HE CASE AGAINST THE AUSTRALIA CARD

At first sight the Australia card ooks like a good idea. Why then id an all-party Parliamentary committee reject it? Why has the overnment had trouble getting greement in Caucus to the Card, and why are the Liberal, National and Democrat Parties opposing it?

Those who have had a chance to study the legislation cannot help but be concerned. In the view of he Joint Select Committee on the mustralia Card, the proposal does not deal with the major problems hat it is intended to overcome, and ill be costly and wasteful exercise. Most importantly will be he opening of the way for the reatest attack on the privacy of individuals - "Big Brother" has caught up with us at last!

The aim of the card is to reduce social security fraud, tax evasion and illegal immigration. The ard will not achieve these aims, and has too many frightening implications, for example-

Government records on citizens from at least 7 departments will be numbered and then linked to one Authority. This means that private financial, medical or other records risk

losing their confidentiality. None of us would wish for the details of our personal finance or matrimonial problems to be widely known.

- Over 2000 extra public servants will be needed.
- . Total cost to Australian taxpayers is estimated at \$1 billion over 10 years.
- Everyone, whether ill, elderly, disabled or living in the country will have to attend in person to initiate business transactions.

Yet despite the enormous opposition to the card, the Government is continuing to push for its introduction.

Existing systems can be modified to deal with the problems of fraud and tax evasion successfully, without infringing on civil liberties or incurring such enormous costs.

 for people to use false identities.
- . This would allow for more stringent identification procedures for claimants of social security cont. Page 8

Dear Ms Picone, Thank you for your letter of Oct 28 concerning an application by the Rossarden Tourist and progress Association for CEP funding. Your reference is TCEY 00065.

The application is for \$28,560.00 with which to employ six people for sixty three weeks. I fully support this application as its acceptance will have far reaching repercussions in an isolated area of Lyons. Storeys Creek is part of the area greatly affected by the closure of the tin mine at Rossarden several years ago.

Nothing has replaced that industry as far as supporting the community infrastructure that was left when the mine closed. The situation that now exists is a pocket of population experience a high level of unemployment. The project supported by the Progress Association will, if success ful, help to alleviate some of the hardship of the area.

The Storeys Creek Outdoor Centre is basically a collection of buildings left by the mine: owners and now run, on behalf of the State Education Department, as a centre for outdoor educational pursuits. They are used by state and private schools throughout Tasmania in a form of external studies, linked with the curricular of those schools.

The studies enjoyed by visiting students combine knowledge in the mining history of the region, botanical background and geological structure. The students also learn outdoor skills such as camping, bush walking, basic cooking and survival.

The intake is from forty students at a time on a weekly roster.

The grant is required for maintenance of the buildings used by the
students for accommodation, dining,
recreational and study purposes.
The main areas needing attention are
roofing, guttering, window repairs
and floor covering. Therehas been
little maintenance since the buildings were taken over from the former
owners and the Education Department
has advised that no funds are available.

It would be unacceptable to find such a resource being closed down

simply because it failed to come up to the standards required to house students. Its very existence is essential to the township. Its viability supports local business people and, indirectly, is responsible for the limited employment in the area at the moment. The closure of this resource would be serious for the local residents.

DIVISION OF ROAD SAFETY.....

PEDMSTRIANS AND THE DRIVER
Regardless of who is 'at fault'
the killing or maiming of a pedestrian is a shocking experience. You can avoid such calamities by strictly obeying the 'give way' rules and always being on the alert for pedestrians, day or night.

- It is a fundamental responsibility of a motorist to avoid collisions with pedestrians.
- . You must 'give way' to a pedestrian on a pedestrian crossing or children's crossing.
- . You must approach pedestrian crossings at a speed which will enable you to stop before reaching the crossing.
- . IT IS AN OFFENCE TO OVERTAKE AND PAGS A VEHICLE WHICH IS SLOWING DOWN OR STOPPED AT A PEDESTRIAN CROSSING.
- . You must 'give way' to pedestrians when turning left or right at an intersection.
- Watch out for and obey signals given by uniformed school crossing guards.
- . It is illegal to stop or park a vehicle within 9 metres on the approach side and within 6 metres on the departure side of a pedestrian crossing.

YOU AS A PEDESTRIAN.

Too many pedestrians risk their lives by placing an unfair burden on drivers. The Pedestrian who demands a right-of-way takes an enormous risk.

As a pedestrian you must:

- . Keep on available footpaths;
- keep close to the right hand edge of the road facing traffic if there is no footpath;
- whenever possible use a pedestrian crossing or a marked crossing at traffic lights;
- . obey 'Walk' and 'Don't Walk' signals;
- . if no pedestrian facility is available wait for a natural gap in traffic and cross by the shortest or direct route.

YOU MUST NOT:

- walk on a carriageway if a footpath is provided;
- alight from a moving vehicle;
- . loiter on crossings.

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
