EARLY

RETIREMENT

A recent Australian Bureau of Statistics Survey found that only 20% of all workers make to the standard retiring ages of 60 for women and 65 for men.

Traditional work patterns are breaking down and it is no longer appropriate for workers to look at retirement as something that just happens to them without so much as a moment's thought.

Furthermore, as the population ages and the government pension bill swells, the future of the age pension looks more and more shaky. There are even some people who believe that the age pension will only be available to the most needy cases within the next ten years. So early retirees should be very aware of planning to use up their full payout by the time they reach pension age and then sitting back to let the government support them till they die.

These days, early retirees really need to plan to fund at least the major part of their retirement requirement themselves.

But most people have never seen the kinds of amounts being paid out to early retirees, let alone owned these amounts. To most, \$200,000 seems like an absolute fortune, but few have any idea how long that sum will last.

Unfortunately, for the thousands facing the question, there is no easy formula for working out whether the lump sum offered is enough to provide a comfortable lifestyle for the rest of their days. There are so many variables such as what your living expenses will be, your life expectancy, how much capital you want to leave behind, the size of your lump sum payout and the investment returns that you can expect from that lump sum.

Each individual case should be examined on its own merits - and examined very carefully. This is one time you really do not want to make a mistake.

When offered an early retirement package, there are several things an

employee must consider. The first and foremost most important consideration is whether you really do want to retire. Many people are being offered early retirement packages at the age of 50. However, their nature won't let them last very long just sitting in a rocking chair.

People are offered very generous packages and they think they can't afford to "Knock them back". But you must ask yourself, are you ready for retirement?

Many people who retire early choose to work part-time during retirement. Not only does that fill in the time gap left by full-time employment, it will obviously help the lump sum last longer.

The longer the eligible termination payment is left intact in a rollover fund, the better because the money can grow and compound in these funds tax free.

The income stream from a part-time job may reduce or even negate the need to draw funds out of a tax efficient rollover fund before age 65.

Many people these days are earning more than they need to live on and saving the surplus after they have paid an excessive amount of tax.

THAT'S A GOOD IDEA

SHAMPOO: After a hard day's work fiddling with the car or cleaning the oven or doing any jobs which leave the hands oily and greasy, avoid using harsh cleaners which leave the hands dry and cracked. Instead use ordinary household shampoo. This cleans almost any oily substance with ease, give a nice fragrance and is not harsh on the hands.

TIME-SAVER: When setting off on that barbecue don't waste time standing over gooey, uncooked sausages. Before packing the hamper put the sausages into a saucepan and bring to the boil. When you come to cook your meat over the fire, the sausages will be beautifully cooked in only minutes. A real time-saver.

REAL FLAVOR: When making a meat loaf, line bottom and sides of pan with bacon rashers, from which rind has been removed. Spoon meat mixture into tin. Bacon will flavor the meat loaf and also prevent it from sticking to the pan when turning out. Cut loaf with a serrated knife to avoid broken slices.

BASKET BATH: When you start bathing your baby in the big bath tub, let him have his first baths sitting in a plastic clothes basket. This will let the water in and give baby something to hold on to and he will quickly gain confidence.

DOWN THE YEARS 1860

Hull's Guide records that the Hon. Francis Smith, Premier Attorney - General, at this time was M.H.A. for Fingal, Robert Pringle Stuart was the P.M. and Coroner. The Chief District Constable was John Smith. John Thomas was the District Surveyor who lived at Fingal. Robert Carter was the Auctioneer and J. Smith the Postmaster. Justice's of the Peace, for the district at this time were James and Robert Hepburn, Roy's Hill, Avoca, (1833); Francis Walter Von Stieglitz, Ormley, (1843) James Grant jnr. M.H.A. Tullochgorum (1844); C.A. Parker, Robert Clerk Malahide (1852); Thomas Ransom, Millbrook, (1854) Robert Pringle Stuart was also Commissioner of Goldfields from 1886. The Doctors' were, J. Best at Avoca, Z.P. Pocock at Fingal, Schoolmasters in the district were; J.H. Roberts at Avoca, W.G. Williams at Fingal, Miss Sadler at Cullenswood. W. O'Brien had a private school at Avoca, which was known as the Avoca Grammar School.
