WHO MAY GET FAMILY ALLOWANCE?

You may get it if:

you are a legal resident of Austra-LOW MUCH YOU GET lia, and have lived here for at least 12 months or intend to live here permanently. AND

you care for at least one child under 16 years,

dependent full-time student aged 16-17 years (if the taxable income of you and your spouse in the 1985-86 financial year was \$39,000 or less)

* dependent full-time student aged 16-24 years if you get or are eligible to get -

-family income supplement (FIS) or have income below FIS limits
-orphan's pension, handicapped
child's allowance (HCA) or Abor-

-additional payment for the student under your pension, benefit or allowance.

A student is dependent if the students income, or income you get for them is less than:

50 YEARS AGO JANUARY 1937 from TASMANIA - THE JEWEL OF THE COMMONWEALTS!

Central Government
The main lines of the present
Constitution were laid down by
an Act of the Tasmanian Parliament
in 1855. These have been modified
from time to time and, of course,
modified by Federation. Parliament
consists of two elected Houses.
The Legislative Council of 18
members is elected by free-holders
of £10, and leaseholders of £30,
annual value. Returned soliders
also are entitled to vote. Three
members retire annually, and the
Council cannot be dissolved as a
whole.

The House of Assembly is elected on adult suffrage for a maximum of three years and consists of 30 members returned for five six member constituencies, which are the same as the Commonwealth electoral divisions. The system of voting is substantially the Hare system of the single transferrable vote, with the obligation to record at least three preference. Casual vacancies are filled from the results of the previous elections, and this muthod has been found satisfactory in practice. Voting for both Houses is compulsory.

'axation The State imposes graduated taxes on incomes and on land and estates passing at death. Income tax is much the most important. The Income Tax Act provides exemptions on incomes of less than £125 and in the case of married persons of £200. Deductions from taxable amounts of £1 for every £2 by which the income is less than \$500, and also a deduction of £39 for each child, are allowed to married taxpayers, and £1 for every £6 by which the income is less than £400 to unmarried persons. The rate per L on taxable incomes from business ranges from 4d. to 1/7, and on incomes from property from 4d. to 1/11. The tax on companies is 1/6in the £. In addition a Special Income Tax of 4d. in the £ is imposed on incomes up to £312 without exemption, rising to a rate of 1/- in the £ on incomes in excess of £1500.

A number of food products have been given the Heart Food Festival seal of approval - look for the Heart Food Festival signs in your supermarket.

Include the following types of foods as part of your healthy varied diet:

- read and cerealproducts (rice,
- . spaghetti, breakfast cereal)
- Vegetables and fruit
- Lean meats, fish poultry, dried beans and lentils,
- Low fat dairy foods (yoghurt, milk cheese)
- Polyunsaturated oils and polyunsaturated margarines (in small amounts)

What is happening in Tasmania? Retail outlets (supermarkets) will be involved in promoting "Heart Food. Festival products - foods which are consistent with the Foundation's guide lines. Supermarkets will display Heart Food Festival approved product and some will conduct displays and demonstrations. Many Community Healt Centres will participate with activities such as literature and poster displays and cooking demonstrationclasses. Food manufacturers and producer organisations are being encour aged to continue efforts to develop and market foods that will make it easier for the consumer to follow the Foundation's guidelines. Caterers in : many areas (hospitals, work canteens, nursing homes, armed services) will be encouraged to provide meals in line with the Foundation's dietary guidelines through production of a quantity cookbook tentatively entitle. "Cooking for Plenty".

To determine choldsterol levels we now have established two risk assessment clinics with a third being developed. A Health fit caravan will visit rural areas throughout the state and will ensure all Tasmanians may be assessed.

Dear Ray,

Some years ago, a local branch of the Arts Council of Australia was founded in the Fingal Valley, which by its efforts and with the benefit of Federal funds, enabled many high quality programmes to be staged on the East Coast. Sadly, it was all too good to last, and it was not long before we were cut off in our prime -financially that is.

So a brief but much appre-

ciated period of cultural experience for one of the State's most isolated communities, passed into oblivion, leaving only a few dollars in a savings account to record the memory. Ironically however, while recollections grow dimmer, interests at bank have risen and our terminal few dollars now boast a modest three figures. Believing it most unlikely that the good old days will ever return, we two now rapidly ageing former office-bearers desire that the residual Arts Council funds be put to better and more appropiate use.
