It has been said that the trouble with politicians is that they have both the longest and shortest memories of any other animal. In Fingal last week, the four Labour representatives upheld this eary admirably.



Foster all expounded at some length, and
and with extreme competence, but unfortunately they were subject to this makedy
of convenient memory lapses.

Mr. Recce, for instance, referred to many things, some local and some statewide, but because of the role of this paper, it is probably only necessary to dwell on those subjects relevant to this particular district.

The first subject forgotten was coal. Hobody mentioned coal. Probably naturally enough as it was, Mr. Reece who first knocked coal into its coffin so our present Government could busy itself nailing down the lid.

Mr. Reece was very rightly perturbed at the lack of employment opportunities and the Liberal Government was condemned for not making an effort to rectify this position. But how long ago was it that Mr. Reece was telling an audience in St. Harys that there was nothing his Government could do: At that mooting, Mr. Rocco said that if someone could come up with a workable idea, he would grasp it with both hands. There was no doubt that he was quite genuine when he said it but no ideas did come forward then, and he can hardly blame a following Government for being equally as impoverished now. Mr. Reece also expressed his fears about the infiltration of big contractors into the traditional realm of the small local contractor in the P.W.D.

On this subject and other criticisms about Mr. Bethunes change of mind on the three year Parliament, petrol tax, and inter-zone permits, he was on good solid ground and very convincing.

However, neither he nor Mr. Cashion were on very good foundations when relating to other issues involving Public Works.... They referred to the progress made on state and especially local roads while they were in office. Well, in 35 years progress at any speed would be inevitable and their assumption that the Liberal, Centre Coalition was heading for a mess, after one year in office, is hardly a valid argument. In fact, some lack of support for Labour last election in this area could have been traced directly to roads like the Rossarden and Storey's Creek Road, and there is little profit nov to claim they were going to seal this road if they had not been defeated. Mr. Fagan's speech was generally directed towards reminiscing and the basic idea of the Labour movement a thing he does extremely well. His sentiments were no no doubt shared by all present.

### IN THE EYE OF THE LAW

The season for fireworks is again with us, and it is desired to bring to notice of readers, the serious view the law takes with regard to letting-off fireworks in the streets and public places.

It is an accepted fact that children should not be deprived of the enjoyment of letting off their fireworks, but they should be taught and encouraged to do so within the limits of the law.

There is no restriction on the letting-off of fireworks on your property, but reasonable care should be taken to minimise the risk of injury.

On the other hand, Section 13(1)(f) of the

Police Offences Act, states: "No person, IN ANY PUBLIC PLACE, shall throw, let off, or set fire to any fireworks."

PENALTY: Forty dollars, or three months imprisonment.

The definition of "Public Place" is very broad, and includes almost any place, whether on payment of admission fee or not. The co-operation of all is sought, in order to prevent possible injury or annoyance to others, and eliminate the possibility of property damage.

### HEALTH NOTES

THE COMMON COLD - BABY CATCHES IT

In spite of all mother's precautions, baby may still catch his first cold. This makes it hard for him to breathe and he needs to take more breaths between sucks. A rison's statement. It is not difficult to transport a baby with a cold to a doctor's surgery and it is much better than getting panicky during the night and waiting for the docter to come in the morning.

Illness or disease does not meet resistance in the very small and the important thing is to have early consultation. While he is snuffly in his cot and finding it difficult to breathe, it is a good idea to raise his head a little. Put a pillow under the matti ress, or raise the back legs of the cot with ing of the Fire Brigade he would arrange a board on the floor. During feeding, make sure his nostrils are not gummed up with mucus. A little camphorated oil rubbed on his chest, may ease breathing. If you apply Vicks instead of camphorated oil, make sure you rub vaseline on his chest before the Vicks, as Vicks has a tendency to irritate tender baby skin.

If you want baby to avoid catching somebody else's cold, avoid concentrated groups of people, in buses, shops and crowded rooms. If you have to go into town, it is better to leave baby at home with grandma or a friend. Remember, the smaller he is, the more likely he is to catch a cold.




