ST. MARYS DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

CONTINUING EDUCATION CENTRE FOR ST. MARYS:

The Minister of Education, Mr. Peter Rae, recently announced the formation of an education centre eventually providing year 11, 12 and further education for the region of the Fingal Valley and East Coast.

The Continuing Education Centre will be independent of the two regional high schools at St. Marys and St. Helens and under the control of the Launceston Community College.

This is good news for those students who would not normally consider going on to post grade 10 study at Launceston and allow them to remain within the daily family unit while gaining year 11 and 12 H.S.C. qualifications.

Many full time students will be eligible for a Commonwealth living allowance and the courses selected on both interest and vocational bases will provide a bullwark against the frustration of unemployment.

It is also good news for the business sector and community as a whole as it will offer an avenue to people to reach their full potential in their personal development and more adequately prepare them for adult life.

BUSINESS AND COMMERCE

COOKING AND HOME MANAGEMENT

MOTOR MECHANICS *

CHILD DEVELOPMENT STUDIES

TOURISM

COMMUNICATION - LANGUAGE AND AUDIOVISUAL MEANS

CRAFT - POTTERY

MARINE STUDIES *

* These courses will be offered for 4 hours per week on Fridays. Most other courses will consist of two 2-hour sessions per week.

Already students from St. Helens and St. Marys have made initial enrolments in the subjects but places will also be available for

adults who have left school in past years and mature adults who wish to upgrade their skills or with a purely interest course on a full or part time basis.
