## HELP FOR FAMILIES

### WHO MAY GET FAMILY ALLOWANCE?

You may get it if:

- \* you are a legal resident of Australia, and have lived here for at least 12 months or intend to live here permanently.
- AND
- \* you care for at least one child under 16 years,

OR

dependent full-time student aged 16-17 years (if the taxable income of you and your spouse in the 1985-86 financial year was \$39,000 or less)

OR

- \* dependent full-time student aged 16-24 years if you get or are eligible to get -
  - family income supplement (FIS) or have income below FIS limits
  - orphan's pension, handicapped child's allowance (HCA) or Aboriginal Secondary Assistance Scheme for the student
  - additional payment for the student under your pension, benefit or allowance.

A student is dependent if the student's income, or income you get for them is less than:

- \* \$3,000 a year (living at home)
- \* \$4,750 a year (living away from home)

Family allowance is not paid for a student who gets a Commonwealth Education Assistance allowance such as Austudy or the Aboriginal Study Assistance Scheme.

You may be paid for children not yet in Australia if you are bringing them to Australia within a reasonable time. The allowance may be paid if either you or your children are overseas temporarily.

### HOW TO CLAIM

Ask for a claim form at any Social Security office. We will post you one if you wish. You should claim family allowance as soon as you think you are eligible. If you do not claim within six months of becoming eligible, you may only be paid from when you claim. The information you give is kept confidential.

There is a special form for dependent

full-time students aged between 16-25 years.

### HOW MUCH YOU GET

ONE CHILD (monthly)	\$22.80
TWO CHILDREN	\$55.35
THREE CHILDREN	\$94.35
FOUR CHILDREN	\$133.35

For each extra child add

\$45.55 a Mth.

More money is paid in addition to family allowance, for children of multiple births until the children are six years old -

\*triplets (monthly) \$150.00

\*quads or higher multiples \$200.00

Family allowance is not taxable.

The allowance is paid monthly directly to your -

\*bank account

\*credit union account, or

\*building society account.

Family allowance for a child under 16 does not stop if the child has income. IT Does stop when -

- \*the child is no longer dependent on you (e.g. the child marries, the child leaves your care) or
- \*the child is granted a pension or benefit.

For a student 16 years or over the allowance stops when he or she -

- \*gives up full-time study
- \*is no longer dependent on you (e.g. the child marries, the child leaves your care, the child's income or the income you get for them is over certain limits)
- \*gets one of the Commonwealth Education allowances
- \*is granted a pension or benefit.

Family allowance may stop if you or your child goes overseas.

### FAMILY INCOME SUPPLEMENT

Family income supplement is a tax-free fortnightly payment to provide additional income support to low income families with children. Payment is made for children under 16 years and dependent full-time students under 25 years.

You may be eligible for payment of \$17 a week if your weekly income (including your wife's or husband's income) is \$248 (gross) or less. (A wife or husband includes a defacto wife or husband)

As your income rises above \$248 a week payment will come down.

50 YEARS AGO JANUARY 1937 from  
TASMANIA - THE JEWEL OF THE  
COMMONWEALTH

Central Government

The main lines of the present Constitution were laid down by an Act of the Tasmanian Parliament in 1855. These have been modified from time to time and, of course, modified by Federation. Parliament consists of two elected Houses. The Legislative Council of 18 members is elected by free-holders of £10, and leaseholders of £30, annual value. Returned soliders also are entitled to vote. Three members retire annually, and the Council cannot be dissolved as a whole.

The House of Assembly is elected on adult suffrage for a maximum of three years and consists of 30 members returned for five six member constituencies, which are the same as the Commonwealth electoral divisions. The system of voting is substantially the Hare system of the single transferable vote, with the obligation to record at least three preferences. Casual vacancies are filled from the results of the previous elections, and this method has been found satisfactory in practice. Voting for both Houses is compulsory.

Taxation

The State imposes graduated taxes on incomes and on land and estates passing at death. Income tax is much the most important. The Income Tax Act provides exemptions on incomes of less than £125 and in the case of married persons of £200. Deductions from taxable amounts of £1 for every £2 by which the income is less than £500, and also a deduction of £39 for each child, are allowed to married taxpayers, and £1 for every £6 by which the income is less than £400 to unmarried persons. The rate per £ on taxable incomes from business ranges from 4d. to 1/7, and on incomes from property from 4d. to 1/11. The tax on companies is 1/6 in the £. In addition a Special Income Tax of 4d. in the £ is imposed on incomes up to £312 without exemption, rising to a rate of 1/- in the £ on incomes in excess of £1500.

HEART WEEK - APRIL 28 - MAY 1

What is Heart Week?

As heart disease is the largest single cause of death in Australia, every year the National Heart Foundation runs a community awareness campaign. This year's Heart Week theme is "Help Your Heart", aimed at promoting good nutrition and encouraging eating habits which can help prevent heart disease.

Heart Week Festival

In conjunction with Heart Week, the National Heart Foundation's Heart Food Festival is aimed at you, the consumer, to demonstrate that healthy eating can be fun, easy and delicious.

A number of food products have been given the Heart Food Festival seal of approval - look for the Heart Food Festival signs in your supermarket.

Include the following types of foods as part of your healthy varied diet:

- bread and cereal products (rice, spaghetti, breakfast cereal)
- Vegetables and fruit
- Lean meats, fish poultry, dried beans and lentils.
- Low fat dairy foods (yoghurt, milk cheese)
- Polyunsaturated oils and polyunsaturated margarine (in small amounts)

What is happening in Tasmania?

Retail outlets (supermarkets) will be involved in promoting "Heart Food Festival" products - foods which are consistent with the Foundation's guide lines. Supermarkets will display Heart Food Festival approved products and some will conduct displays and demonstrations. Many Community Health Centres will participate with activities such as literature and poster displays and cooking demonstration classes. Food manufacturers and producer organisations are being encouraged to continue efforts to develop and market foods that will make it easier for the consumer to follow the Foundation's guidelines. Caterers in many areas (hospitals, work canteens, nursing homes, armed services) will be encouraged to provide meals in line with the Foundation's dietary guidelines through production of a quantity cookbook tentatively entitled "Cooking for Plenty".

To determine cholesterol levels we now have established two risk assessment clinics with a third being developed. A Health fit caravan will visit rural areas throughout the state and will ensure all Tasmanians may be assessed.
