EDITORIAL

The Loneliness of a Long Distance Runner.

JOHN SCHIER of PALMOUTH has been selected to represent Tasmania in the Australian Athletic Championships in Adelaide this March. He gained this selection whilst a member of the North Launceston Athletic Club.

It is quite a remarkable feat for a schoolboy (John now attends the Launceston Matric. (College) and win or lose, the credit he brings to this district will be considerable.

John's athletic career at the St. Marys District School has always been a talking point in the past and undoubtedly all local people will wish him well in the big time of National Athletics, but as always, the money will have to be found for his return fares and accommodation in Adelaide. (Approximately \$200)

In the past, residents of this district have given generously to local boys for sports trips away; mainly footballers and bike riders. Unfortunately, the loneliness of a long distance runner applies here, as there is no local athletic club to look after John's interests. Aware of this, North Launceston secretary, Mr. Frank Nott, has written to this paper and requested our aid.

It is beyond this paper's capabilities to wholly raise the necessary money, but to implement a start, we intend here to solicit donations from all sporting bodies and relevant committees and from private citizens in this area.

Already the Parents and Friends Association of the St. Marys District School, at their meeting last Tuesday, decided generously and unanimously to donate \$30 for John. As a gesture, this paper also intends to donate a further \$5.

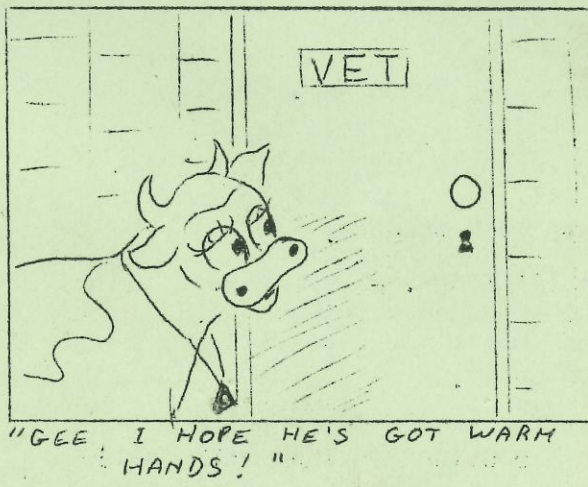
Mr. Nott has indicated that his Club's athletics are willing to put on an athletic benefit anywhere in this district, if some local body can organise it. So how about it, Clubs?

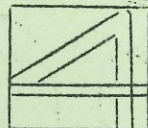

THOMAS JAMES KEDDIE

THOMAS JAMES KEDDIE who died a fortnight ago in the St. Marys District Hospital, spent most of his fifty one years serving his fellow men, in the pursuit of his calling.

One of a very large family, he was born in Sydney. The family moved to Melbourne when he was three years old, where young Jim Keddle left school at thirteen, as these were the hard years of the Depression. He was converted at fifteen and consequently joined the Salvation Army Officer Training College, after which he held five appointments as a Field Officer in both Victoria and South Australia, before being transferred to Red Shield War Services. These posts he held in Darwin and Launceston.

In 1948 he married Miss Shirley Phelps of Beaconsfield, Tas. and spent the next few years in secular employment, at the same time taking an active part as a layman in both the Salvation Army and the Methodist Church.

Early in 1955 he joined the staff of the Methodist Home Missions, and was appointed to Bronte Park, followed by appointments to Upper Derwent Valley, St. Marys, Mole Creek, returning to St. Marys seven years ago. During the last fifteen years, he worked in close co-operation with the clergy of other denominations and valued their friendship highly. He had a lifetime interest in brass bands, scouting and model aircraft and although not a native born Tasmanian was proud to call it his home state.

He leaves a widow, two daughters and six sons.

HERITAGE CORNER.

THE WEST COAST On the 22nd Nov., 1642, Abel Janszoon Tasman, three months out from Java in search of new trade routes, re-marked in his journal: "We found that our compasses were not as steady as they should be, and supposed that there might be mines of load-stone about here." Two days later, in the sunny afternoon, a sailor saw high land to the north east, now the peaks of Heemskirk and Zeehan, landmarks on the mountainous west coast of Tasmania. Tasman gave the sailor a pot of arrack rum and called the new land "van Diemenslandt."

Tasman's supposition of mineral wealth was , for Heemskirk yielded tin and Zeehan silver two and a half centuries later. Buried on the slopes of Mt. Heemskirk within sound of the ocean were millions of tons of black magnetite, 66 per cent iron and twenty miles from the coast was more copper than the Dutchman's world had ever seen, the copper of Mt. Lyell, which was to lie unmined until the age of railways and electricity.

On 28 Dec., 1815, James Kelly and four companions sailed up the west coast in an open whale boat and entered Macquarie Harbour, a narrow sheet of water 20 miles long.

This was no land of lightly timbered hills and fertile plains. Bleak mountain ranges, winter snow, tangled forest, and thick scrub; and land of heavy rainfall, swampy button-grass plains and swift rivers that cut through mountains like a knife.

Convicts were the first settlers in 1821 and escaping convicts were the first explorers, but few discoveries were reported. Most of the 100 odd men who absconded did not live to tell the tale.

In the following years, prospectors were unsuccessful in their search for gold and mineral exploration was virtually abandoned until James Smith, a 44 year old farmer discovered the rich tin deposits at Mt. Bischoff in 1871.

The McDonough brothers and Steve Karlson discovered the Mt. Lyell mine while looking for gold in 1883. The Mt. Lyell Mining Company was established in 1892 when the mining of silver and copper proved a bonanza.

Mt. Lyell is still mining copper profitably and might still be mining 100 years after the bold prophecy made by a Melbourne shareholder in 1898 that, when London is in ruins, the Mt. Lyell furnaces even then will be in blast and paying dividends to the descendants of all who are wise enough to bequeath their present holdings to their children.

WELCOME TO NEW HEADMASTER.

Parents and Friends of the St. Marys District School held their first meeting for 1970 last Tuesday night. The meeting was attended by over forty people.

The President of the Association, Mr. R. Legge welcomed the new headmaster Mr. D. Williams. Other new teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Clark from Victoria, Mr. C. Halmkin and Miss M. Poxon were also welcomed.

In a brief speech Mr. Williams said he considered that money raised by the Association should be used for luxuries that weren't ordinarily supplied to the school by the Government. He said too many funds from the Parents and Friends Assoc. were frittered away on purchasing items that were in fact the Education Department's responsibility. "I can run the school this year on my funds", he said. "You use your money to buy the luxuries." When asked by a member if he considered a learner's swimming pool a luxury, he replied "No. I consider it a necessity." He also said he was well pleased with the school buildings, his staff and the politeness of the children. He envisaged the children at the school would get an education equal to anywhere.

Mr. Legge in reporting on an interview with the Minister for Education said it had not been an entirely satisfactory meeting. The Minister had indicated Government consideration to allow the \$1,000 canteen money still outstanding to be spent within the school, most likely as an advance for three years against the school's library grant but nothing definite had been settled. On the question of Music and Phys.Ed. teachers, Mr. Legge said the Minister had said this was a matter of priorities and that at this point there were just not enough teachers in these fields to go around. Mr. Legge told the meeting that he sympathised with teacher shortages but when it was considered that Brooks High in Launceston had 1,100 pupils and three Phys.Ed teachers and St. Marys with 400 pupils had none, he was not sure how the priorities were supposed to work.

He also said he told the Minister that the local Council was not prepared to install water mains to a public building. The water was available but he considered it a Government responsibility to install their own mains. This matter is still under survey.

The meeting also decided to write to the department regarding school bus overcrowding and the inadequacy of financial allowances to the private carriage of school children.

GARDEN NOTES - by Seedpod

Most people will agree with you if you say there is not much doing in the vegetable garden these days. But have you thought of everything? Here are a few things to jog your memory. We should all have the three "C's" in. Cabbage, Cauliflower and Carrots. It is only necessary to see that they are in a well drained position that has been deeply dug and generously manured. Remember to get some Derris dust for the cabbage and cauliflower as there are a lot of white cabbage moths about this year.

Here are some other vegetables that can go in about this time of the year - Leeks, Turnips, Brusselsprouts and Swedes. There are some good varieties of Swedes which possess a very nice, sweet flavour. These go very well in the winter soups if you don't get yours out of a packet these days.

IN THE EYE OF THE LAW

The Rural Fires Board, acting on the recommendation of the Municipal Fire Committee, has declared a fire danger period in the Fingal Municipality as from 9th February, 1970. Although some parts of the municipality are possibly not yet experiencing dry and hazardous conditions, many parts, particularly to the west of Fingal, have become dry, and the extensive growth can be expected to create serious hazards on very hot days.

All householders are urged to take all possible precautions by removing unnecessary or accumulated growth near buildings. If you intend using an incinerator you must clear any growth or inflammable material away from it and keep a lid on when the fire is burning to prevent sparks escaping.

Landholders wishing to burn must make application to their local permit officer for authority to burn, whilst the ban is in force. It is requested that any such application be made in sufficient time to enable the permit officer to properly assess the situation when making his decision.

All residents should appreciate the action of the Rural Fires Board in conjunction with your Council in providing tanker units for the use of the Rural Brigades, but although these will be of great assistance, the use of precautionary measures by all responsible persons will be the more satisfactory means of averting damage or even tragedy.

"FOBBED OFF", CLAIMS FINGAL A.L.P.

At a recent meeting of the Fingal A.L.P., branch members expressed concern at the lack of enthusiasm shown by the Minister for Housing, Mr. D. Clark, M.H.A. as stated in a letter "that the housing situation at Fingal is being watched and consideration will be given to providing more houses if warranted."

Members were quick to point out that each time a Commission home becomes vacant in Fingal there are always several applicants. Further, there are some couples that have applied on more than one occasion for Commission homes and each time their application has been rejected or nothing has been heard of the application since.

Each member was confident in the potential growth and prosperity in the Fingal district but realized that without adequate housing the district is in danger of losing many young marrieds or young couples planning to marry in the near future.

Members also expressed concern at the disappearing bird life in Tasmania and have asked Mr. G. Duthie, M.H.R. to approach the Animal and Bird Protection Board for some explanation to their disappearance and ask what steps are being taken to protect native birds.

The meeting generally was not in favour of the change-over to the metric system and a letter has been forwarded to the Prime Minister, asking if more consideration be given to the change-over. Members felt that the huge cost involved could be more than useful in combating such things as poverty in Australia.

John Schier entered his first steeplechase event on Sat. 25th January last year and what an auspicious debut it proved to be! Not only did he finish within 100 yards of state steeplechase champion Terry Nailer, but he broke both the northern and Tasmanian sub junior records for the 3,000 metres by more than THREE MINUTES in an incredible display.

It was obvious to all who witnessed this performance that a lot more would be heard of John Schier in the Steeplechase, which is regarded as the most gruelling and demanding of all track events, with the spectacular water jump as the high light. With the state Junior 1,500 metres less than a month away, John was installed as nominal favourite for the title. His greatest opposition appeared to be Newstead's Peter Ford, who was the state record holder at 10:42.0 or only eight tenths of a second faster than John's best. The north Launceston camp was quietly confident that their recruit would land their first state title for 1969 - and they were more than justified in doing so.

The big day arrived, but John was not his cheery self; it appeared that the cartilage in his right knee had caused him some concern during the past week's training - today would be the big the big test. With his knee bandaged, John lined up for the event - the first time a state steeplechase championship had been conducted in Tasmania. John was fourth at the end of the first lap but was not running easily; half way through the second lap with John gradually losing touch with the leaders, the bandage came adrift! To stop and secure it would take precious seconds and we all sensed that John's chances of victory had faded. His hopes dashed and his cartilage causing pain, he withdrew at the end of the third lap - a bitterly dejected athlete - one almost on the point of tears. He felt that he had let the Club down. The title went to David Quarrell (Newstead) who gained selection in the Tasmanian Team with a run of 4:29.7 in a surprise result.

John was down and out; failure in the event he had so dearly wanted to win made him all the more determined to succeed next season. He would never toss in the towel!
