator, Karl Benz, as an automobile.

In the same year a second German, Gottlieb Daimler, presented another car, this one with four wheels.

The Benz and the Daimler cars emerged so close together in 1886 that it is considered unreasonable to separate Benz for special honour, even though his wheels were the first to roll. So they are honoured jointly as the fathers of the Age.

With the car came great new liberties - liberties to make wider choice in search of jobs and in ways to spend earnings.

At the same time, the car widened perception of reality, for most people previously did not travel more than a few miles beyond their place of abode.

One hundred years ago in urban Australia, a citizen had to be fairly well off to own and operate even one horsedrawn vehicle. At the very least he needed access to sufficient land to accommodate a horse, stable, feed shed and carriage shelter.

Due to the limits on speed, range and cost of horsedrawn vehicles, Australian cities could not sprawl as they do now, some as far as 40km from the central business district.

Who could foresee the coming of an era when almost every citizen would be propelled routinely in speed and comfort by the energy locked in a small quantity of liquid? In 1886 this was Star Wars stuff!

Energy was no problem in 1886. The Pennsylvania oil rush (1859) had then been history for 35 years and the oil industry was well established, having mastered the basic technology for oil drilling, recovery, transportation, manufacture and marketing.

The Pennsylvania oil rush resulted from a critical shortage of lamp fuel throughout the world. From fuelling a lamp to fuelling a horseless carriage is a giant technology step.

Benz' vehicle was a crude device, with three wheels, steered by a rudder through the front wheel; yet it was custom built for the task - the world's first true automobile - whereas Daimler's four-wheel vehicle was adapted from a horse carriage.

After the inaugural year, events moved fast in The Automobile Age. Other marketers soon sprang up, building on the technology developed by Daimler and Benz. Within a few years scores - perhaps hundreds - of enthusiasts were working on cars in backyards.

In 1888, the woman driver arrived! The intrepid wife of Karl Benz - Bertha, gave a magnificent (and unauthorised) demonstration of her husband's invention by a long day's drive without serious mishap. She drove from 5am until late at night (without headlights) and coped with several breakdowns. Clearly, a great pioneer woman.

By this time, both the Daimler and the Benz cars were in production. In 1889, both pioneers entered the international market by exhibiting at the Paris Exhibition.

Through secondary processing, The Automobile Age negotiated a critical turning point. Lacking this technology, the growth rate of new vehicles would have been seriously retarded, or, alternatively, the depletion of the world's oil resources would have been accelerated - to say nothing of surplus by-products.

Quality and quantity with petroleum products - these were the keys that helped the automobile industry unlock its fabulous future.
