Almost 300,000 Australians could be at risk of contracting diabetes and don't know it, according to Mr. Max Burr, MHR for Lyons.

"That's why I participated in a recent blood glucose test arranged By the Australian Diabetes Foundation at Parliament House in Canberra," he said.

"Nearly 60 parliamentary colleagues from all parties took part in this test.

"It was a bipartisan expression of concern in the national interest."

Mr. Burr said this was the message of the 1986 National Diabetes Awareness Week.

"Diabetes affects about four per cent of the Australian population. "I find it alarming that most people do not recognise the symptoms associated with the onset of diabetes which is the nation's fifth highest killer. "Late diagnosis can lead to complications in later life, such as heart failure and strokes.

"No one knowns for sure what causes diabetes and there is no cure today. "I urge everyone to find out more about the risk factors of diabetes and, if concerned, talk to your doctor or the State branch of the
