## EDITORIAL

Censorship - what foolishness is this?

The recent peculiarities of Australian censorship do nothing to enhance the public's faith in a system, which like Topsy, seems 'to have just growed.' To begin with, the lack of uniformity in the laws which govern censorship in individual states, highlights just how much these laws ultimately become simply someone's opinion. For instance a play which was recently banned in Queensland, because it would corrupt Queensland morals, is readily accepted in N.S.W. It would be nonsense to assume that New South Welshmen are less corruptible than their neighbours, just as it is equally nonsense to assume the New South Wales authorities care less. So where does this standard lie?

Unfortunately, because of all this shenanigan, it is tradition for the censorship laws to constantly harbour on the evils of sex, nudity or indecent language. It is often difficult to see which evils we are being kept from. To take them one by one; Sex has been with us a long time and it must be accepted that nudity is an integral part of any sexual relationship.

Thirdly, any junior school child by the time he or she reaches sixth grade, have one way or another, had a thorough grounding in indecent language. So called indecent words spoken in public, are after all, only reiterating something that has already been heard or said a dozen times by even the most angelic child (who, incidentally, does not seem to suffer unduly in after life.)

It is however, universally accepted that the majority of people do not want to be subjected to foul language, nudity or sex in public and because of this, we have laws to protect their interests. What constantly niggles this writer is the ballyhoo which invariably arises when some playwright, either for realism or effect, writes a nude scene or a fourletter word in his script. If anyone objects, the answer seems quite simple - don't see the play.

The whole business of censorship often becomes comic opera in its absurdity. It would be laughable if it wasn't for the overall effect of personal restrictions. Worse, the red herring it draws across the far more important, need to censor blatant acts of cruelty and violence.



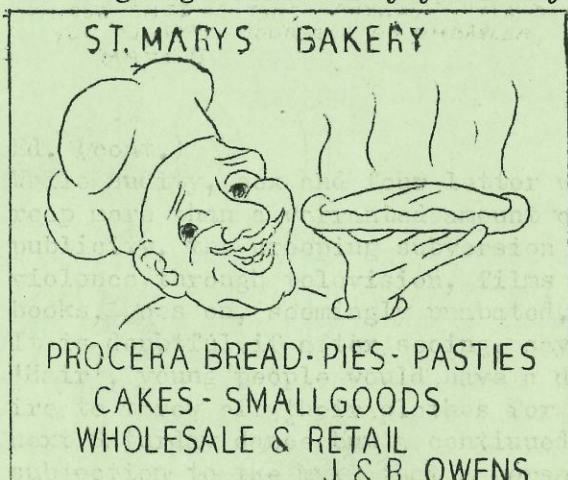

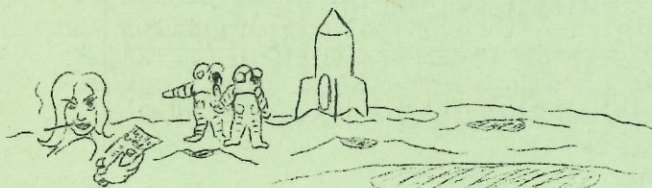

## GARDENING NOTES

During the winter months most plant life and growth slows down. Because of this fact the months of June and July are the best time for pruning fruit trees. The object of pruning is for the proper regulation of the branches, so as to encourage the production of blossom, and the maturing of heavy crops of good fruit. Many trees will crop heavily enough without much attention, but the quality is often very poor. A tree should be pruned to achieve a well balanced shape and the elimination of any very low branches or those which cross the centre of the tree. Once having achieved a well shaped tree it is generally acceptable practice to prune small fruit bearing branches back to the second bud. A good knowledge of pruning can only be obtained by practice and careful observation

# HERITAGE CORNER

The first homes of the early settlers were roughly built dwellings made of bark or 'wattle and daub'. Both the walls and roof of bark huts were sheets of stringy-bark fixed, rough side out, to frame of poles. The walls of 'wattle and daub' houses were made of clay, reinforced by small branches and twigs of trees; the roof was often thatched with rushes. Floors were sometimes of split slab of wood, but more often of clay. Later, solid homes of stone and brick were built. It was found that the best reinforcing ' wattles ' were the twiggy branches of certain kinds of acacias, so the trees became known as wattle trees. (Gum trees - the Eucalypts - got their name from the red sticky gum that forms in the wood and dries in crystals on the bark of the trees.)

Many of the fine country houses which still stand in Tasmania were built during the period of land grants and convict labour. Among the assigned servants were skilled stonemasons and they made excellent use of the local architect, James Blackburn, transported for forgery, designed some of Tasmania's fine old stone churches and living memorial to him in this Valley is the beautiful church of St. Thomas at Avoca.

IN THE EYE OF THE  
LAW

The indiscriminate dumping of rubbish on roads and roadsides, is causing concern to the police, public works and council officers, who are charged with the responsibility of law enforcement.

It is also a cause of concern and even disgust, for many law abiding citizens who take pride in their town, district and state.

The disposal of the ordinary items, such as wrappers, ice cream containers and cordial bottles etc. does not prove difficult, if some thought is given to the many street containers provided. Household garbage and rubbish should of course, be deposited at the local rubbish tip.

From the point of view of law enforcement, you are reminded that there are several offences created by the Tasmanian Statutes, in all cases providing for severe monetary penalties for convicted offenders.

It is an offence under the Roads and Jetties Act to deposit rubbish on a road. The offence of "committing a nuisance" under the Police Offences Act, includes the depositing of rubbish in a public place.

The Traffic Regulations prohibit the throwing of bottles from motor vehicles when travelling on public streets. From this it can be seen that the law takes a serious view of this matter and contravention of the above mentioned laws could result in your appearance in the Court of Petty Sessions. This action is not desired, because all would far sooner have the co-operation of citizens giving some thought to the elimination of this undesirable practice, and thereby enhancing the beauty of the countryside.

ST MARYS DISTRICT PROGRESS ASS. REPORT

At the monthly meeting of the St Marys District Progress Association, the Secretary reported from the minutes about five projects the committee has on its agenda. Unfortunately owing to sickness the constructing of seats for the St Marys area had been delayed, but this was now in hand and it was envisaged these would be completed by the next meeting.

Negotiations are now taking place between the Association and the Fingal Coal Company for the use of Old Cornwall Coal Mine as a tourist attraction.

Also with the collaboration of the Fingal Council, prospects of a park at the back of the St Marys Library now seem very bright. This also applies to a bush walking path at the top end of the St Marys Pass and a corner at the main intersection in St Marys.

Possibly the brightest news is the information that the Public Works Department has now given permission for the Progress Association to beautify this particular corner.

# FINGAL COUNCIL NOTES

The Works Superintendent, Mr. T. Yates reported to Council that all roads were now open after the recent heavy floods, but that most repairs had only been of a temporary nature as money from the Government was still awaited. A culvert had been renewed at Fingal. Mr. Yates said the intake weir at Fingal was in a dangerous position as the supporting bank had been washed away. The erection of three concrete piers was recommended. Council decided to accept Mr. Yates' recommendation as the work was considered necessary.

Mr. V. Steel of Mathinna had been engaged as a dozer driver and it was decided to advertise for a carpenter, as there was no carpenter on the staff at present. The Council Clerk reported, after some negotiation, he had been able to obtain a favourable trade in price for the present utility. Cr. Johnson moved a new one be purchased. It was also deemed necessary to find out more details, as to travelling costs etc. re the maintenance mechanic. The Council Clerk pointed out that although travelling from Launceston was \$22.50, the mechanic could service both graders and the loader on the same day, therefore cutting costs.

## ROSSARDEN

A letter was read from the headmaster of the school asking that the drain be carried past the school fence as recent rains had caused flooding of the play area. A letter from the Education Department along the same lines, was also read. Cr. Davy recommended this be done while the gang was there. The motion was carried. Cr. Davy reported Pepper Hill was in an ideal condition for sealing at the moment and thought the present Government should be approached about this, as Mr Cashion's promise to do this had only been of a verbal nature.

## SCAMANDER

A letter from the Progress Association asked if Council could do anything about lighting the bridge. The Department had promised to meet 50% of the cost and would arrange the appropriate measures with the Hydro. Council decided to ask the Hydro for figures relating to cost etc. before approaching Portland Council to share the cost. Cr. Hinds said he had received a complaint about the Tip being infested with rats. The Health Inspector promised to investigate.

## AVOCA

The P.M.G. Department asked if Council had any objection to the P.M.G. moving a telephone booth from its present position, as it was now a traffic hazard. Council decided to inspect an alternative site. Cr. Foote asked that watercovering the footpath near the Bush Nursing Centre be attended to. The Health Inspector said that rats at the tip had been effectively poisoned with Ten 80.

## ST. MARYS

Water samples from Newman's and Margison's weir, the District Hospital and the school, also the school milk supply, had been tested on request from the Health Department, as the Dept. had received a complaint re gastro enteritis being prevalent in the district. The Health Inspector reported satisfactory plans from Mr. J. Owens for his bakehouse were still not available, as the architect had promised them but not obliged. Council allowed a further 14 days for Mr. Owens to lodge plans with Council. The Progress Association asked for street signs for St. Marys, which Council reviewed favourably and agreed to enquire into costs. The Progress Association also asked for a sketch plan of Council property of the area behind the library, as long range plans were in hand to beautify this land as a park and play area. The Warden expressed pleasure at the civic spirit of the Association and said Council would help to the best of their ability.

## CORNWALL

A letter from Mrs. Camplin was read re the shelter shed for school children. Cr. Hinds + said due to incorrect reporting in the local press, the residents of Cornwall did not think he had supported the shed. The Warden said he had understood Council had undertaken to enquire into Education Department policy on the matter before doing anything. The Education Department had so far not replied to Council.

(Editor's note; + We would like to point out, we reported one remark only of Cr. Hinds and the motion moved by Cr. Davis, and deny any inexactitudes on this issue. )

Fingal's second successive defeat has given new heart to the other Association teams and has thrown further emphasis on just how open the competition is this season. 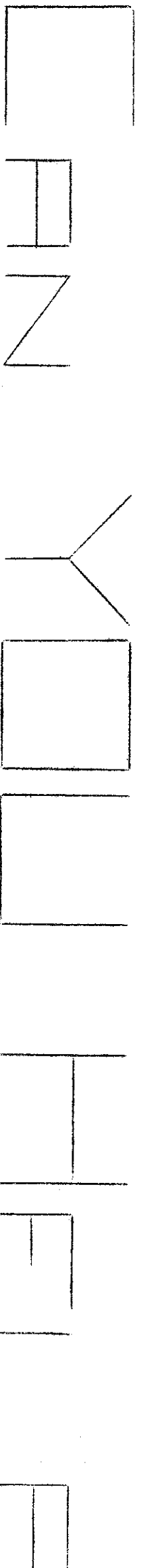

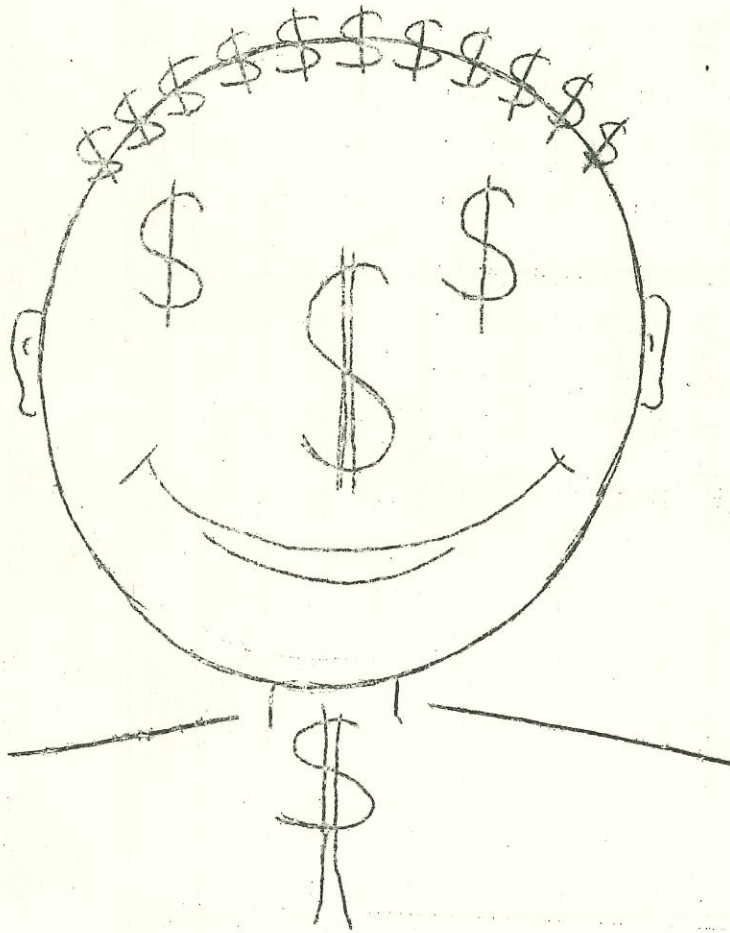
