EDITORIAL

Recent reports on road accidents and fatalities in Tasmania indicate that to date no real solution has been found to reduce this appalling modern day waste of human life.

As fast as governments and other relevant bodies come up with solutions, so are they eventually discredited by a continuing rise in the graph of road deaths.

Nobody seems to see or admit they see what the real killer is....the car! No doubt road accidents are a result of three components that make modern driving so hazardous; that is the driver, the road and the car. But let's face it, in a perfectly safe car these deaths would not occur.

It may be impossible or far too uneconomical for car manufacturers to
produce the one hundred per cent
safe car, but surelyit is within
their ability to produce one a hundred per cent safer than they have
at present.

All the rigmarole on road safety these days seems bent on disguising this simple fact. Drivers are subjected to more and more restrictions and still the figures climb. How many restrictions havein the same time, been placed on the car manufacturers?

We all know the pap dished up to us from these quarters, safer radial tyres, power brakes, collapsible steering wheels etc. etc... but in the overall picture of car safety, these items add up to nothing more than a few token gestures.

In the State Parliament, Mr. Gough (Liberal-Franklin) has made the accusation that an some cars 'the paint is thicker than the metal and they have no more protection than a kersasene can'. How very true, and yet at the other end of the stick it

seems there are no limitations placed on the power and speed car manufacturers can put into these tin cans.

A Car trip along any of T asmania's major highways at the weekend, should convince anyone, to continually avoid the dangers of modern day driving is quite beyond the capabilities of the average driver. By the law of averages, sooner or later, even the best drivers will be confronted with a situation beyon d his control. It is then that the safety of his car becomes parament. But, too often this is not so. The picture of a concertined wreck is proof of the hopeless vulerability of the car in a side or head on collision. Until the car is taken from its almost G od-like pedestal and put back in its true image of functional, dependable and (con't Page 2)

I gave myself to Thee.'

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

John commenced the 1369-70 season on a bright note and proved to be an encouraging omen of things to come. First, he won the inaugural Northern High School open Cross Country Championship at Relbia in August in effortless that you can only get out of the sport what fashion, rather ironical because St. Marys were only competing by invitation and John showed his more favoured rivals a clean pair of heels. Secondly, at the Northern track championships for 1969 held at the Brooks High School oval, he swept all opposition aside to win clearly in race record time of 4 minutes 27 seconds for the open 1500 metres.

In his debut for the season in Launceston's interclub competition conducted at White City, John showed that he had matured greatly from the previous season and in mid-season form he slashed 28 seconds from the Northern Junior 3,000 metres steeplechase record in running 10:14.2 and qualified for coveted "A" grade in this event. In the annual North -v- South intrastate meeting in December he sliced a further 5 seconds from the record in running second to Senior Allan McCreary (South). It was at this stage that John, after conferring with North Launceston officials decided he would like to tackle the 1500 metres junior steeplechase with a view of bettering the state selection standard of 4 min. 30 seconds.

In his first attempt at the distance he recorded a somewhat disappointing 4:41 eleven seconds outside; but at his next attempt in late January, despite running the opening lap too fast he recorded 4:27.7 which broke the State record by 2 seconds and the State selection standard by 2.3 seconds. Since then he has gone from success to success - winning his first state title for the event and lowering his own record to an incredible 4:19.7 - well inside the state selection standard!

During this season he has also bettered past performances in other events on the track notable in the 800 metres (2:0.5) and the 1500 imbursed to John upon his return home. Donmetres (4:8.9). In the 1500 metres the vast improvement is clearly evident: 4:27 in October and 4:8.9 in February - an improvement Savings. of 18 seconds or 120 yards in the event which is just short of a mile:

THE AUSTRALIAN TITLES AND THE FUTURE??????

John will compete in 1500 metres Junior steeplechase championship of Australia in Adelaide on Sunday 22nd March and we wish him the very best of luck.

I think it would be extrememly optomistic to expect John to win the event or even gain a place in his first attempt on a cinder track against the best junior (under 19) steeplechasers in Australia - but at 17 John is eligible again next season for this event and the experience gained competing in Adelaide will prove invaluable to him for his big chance will be in March 1971 - only time will : tell; for if he continues to improve as much in the next 12 months as he has done in the past 12 months, Falmouth could well have

an Australian Athletic Championship medal winner to welcome home.

A word for aspiring athletes - John has gained his success the hard way - a lot of training and with complete dedication to his task which has now paid handsome dividends for him. It is true in Athletics to say you put into it!

John introduced another local boy to Launceston athletics this season in Craig Mitchell who shows promise and will prove a handy acquisition to the North Launceston Club. Should there be any others keen to compete, our club offers a warm welcome; simply contact John himself for further details.
