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# EDITORIAL

Recent heavy rains in the Fingal Valley and the aftermath of flood and damage along the entire course of the South Esk, point to the need for some sort of organisation to cope with any emergency in the

Longford was probably the worst hit town during the flood, yet any accidents and danger were kept to a minimum. This was mainly due to the efforts of the Civil Defence organisation in that locality. It is even more remarkable to note that this organisation was only formed a short time before the flood disaster.

No loss of life occurred in our district and The Fingal Council Clerk reported damage was not excessive, when considering the extent of flooding. It would be a mistake, however, to assume that this would always be so. Give a slightly different set of circumstances, such as an already previously soaked ground, and the run off would have been far more extensive.

As it was, personal tragedy was only diverted by action on the part of individuals. It is not good enough, is it? Rain is For instance the case of a sick infant notoriously difficult to predict in this in the cut off town of Mathinna, whose condition was diagnosed by phone and duly treated, only turned out less serious because the necessary drugs happened to be available in the town.

With advent of civil defence, stocks of drugs in all necessary areas would be automatic. As would all first aid equipment and alternative communication, i.e. two way radio, all of which expense are wholly borneand supported by the govern-

To this paper's knowledge, Glamorgan and Fingal are the only two districts that do not have Civil Defence organisations in action, or at least on the way; yet in the past two years, with one of the worst droughts in history followed by one of the worst floods, we probably have more reason than most to have such an organis-

This paper would like to see steps taken to correct this anomally as soon as possible.

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# ERITAGE &

From Mr J Strochnetter, Ulverstone-Grey, its people, and the old School

What memories are conjured up and what feelings of nostalgia engendered when my mind goes back to that "old school" at Grey, which I attended in my initial schooldays. The site of the building was in the exact spot where Mr and Mrs Bert Denney now live. Later the site was changed and the second building is the house now owned by Mrs McLeay. The first building was completely wooden in structure, with one long room for the schoolroom, and a small skillion room attached which was used by the teacher as a general purpose room and sleeping quarters. Can you visualise 54 scholars packed into one room with a small fireplace to provide warmth in the cold winter months and a door that had to be kept open so often for hygenic purposes. The teacher's name was O.E. Holmes, and you can imagine his difficulties and problems with 54 scholars broken into 7 classes which he managed single handed. How he did it I will never know, the noise of teaching one class must have distracted the scholars of other classes studying, yet he did this year after year. can understand now, how he would become irritated and vent his temper on some poor unfortunate scholar who was backward. We dubbed him Paddy Holmes (behind his back of course), but he was a wonderful teacher and turned out some really good scholars. He got some relief in later years as I was sufficiently advanced to teach the two lower classes having passed the sixth class exam after only four years at school (pretty good, eh). The playing space at the school was restricted, and boys and girls shared the same small playing

Many of the children attending the school came from considerable distances. I remember one family named King who used to walk from Irish Town upwards of three miles across country, over fences, fallen trees, along tracks; through bushes hanging with white frost or saturated with rain in the winter time, over streams bridged with only a log, and turn up at school only just in time to fall into ranks prior to entering school. The teacher would form each class into a separate rank and then give the order 'Mark Time'. You can just imagine the clatter - 50 well shod children, the boys and some of the girls wearing hobnail boots as they marched to their desks along a bare wooden floor.

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Why should we become Blood Donors?
By courtesy of the Australian
Red Cross

The mobile unit of the Red Cross Transfusion Service will visit St Marys in July.

The Blood Transfusion Service depends entirely on its voluntary donors. They receive no tangible reward. But when blood is wanted the need is often desperate, and by giving your blood you can help save lives. In these days few people will get the opportunity for acts of dramatic heroism, but almost everyone can be a blood donor. Our donor panels in Australia are only just big enough to meet the daily needs of the hospitals. In any sort of emergency, and especially in a nuclear war, we would need far more blood than we get now. Help us to be ready.

# WHAT WILL IT INVOLVE?

No more than once in three months you will be asked to give blood if you can; You are free to refuse any call if you wish. At the transfusion centre or mobile unit, this is what will happen. When you arrive, a tiny drop of blood will be taken from your finger or ear lobe, and tested to see that you are not anaemic. If the test is satisfactory you will lie on a couch, and a pneumatic bandage will be wrapped around your upper arm. With a very small needle an injection of local anaesthetic will be given at the bend of the elbow; this deadens the skin. Then a needle with a tube attached will he inserted into a vein; this is completely painless. The blood will run into a bottle out of sight in five minutes or so. When the donation is complete the needlwill be removed, and you will rest for a while hefore going to another room for refreshments. That is all there is to giving blood. It is almost painless, not at all unpleasant, and no hellthy person is any the worse for it.

If you are an enrolled donor, remember the date which will be advertised in this paper and come along to the Institute.

The Blood Bank calls only 3 times each year. You can register at any time with the -Hon. Secretary - Mrs C Niel Hon. Treasurer - Mr J Spilsbury OR just turn up at the Institute St Marys anytime between 6.30 and 9pm on July 14th, 1969

# TAR LEVELS Significant in Cancer

Tar content in cigarettes is a significant factor in lung cancer, says the Director of Victoria's Anti-Cancer Council (Dr Nigel Gray)

The council has released results of tar-content tests, which revealed that tar in some cigarettes was as much as six times higher than others.

Ransom cigarettes had a tar content of 5.lmilligrams while Phillip Morris contained 32.3 mgs.

Dr Gray said low tar content cigarettes were safest.

The conncil wants the tar content printed on the packet. It has been testing the tar content in cigarettes at the Monash University for 18 months.

Results of the first tests were released last November. The latest figures brought the total number of cigarettes tested to 34.

There is a considerable amount of confusion with regard to the responsibilities of owners in the transfering of registration when disposing of or acquiring, a vehicle.

An amendment to the Traffic Regulations gazetted on 29th of April 1969, has clarified the position. There are several requirements which must be complied with in order to keep a registration current.

Firstly, when a registered motor vehicle is sold, or otherwise disposed of, the registered owner MUST, WITHIN THREE DAYS, notify the Registrar of motor vehicles accordingly.

The new owner MUST, WITHIN FOURTEEN DAYS, make application to the Registrar for transfer of the Registration to his name. mountain (N.S.W.) 5.Betray (2) 6.King The fee for this is \$1.00 plus stamp duty of beasts 8. Surprised 9. Worthy 13. "and at the rate of 50 cents for each \$100 of the value of the vehicle.

These applications should be made at a police station, where all necessary forms are available for your convenience. It is also the responsibility of the new owner to advise the insurance company which holds the third party insurance on the vehicle.

Failure to comply with these requirements could lead to prosecution, but an equally important factor is the complications that could arise if your improperly registered vehicle is involved in an accident, and especially one which causes death or injury to any person.
