WHAT DOES CYSS DO?

CYSS helps communities to set up programs for young people that aim to help them in getting and keeping jobs, and in coping with periods of unemployment.

This involves direct help with job searching, as well as building confidence and developing skills. Recreational and craft activities are also offered.

WHAT IS CYSS DOING IN THIS AREA?

St. Mary's CYSS runs a drop-in centre at Todd's Hall, with courses in woodwork, pottery, cooking, leatherwork, stained glass and wood turning. A variety of other craft and skill courses are planned including sewing, tanned skins, candle making and wooden toy making.

We provide contact with programs such as The Wilson Training Centre, Project Hahn and the Tasmanian College of Hospitality.

Groups such as Debt Help, The Department of Sport and Recreation, and Family Planning have accepted invitations to give talks or provide training sessions.

We provide assistance with job search and applications, social security, and tax forms.

Rossarden and Mathinna each have a one day per week craft session.

St. Helen's CYSS will be re-opened when arrangements for a venue are finalised. The program here will be similar to that at St. Marys.

WHO PAYS FOR CYSS?

CYSS is funded through a Commonwealth Government grant, and administered by the Department of Employment and Industrial Relations.

WHAT MAKES CYSS SUCCEED?

Community support is the main ingredient in a successful CYSS program.

People who have an interest in youth are invited to join the CYSS Association (50c membership fee) which entitles them to vote at the Annual General Meeting. Association members may contribute skills, ideas, or moral support to young participants and project staff.

The Local Management Committee is made up of volunteers elected each year. The committee is responsible for:

- Operating the project, including receiving and accounting for funds.
- Employing project staff.
- Directing and assisting staff by making policies and planning programs.
- Encouraging the local community to become involved with the project by tutoring skills and assisting with materials.

WHY DO WE NEED YOU?

Without a strong base in the community, and an active committee, with a real commitment to young people, CYSS can't operate effectively.

We ask for your support, either directly through the committee, or by joining the Association and contributing your skills, ideas and moral support.

We particularly need people from the St. Helens area who are willing to help make the project there a success. Committee meetings will alternate between St. Helens and St. Marys.

This year's Annual General Meeting broke records, with over 20 people in attendance. We now have a full and truly voluntary committee of 15 people (no one had to have their arm twisted to join!). Doesn't that put the lie to the story that this is an apathetic community, where no one cares about young people?

Our thanks to Peter Willans for his years of service as chairman. We hope he and his family enjoy the extra free time he gains from resigning! Our thanks also to Paul and Rosa Byard who have been active C.Y.S.S. supporters in past months. Paul has retired from the committee to concentrate on his pottery production.

You all deserve a break!! Welcome to our new Committee. Norman Cochrane - Chairman - A retired social worker, and winner of an Australia Day Medal for his contribution to social work. Living in St. Marys since early this year,

POST OFFICE NEWS.

It was interesting to read in your latest edition of Valley Voice that a local service organisation could not afford to send personal invitations to a function due to the high cost of postage.

Customers ask, "Why is postage so expensive?"

It is not. If the standard letter rate had increased in the last 10 years at the same rate as the Consumer Price Index, today's 36 cent stamp would cost 48 cents. If you compare us with all other western countries, we're neither the cheapest nor the most expensive. Each year, we face wages, transport and other cost increases of about \$100 million, and, because we run as a business, we have to meet some of these by increasing our charges. In round figures, we make a profit of about \$20 million a year-and this helps pay for the new technologies, buildings and facilities which enable us to improve, expand and minimise the costs of our services.

Since our formation in 1975, we have paid our way without any drain on the public purse.

People often say, "Compared with other countries, Australian postage is expensive".

Despite our vast distances, our postage is cheaper than in most European countries including the U.K., France, West Germany, Italy, Sweden and Belgium. We are more expensive than America, Canada and Japan -but, unlike some of these countries, our service is not subsidised.

TALL SHIPS AUSTRALIA 1988 BICENTENNIAL.

This spectacular event also gives Australia a unique opportunity to honour its maritime heritage by hosting the return to our shores of sailing ships from around the world.

The Australian Bicentenary commemorates the arrival of the country's first European settlers in 1788, a year which saw the dawn of a grand new era of sail in the Southern Hemisphere.

The fleet is scheduled to gather in Hobart, Tasmania, and race to Sydney, arriving from 19 January 1988 onwards.

The Tall Ships event will end as the fleet departs Sydney in a Grand Parade of Sail on 26th January 1988, Australia's National Day.

A number of vessels approaching across the Indian Ocean will be invited to call at Fremantle, Albany, Port Lincoln, Adelaide or Melbourne before arriving in Hobart. A number of those approaching across the Pacific Ocean will be invited to call at Brisbane, Melbourne or Launceston on their way to Hobart.

The race from Hobart to Sydney is being planned as an international Tall Ships Race conducted by the Australian Bicentennial Authority in association with the Sail Training Association (U.K.), and is likely to be conducted under their 'Racing and Sailing Rules.' Cruises in company may be arranged between Australian ports, depending on the number of vessels visiting ports and wishes of the Captains of the vessels.

Invitations have been extended by the Australian Government of some thirty countries which own or operate Sail Training Vessels. Brazil, the Federal Republic of Germany, Japan, New Zealand, Spain, Poland, USSR, and the USA have indicated that vessels will participate in the event subject to certain provisos.

Special Tall Ship Planning Committees have been set up in each Australian State to prepare a welcome for the ships and their crews. The visiting trainees will be entertained by young Australians to give them an opportunity of experiencing life in our country.
