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RED CROSS

The Red Cross, St. Marys has been in existence for about forty-eight years.

The branch was originally commenced during the First World War, 1914-1918. The branch lapsed for a few years but resumed activities again in the early part of the second World War, 1939-1945.

During that time the St. Marys branch contributed both knitting and sewing to the local hospital. During the war years members sent food parcels to the soldiers on active duty.

In the early days, funds were raised by means of street stalls and later, euchre nights. These nights proved very popular, and would be well remembered by many of our more senior citizens. Nowadays the only method of raising money is the Annual Appeal and generous donations.

For several years the branch held a Christmas party with a tree and gifts for hospital patients. During the Vietnam War the branch sent the soldiers Christmas cakes.

Following the second World War, the Ambulance Service was established and is still actively maintained and free to residents of the Fingal Municipality. There have been several different ambulances over the years, about five including the current vehicle. It is envisaged that a second vehicle may be required in the future.

The Red Cross blood donor service has been in existence for about 25 years, initiated by Dr. Lawson. The blood donor service, a very valuable service, is held in St. Marys three to four times a year. Trained staff travel to the area for the Monday evening sessions and the staff are aided by local Red Cross members. A donor has to be over 18 years of age, and all are initially and continuously screened to ensure maximum health and service.

Red Cross, through the main branches in Launceston and Hobart, provides disabled persons with an as-

sessment of aids including wheelchairs, crutches, walking sticks and walking frames. This service is available through the Red Cross Sec., Local Hospital Community Service or Red Cross Offices direct.

The extensive library at the St. Marys District Hospital is supplied by Red Cross and includes many large print books for those with sight problems. The books are replenished with the help of local branch members bi-annually.

The members meet every second month, in the evening, in their own time. The voluntary ambulance drivers meet at least monthly and attend courses as the need arises. The drivers drive, or man the ambulance when required, on a roster basis. It is preferable that drivers hold a current first-aid certificate.

The Red Cross supplies a public service on a voluntary basis and should an emergency situation arise the members rally immediately to help in any way possible. They frequently help people and families in crisis. Should a bush fire occur in the area, for example, the Red Cross stand by and supply help, usually food, fluids, first aid and emotional support.

A junior Red Cross was formed in St. Marys several years ago by a St. Marys District High School Principal, Mr Heazlewood and his wife, but lapsed after one year when they left the district.

A very active junior group was attached to Fingal Primary School for many years, and supplied many comforts and visits to the St. Marys hospital patients. The St. Marys junior Red Cross group attempted to reform on several occasions, the last one being successful, in July of 1987.

The Red Cross, St. Marys Branch, is always on the look out for interested members and more volunteers to boost their ranks.

NEWSLETTER BICENTENARY '88

The Bicentenary should be a year for all Australians to feel proud. Over the past 200 years Australia has become home to people from many different countries and backgrounds. We have shared the hard work needed to develop our country, and with understanding and compassion we have welded into a united, prosperous and peaceful society. TASMANIAN EXPERIENCE MAY HELP CHINA TO CONTROL HYDATIDS
PRESS RELEASE

A delegation of Chinese Veterinary Experts arrived in Tasmania this week to study the methods of Hydatids control used in this State which have proved so successful in the eradication of the disease in Tas.

The party consisted of Mr. Chi, Pusheng who was the leader, and is a Research Veterinarian at the Sinkiang Vet Institute of the Academy of Animal Science; Madame Cheng, Yifang who is the Chief Researcher at the Institute of Animal Parasitology in Shanghai. The third member was Mr. Yang, Yan Project Officer from the Chinese Academy of Agricultural Science in Beijing. (Peking)

They were accompanied by Dr. Paul Vitolovich, a Veterinarian with the Department of Primary Industries in Canberra.

Dr. Chris Donaldson, Senior Veterinary Officer with the Department of Agriculture at Deloraine who is presently in charge of the Department's Hydatid policy organised the 4 day trip.

This is the third visit of Chinese Medical and Veterinarian experts to come to this State. The first party came in September, 1985 and another group came in March, 1987. Japanese Veterinary Officials have also visited Tasmania for the same purpose. Hydatids is a problem in both those countries.

The fact that these officials were sent to Tasmania to study the hydatid control programme here, highlights the world-wide recognition of the success of the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Campaign.

Tasmania's success in virtually eradicating this disease from the island in 25 years is the envy of many other countries in the world which have a hydatid problem.

During their four day visit to Tasmania, the party spent two days in Launceston with Senior Veterinary Officials at the Department of Agriculture's Headquarters at Prospect; saw dog testing at a Hydatid Test Strip, visited a small local abattoir near Bracknell; and inspected farm killing and municipal offal disposal methods in the midlands.

In Hobart they spent a day of fact finding at the Clinical School of the University of Tasmania where they were shown a collection of human hydatid specimens in the museum by the Chairman of the Hydatids Council, Dr. John Goldsmid.

In the afternoon they were given a slide lecture by Dr. T.C. Beard, the Hydatid Council's Founder.

HYDATIDS IN CHINA

Although Hydatid Disease is found in 21 out of 29 Provinces in China, it is most prevalent in the Western half of the country bordering Mongolia, the U.S.S.R. and Tibet. Most of this area is taken up by the Province of Sinkiang, which is the size of Western Aust. and occupies one-sixth of the Peoples Republic of China, (pop. 11 million). 50% of the sheep in this Province are infected with Hydatids and about 15% of the dogs.

A campaign to reduce the incidence of the disease has only recently started and the team visiting Tasmania said they could learn a lot from our experience.

Since the first party of Veterinary and Medical experts visited Tasmania in 1985, they have started dog testing and are conducting abattoir surveys and collecting hospital records. Eighteen senior scientists are working on the campaign in different parts of the country.

Although Dr. Chi said they have 2,000 surgical cases of hydatids reported each year, this is a very small percentage from a population of 1.1 billion people; 1,000 of these cases come from Sinkiang Province. It is estimated that there could be 100,000 people infected with hydatids.
