### GETTING THE MOST OUT OF YOUR TYRES

The life of a tyre depends not only on how far you drive, but the type of driving you do on city or country roads, and the speeds you travel.

At 80kph on a trip your tyres will last almost twice as long as they would if you were doing 100kph. Taking a corner fast or accelerating hard away from traffic lights can rip up to 30 kilometres worth of rubber off your tyres. Harsh braking will also severely reduce tyre life.

The days when motorists used to be advised to rotate their tyres from side to side are over. But it's still desirable to change them from front to back to make them last longer. It is advisable to swap the front tyres for the rear ones every 15,000 kilometres in order to equalize tread wear and gain maximum life. Changing from side to side or what is termed "cross changing" is no longer recommended where radial types are specified.

It is quite safe to replace your tyres two at a time, that is the two back tyres for the two front ones, provided the same type are fitted.

If the manufacturer specifies radial ply tyres you should replace them with radials, not cross-ply tyres. Do not mix radial tyres with cross-ply tyres. The different characteristics of the tyres can result in dangerous handling problems if you have cross-ply on one side and radials on the other. If you have radials on the front you must have radials on the rear.

It is less important that the pattern on the new ones is the same as that on the old, although it's desirable, as a change in pattern may alter the level of tyre noise in some circumstances.

Motorists should look for wear indicators, which show up as bars across the tread meaning a tyre is nearing the end of its life. Inadequate tread depth can result in

"aquaplaning" or reduced adhesion on wet roads. Shocks incurred while driving such as hitting kerbs and pot holes can damage a tyre's internal supporting cords. Tyres should also be checked regularly for any cuts in the sidewalls and any stones or obstructions in the tread, should be removed. Any unusual bulges in tyre walls will probably indicate a broken cord and the tyre should be replaced immediately to avoid a blow out.

Generally today's tyres should be capable of lasting 30,000 to 40,000 kilometres, but this can be far less if you fail to keep your tyres inflated correctly.

Driving on under-inflated tyres is the most common cause of tyre deterioration. Under-inflated tyres can overheat and the damage caused, can produce a blowout, which is likely to have serious consequences at high speed. On the other hand, over-inflation produces wear on the centre of the tyre.

Tyre pressures should be increased to the recommended maximum, where higher road speeds or fully laden conditions apply.

It is always a wise idea to look at the condition of your tyres and check the pressure before leaving home, particularly if your car has been standing for any length of time. If checking the tyres when filling the car with petrol, it is important to bear in mind that true readings can't be obtained after the vehicle has been driven sufficiently to create higher tyre temperatures and hence higher pressures.

Wheel alignment and tyre balance should be checked at least once a year. Abnormal wear on front tyres, such as, on the inside of the tread indicates an alignment problem. Scalloping tyre wear patterns indicate they are out of balance. (Taken from the August issue of Motor News.)

## HEALTH - ALLERGIES

### Food Allergy

Food allergy is very fashionable, and perhaps predictably a tremendous amount of nonsense is spoken and written about it. Many asthmatics are unnecessarily subjected to inconvenient, expensive, and boring diets which may even lead to malnutrition.

There is no doubt that food allergy can precipitate attacks of asthma.

The best examples are so obvious that the diagnosis can be made without the help of a doctor or allergy testing. These dramatic reactions may occur to egg, milk, yeast, peanuts, nuts, soya bean products or seafoods.

The blood tests, called RASTS, give the same information as skin testing.

### PETS

Allergy to furry animals such as cats and dogs is usually fairly obvious, as it is often accompanied by other symptoms such as itching and streaming of the eyes, blocking or running of the nose, and sneezing. A problem may occur when a family pet is kept inside the family home.

Dander (flakes of skin rather like dandruff) will become part of the house dust, spreading to all parts of the house. This means that animal dander will be present at all times, and no clear relationship between symptoms and exposure to the pet will be apparent.

### POLLENS

In this part of the world allergy to pollens is very common. Grass pollens are the main offenders, although some weeds and trees may be involved also.

The nose and eyes usually bear the brunt of the attack with running, itching, and congestion making up the typical symptoms of hay fever.

The response occurs in the same way every time the food is eaten, occurs rapidly, and may be associated with other symptoms involving the skin, nose, eyes or stomach and bowel.

Skin and blood tests for allergies to these foods are reasonably reliable and may be helpful if the food responsible is in doubt.
