A FEW FACTS ABOUT INFLUENZA

The season for those lingering lay-you-low bouts of flu is almost upon us. Winter is drawing closer and we will soon have flu viruses, seranades of hacking, sniffling, groaning and shivering openly test-ifying the flu bugs have arrived.

Every yearendless strains of influenza rain down on thousands of lives, and while a vaccine may mean rou are spared this season's menace, you'll remain helpless against next winter's assorted afflictions. You will also be left wondering why you

Vaccines have been developed to protect against some viral diseases but many others cannot be prevented. Flu viruses were not even isolated until the 1930's when engineers finally developed the electron microscope used for viewing this smallest

of all life forms.

Thanks to great advances in virology over the past 20 years or so, most strains of influenza(there are many) have been isolated, cultured, and studied. This however, is not quite so reassuring as it sounds, since, from time to time, so-called "mutant" strains of influenza appear, apparently spontaneously, which are just different enough in their genetic make-up to produce brand newand often treacherous- forms of the disease.

Symptoms of flu include fever,

chills, headache, soreness and body aches, dry cough, sore throat, runny nose, weakness, and overall discomfort. With a common cold, upper respiratory symptoms, such as a stuffy nose are more severe than with flu, but "whole body" symptoms such as chills and aches, are lacking.

If at all possible, stay at home and baby yourself for a few days after fever and other symptoms have disappeared. Then pace yourself, keeping on a lighter-than-usual will also be left wondering why you schedule for a while until strength are such easy prey.

Individuals who run the highest risk from influenza and its complications include those 65 or older as well as anybody suffering from chronic heart, lung or kidney dis-ease, severe anaemia, or a metabolic disorder such as diabetes. Even among this high-risk group, how-ever, it isn't influenza itself that leads to serious illness or death but rather the secondary infections, like pneumonia, which so often

Flu vaccines are widely available but immunisation against influenza is normally only recommended for persons falling in one of the high-

risk categories.

You should not be vaccinated if you are allergic to eggs. The flu viruses used in making the vaccine are grown in eggs, and minute quantities of egg may remain even after purification.

Certain people can't tolerate many kinds of vaccines, inclinding the one against flu, but for high-risk individuals the danger of vacc-ination is considerably less than



TREATMENT FOR CARPET STAINS . Alcohol: Blot up as much as possible immediately. Sponge the area with a clean towel wrung out of warm water. Then use detergent solution to lightly wet a piece of towelling. Repeatedly sponge the stained area, blotting up with dry cleths as you with dry cleths. with dry cloths as you work. Sponge with a series of damp cloths to remove suds.

Butter or margarine: Remove as much as possible with a pliable spatula or knife. Sponge lightly with dry cleaning fluid, blotting with tissues as the grease dissolves. However, if the pile is set in rubber or has a synthetic backing, instead of using fluid make a paste of powdered starch, or cornflour or talcum powder and white spirit and work this deeply into the pile. When it dries, vacuum the area and repeat if the stain is still apparent. Finally sponge the area apparent. Finally, sponge the area with carpet shampoo, leave it on for several hours, then vacuum.
